1. Diben

effaith ar gyfleoedd i ddefnyddio'r iaith Gymraeg ac ar beidio â thrin y Gymraeg yn llai ffafriol na'r Saesneg yn cael ei ystyried trwy brosesau gwneud penderfyniadau'r Cyngor, yn cynnwys sut gellir addasu cynigion i sicrhau effaith fwy cadarnhaol neu lei andwyol; ac i hyrwyddo'r iaith a'r diwylliant Gymraeg trwy waith y Cyngor.

1. Cyflwyniad

Mae'n ofynnol i Gyngor Sir Powys gydymffurfio â Safonau'r Gymraeg, a gyflwynwyd o dan Fesur y Gymraeg (Cymru) 2011. Mae Mesur y Gymraeg yn rhoi statws swyddogol i'r Gymraeg yng Nghymru, ac egwyddorion sylfaenol Safonau'r Gymraeg yw na ddylid trin y Gymraeg yn llai ffafriol na'r Saesneg, ac y dylid hybu a hwyluso'r defnydd o'r Gymraeg, i'w gwneud yn haws i bobl ddefnyddio'r Gymraeg yn eu bywyd bob dydd.

Mae 5 prif adran o Safonau y mae'n ofynnol i Gyngor Sir Powys gydymffurfio â hwy, gyda'r safonau cyntaf i'w gweithredu o 30 Mawrth 2016.

Safonau Cyflenwi Gwasanaeth – sut mae'r Cyngor yn darparu gwasanaethau trwy gyfrwng y Gymraeg, sy'n cynnwys gohebiaeth, gwasanaethau ffôn, cyfarfodydd, dogfennau, gwybodaeth ddigidol, gwasanaethau derbynfa, gweinyddu grantiau a chontractau a hyrwyddo gwasanaethau Cymraeg.

Safonau Llunio Polisi – sut mae'r Cyngor yn ystyried y Gymraeg ac yn asesu effaith ar y Gymraeg wrth lunio polisiau a gwneud penderfyniadau a dyrannu grantiau, a'u haddasu i sicrhau gwell effaith ar y Gymraeg.

Safonau Gweithredu - sut mae'r Cyngor yn darparu cyfleoedd ac yn annog defnyddio'r Gymraeg yn ei weithgareddau mewnol, yn cynnwys gwybodaeth cyflogaeth a pholisiau mewnol, trefn gwyno a disgyblu, gwasanaethau mewnrwyd, hyfforddiant ac adnoddau i staff a'r broses recriwtio.

Safonau Hybu – llunio a gweithredu Strategaeth ar gyfer hybu'r Gymraeg o fewn ei ardal, er mwyn cynyddu nifer y siaradwyr Cymraeg a chynyddu'r defnydd o'r Gymraeg.

Safonau Cadw Cofnodion – cadw cofnodion penodol yn ymwneud â pherfformiad y Cyngor mewn rhai agweddau o'i waith o dan y safonau.

Mae copi o Hysbysiad Cydymffurfio Cyngor Sir Powys, sy'n amlinellu'r holl Safonau y mae'n ofynnol i'r Cyngor gydymffurfio â hwy, i'w weld ar wefan y Cyngor, ac ar y fewnrwyd i staff.



Cyflwynwyd adroddiad i Uwch Dîm Arwain y Cyngor ym amlinellu canlyniadau'r ymchwiliad, a'r gofyniad i Gontractwyr 3ydd Plaid ddarparu gwasanaethau yn unol â gofynion y Safonau er mwyn i'r Cyngor sicrhau cydymffurfiaeth.

Gwelodd y canlyniadau fod gan 60.7% o ddarparwyr wybodaeth yn Gymraeg ar eu gwefannau. Roedd hyn yn cynyddu i 76.5% pan oedd adrannau penodol ar eu gwefannau yn ymwneud â gwasanaethau a ddarperir ym Mhowys.

Dim ond 40.7% o ddarparwyr atebodd y ffôn gyda chyfarfodiad Cymraeg, ac roedd modd cynnal y galwadau yn Gymraeg yn ystod 46.2% o alwadau. Cynigiwyd galwad yn ôl yn Gymraeg mewn 23% yn rhagor o alwadau.

Mae gan Gyngor Sir Powys uned gyfieithu fewnol sy'n cefnogi gwasanaethau'r Cyngor ac yn eu galluogi i ddarparu gwybodaeth yn ddwyieithog, ac yn darparu gwasanaeth cyfieithu ar y pryd mewn cyfarfodydd, sy'n galluogi pobl i gyfrannu at gyfarfodydd yn yr iaith o'u dewis, ac yn sicrhau fod pawb sy'n cymryd rhan yn y cyfarfod yn medru dilyn y drafodaeth yn llawn.

Derbyniodd Uned Gyfieithu'r Cyngor 6499 cais am wasanaeth cyfieithu ysgrifenedig yn ystod y flwyddyn, yn cynrychioli 2.96 miliwn o eiriau, a chynnydd yn nifer y geiriau a gyfieithwyd o'i gymharu â'r flwyddyn flaenorol, sy'n dangos fod y Cyngor yn parhau i gynyddu'r wybodaeth sydd ar gael yn ddwyieithog i drigolion ac ymwelwyr â'r sir. Datblygwyd proses ddigidol hefyd o wneud cais a chofnodi gwaith cyfieithu (fel yr amlinellir yn erbyn y Cynllun Gwaith, uchod) i hwyluso trefnu'r gwaith a chefnogi'r trefniadau gweithio newydd.

Yn ystod y flwyddyn, cafodd 95.9% o geisiadau cyfieithu eu dychwelyd o fewn y targedau ar gyfer dychwelyd gwaith. Mae hyn yn amrywio o targed o 1 diwrnod gwaith ar gyfer ceisiadau brys fel datganiadau i'r wasg brys, gwybodaeth frys ar gyfer y wefan a'r fewnrwyd, deunydd ar gyfer y cyfryngau cymdeithasol, gohebiaeth, hysbysebion ac agendaau pwyllgorau; 5 diwrnod gwaith ar gyfer ceisiadau â llai o frys ar eu cyfer fel llythyron cyffredinol, posterï, swydd ddisgrifiadau a dogfennau llai na 100 o eiriau, neu darged hirach y cytunwyd arno ar gyfer dogfennau a strategaethau hirach. Roedd hyn yn galluogi cyhoeddi gwybodaeth yn ddwyieithog i'r cyhoedd, swyddogion ac aelodau etholedig mewn modd amserol.

Daeth y gyfran fwyaf o'r gwaith o'r Gwasanaeth Ysgolion (28.22%) gyda chyfran sylweddol hefyd gan y Gwasanaeth Trawsnewid a Chyfathrebu (10.3%), y Gwasanaeth Eiddo, Cynllunio a Gwarchod y Cyhoedd (9%) a'r Adran Datblygu'r Sefydliad a'r Gweithlu (8.4%).

Cyfieithu ar y Pryd mewn Cyfarfodydd

Yn sgil y pandemig Covid-19, symudodd holl gyfarfodydd y Cyngor i gael eu cynnal yn rhithiol yn ystod y flwyddyn. Roedd y Cyngor yn defnyddio rhaglen Microsoft Teams i gynnal y cyfarfodydd, ond roedd hynny'n peri her wrth ddarparu gwasanaeth cyfieithu ar y pryd a chynnal cyfarfodydd yn ddwyieithog.

Gan nad oes modd cyfieithu'n uniongyrchol trwy Teams, sefydlwyd trefn dros dro o gyfieithu olynol yn y cyfarfodydd i alluogi i gyfranwyr siarad yn eu dewis iaith, ac i bawb yn y cyfarfod ddeall y drafodaeth yn llawn.

Yn y cyfamser, bu adrannau Cyfathrebu a'r Iaith Gymraeg, Cyfreithiol a Democrataidd, ac Economi a Digidol y Cyngor yn cydweithio'n helaeth dros fisoedd cyntaf 2020-21 i geisio datblygu modd o ddarparu cyfieithu ar y pryd trwy Teams, gan gynnal trafodaethau hefyd gyda swyddogion o fewn Llywodraeth Cymru a Microsoft i geisio datrys y sefyllfa. Profwyd nifer o ddulliau posibl o gynnal cyfarfodydd dwyieithog, yn cynnwys cynnal dau gyfarfod yn cydreddeg oddi mewn i Teams a defnyddio ategolion ar gyfer darlledu cyfieithiad. Ond nid oedd y Cyngor o'r farn fod y dulliau hynny'n ymarferol nac am weithio'n ddigon hwylus i alluogi cynnal cyfarfodydd dwyieithog yn llwyddiannus.

Yn sgil hynny, cafodd rhaglen Zoom ei chaffael gan y Cyngor ym mis Hydref 2020 er mwyn cynnal cyfarfodydd, ac mae'r Cyngor wedi darparu hyfforddiant a chanllawiau i'r swyddogion sy'n gweinyddu'r cyfarfodydd, cyfieithwyr y Cyngor ac aelodau etholedig y sir er mwyn gallu cynnal cyfarfodydd dwyieithog yn llwyddiannus. Mae'r rhaglen bellach yn cael ei defnyddio gan rai o bwyllgorau'r Cyngor, er mwyn gallu darparu cyfieithu ar y pryd. Mae rhai problemau technegol yn

ymwneud â phleidleisio hefyd yn y broses o gael eu goresgyn i alluogi defnyddio Zoom ar gyfer pob cyfarfod.

Mae Zoom hefyd wedi cael ei ddefnyddio gan y Cyngor ar gyfer cyfarfodydd ymgynghori â'r cyhoedd, e.e. ymgynghori ar drawsnewid ysgolion, i alluogi cynnal y cyfarfodydd hynny'n ddwyieithog.

Darpariaeth Gwyliau'r Haf – Urdd Gobaith Cymru

Fel rhan o'r ymateb i Covid-19, roedd Cyngor Sir Powys yn darparu gofal plant wedi'i ariannu ar gyfer holl blant gweithwyr hanfodol ac i blant bregus. Roedd yn teimlo'i bod yn hollbwysig fod gweithgareddau wedi'u trefnu ar gael yn ystod yr haf yn ogystal.

Bu'r Cyngor yn gweithio gydag Urdd Gobaith Cymru i ddarparu gweithgareddau gwyliau haf trwy gyfrwng y Gymraeg ym Machynlleth a Llandrindod, gyda sesiynau yn cael eu gynnal yn ystod yr wythnos o 27 Gorffennaf tan 28 Awst. Roedd hyn yn cynnwys darpariaeth dan do ac awyr agored, ac yn cael eu darparu yn unol â Gorchymyn Eithriadau Gwarchod Plant a Gofal Dydd. Cafodd y prosiect ei gomisiynu a'i redeg gan y Gwasanaethau Plant, gyda phartneriaid y prosiect yn cynnwys Cymdeithas Mudiadau Gwirfoddol Powys (PAVO), y Tîm Datblygu Chwaraeon a'r Gwasanaeth Ieuenctid, ynghyd â darparwyr y gweithgareddau. Datblygwyd system gadw lle ar-lein i gynorthwyo gyda rhoi blaenoriaeth i blant bregus a gwirio cymhwyster ar gyfer cwrdd â'r gofynion ariannu, a hefyd i gydymffurfio â gofynion tracio ac olrhain.

Ynghyd â darpariaeth ar gyfer plant gweithwyr hanfodol ac phlant bregus, cafodd y sesiynau eu hagor i blant eraill pan oedd lleoedd ar gael.

Darparodd yr Urdd 2 swyddog bob dydd i ddarparu gweithgareddau ar y ddau safle, gyda'r gweithgareddau'n cynnwys Datrys Problemau, Cyfeiriannu, Saethyddiaeth a Gweithgareddau Natur ac Arsylwi.

iii. Safonau Llundio Polisi

Ceir isod amlinelliad isod o waith pellach a gafodd ei wneud yn ystod blwyddyn ariannol 2020-21 ar gyfer cydymffurfio â'r Safonau Llundio Polisi ac i wella'r modd y caiff yr effaith ar yr iaith Gymraeg ei ystyried o fewn polisiau a phenderfyniadau Cyngor Sir Powys.

Yn dilyn yr Ymchwiliad Safonau'r Gymraeg a gynhaliwyd yn ystod 2019-20, cafodd proses Asesu Effaith Gorfforaethol y Cyngor, sy'n cynnwys proses y Cyngor ar gyfer asesu effaith ar yr iaith Gymraeg, ei diweddarau.

Cafodd y cwestiynau ar effaith ar yr iaith Gymraeg a ddefnyddir mewn prosesau ymgynghori eu diweddarau i sicrhau fod y Cyngor yn gallu llwyr ystyried yr effaith ar gyfleoedd i unigolion ddefnyddio'r iaith, a pheidio trin yn Gymraeg yn llai ffafriol na'r Saesneg; cyfleoedd i hyrwyddo'r iaith Gymraeg; ac effaith ar staff o ran y Gymraeg, ynghyd ag ystyried ffyrdd o newid cynigion wneud i sicrhau effaith fwy cadarnhaol neu i liniaru unrhyw effeithiau negyddol ar y Gymraeg.

Cyhoeddwyd canllaw hefyd ar bryd mae gofyn i'r Cyngor gynnal asesiad effaith, gan nodi fod gwasanaethau, polisiau a chynigion sydd heb gael eu hasesu yn mynd yn groes i Fesur y Gymraeg a deddfwriaeth allweddol arall. Mae'n nodi'n glir hefyd fod angen i asesiadau effaith gael eu cynnal cyn i'r penderfyniad neu'r cynnig gael ei gymeradwyo, ac y dylai fod yn rhan o'r broses benderfynu.

Mae'r canllaw yn nodi pryd y dylid cynnal asesiad effaith, yn cynnwys ar benderfyniadau strategol, polisiau a chynigion newydd, newidiadau i bolisiau a gwasanaethau, amcanion newid, penderfyniadau cyllidebol a phenderfyniadau sy'n effeithio ar staff, ynghyd â Chynlluniau Busnes Integredig.

Mae'r canllaw hefyd yn cynnwys dolenni i wybodaeth a chyngor bellach, yn cynnwys dogfen gyngor Comisiynydd y Gymraeg ar y Safonau Llundio Polisi.

Ar 21 Hydref 2020, fel rhan o Seminar a gynhaliwyd gan Gomisiynydd y Gymraeg ar y Safonau Llundio Polisi a'r cyngor a gyhoeddwyd gan y Comisiynydd, rhoddodd Prif Weithredwr Cyngor Sir Powys gyflwyniad ar sut roedd y Cyngor wedi ymateb i'r Ymchwiliad Safonau i sicrhau ei fod yn ystyried yr effaith ar y Gymraeg o fewn ei benderfyniadau, ac yn casglu barn y cyhoedd ar yr effaith ar y Gymraeg i fwydo i mewn i'r broses benderfynu.

Amlinellodd y cyflwyniad fod y Cyngor wedi penderfynu ymateb yn bositif i'r Ymchwiliad er mwyn gwella'r broses. Mae templed ymgysylltu'r Cyngor wedi'i adolygu i sicrhau fod y cwestiynau cywir yn cael eu gofyn mewn dogfennau a holiaduron ymgynghori ar yr effaith ar y Gymraeg. Mae'r canllawiau ymgynghori wedi cael eu diweddarau, ac ymgyrch gyfathrebu fewnol wedi cael ei chynnal, ynghyd â sesiynau hyfforddi i staff ac aelodau etholedig, ac fe gyhoeddwyd canlyniadau'r Ymchwiliad yn unol â gofynion y Comisiynydd.

Cymerodd y Prif Weithredwr y cyfle hefyd i rannu gwybodaeth am broses Asesu Effaith ddigidol newydd y Cyngor.

Cafodd y broses Asesu Effaith ddigidol ei chreu fel rhan o agenda trawsnewid y Cyngor, i greu un o'r teclynnau pwysicaf y dylai swyddogion ac aelodau fod yn eu defnyddio i asesu a deall effaith cynigion cyn i benderfyniadau gael eu gwneud. Mae'n cynnig dull mwy effeithlon a hwylus o asesu effaith cynigion a phenderfyniadau'r Cyngor ar yr iaith Gymraeg o dan Safonau'r Gymraeg a deddfwriaeth allweddol arall, ar y cyd â deddfwriaeth allweddol arall, ac i sicrhau'r fod y penderfyniadau gorau posibl yn cael eu gwneud ar ran pobl Powys.

Bydd digideiddio'r broses Asesu Effaith hefyd yn galluogi'r Cyngor i dynnu data o nifer o asesiadau effaith, i edrych ar effaith gronnus penderfyniadau ar ardaloedd daearyddol neu grwpiau o fewn y gymuned, i weld os bydd effaith anghymesur ar unrhyw grŵp yn sgil penderfyniadau'r Cyngor, ac yn galluogi'r Cyngor i weld os yw ei benderfyniadau yn cael effaith gadarnhaol neu negyddol, ar yr iaith Gymraeg ac ar yr elfennau eraill sy'n cael eu hystyried. Mae rhagor o wybodaeth am yr Asesiad Effaith Digidol i'w gweld yn yr adran ar y gweithgareddau o dan y Cynllun Gwaith, uchod.

Mae Prif Weithredwr y Cyngor yn cyhoeddi blog fideo rheolaidd ar gyfer aelodau a staff y Cyngor, sy'n cae ei gyhoeddi yn Gymraeg a Saesneg, ac yn cael ei rannu trwy sianeli cyfathrebu mewnol. Mae'r blog fideo yn amlinellu negeseuon allweddol a gwybodaeth am fentrau y mae'r Prif Weithredwr am dynnu sylw atynt.

Caiff negeseuon e-bost o gyfrif corfforaethol mewnol y Cyngor eu hanfon un ai'n ddwyieithog ar ffurf tabl gyda'r ddwy iaith ochr yn ochr ar gyfer negeseuon byrrach, neu mewn dwy neges ar wahân – un yn Gymraeg ac un yn Saesneg – yn cael eu hanfon yr un pryd os yw'r negeseuon yn hirach. Dilynir yr un drefn bellach gyda negeseuon o gyfrifon Gwasanaethau TGCh a Dysgu a Datblygu'r Cyngor.

Rhannodd y Cyngor wybodaeth hefyd gyda staff am ddefnyddio teclyn Cyfieithu Microsoft 365 i gynorthwyo cyfathrebu mewnol, gan alluogi cynnal mwy o drafodaethau mewnol yn Gymraeg neu'n ddwyieithog o fewn y Cyngor, yn enwedig yn sgil mwy o ryngweithio digidol rhwng staff. a) Cwrs ar-lein Croeso Cymraeg Gwaith

Mae'r Cyngor wedi cofrestru fel cyflogwr ar gyfer cyrsiau Cymraeg Gwaith ac yn hyrwyddo'r cyfleoedd i ddysgu trwy'r dulliau hyn trwy erthyglau newyddion ac adran ar y fewnrwyd a thrwy negeseuon trwy gyfrif e-bost Cyfathrebu Corfforaethol.

Mae'r cwrs Croeso ar-lein felly ar gael i unrhyw un o staff y Cyngor gofrestru arno am ddim. Yn ystod 2020-21, gyda chyfyngiadau symud a newidiadau yn y ffordd roedd pobl yn gweithio yn sgil Covid-19, gwelwyd cynnydd sylweddol yn nifer y staff oedd yn ymgymryd â'r cwrs Croeso ar-lein. Cwblhaodd 51 o staff y Cyngor 89 cwrs Croeso Cymraeg Gwaith yn ystod 2020-21, cynnydd sylweddol o'r 11 cwrs oedd wedi'i gwblhau'n flaenorol.

Cwrs Cymraeg hunan-ddysgu yw hwn ar lefel mynediad, sy'n cynnwys 60 awr o ddysgu annibynnol i'r rhai sydd wedi cofrestru, ynghyd â chefnogaeth tiwtor trwy sesiynau adolygu rhithiol, sesiynau cwestiwn ac ateb a chefnogaeth dros e-bost, a chyfle i ddefnyddio gwiriwr lefel cyn ac ar ôl y cwrs. Roedd y cwrs hwn hefyd wedi'i ariannu'n llawn trwy'r cynllun Cymraeg Gwaith.

Sicrhodd Cyngor Sir Powys le i'w staff ar gwrs i ddechrau ym mis Rhagfyr 2020. Mae 47 wedi cofrestru ac yn dilyn y cwrs ar hyn o bryd.

Yn achos Dydd Miwsig Cymru crëwyd rhestr chwarae newydd o gerddoriaeth gan artistiaid o Bowys neu sydd â chysylltiad â Phowys, gan ei hyrwyddo ar y cyfryngau cymdeithasol, ynghyd â chyfres o bostiadau yn cynnwys fideo neu recordiad o artistiaid o'r ardal o wahanol *genres* cerddorol i ennyn diddordeb a chodi ymwybyddiaeth o gerddoriaeth Gymraeg o'r sir, a rhoi cyhoeddusrwydd yr un pryd i'r ymgyrch a'r dathliadau cenedlaethol.

Bu'r Cyngor hefyd yn hyrwyddo Diwrnod Hawliau'r Gymraeg, gan rannu adnoddau a ddarparwyd gan Gomisiynydd y Gymraeg ar y cyfryngau cymdeithasol, i atgoffa trigolion am eu hawliau i dderbyn gwasanaethau a gwybodaeth gan y Cyngor yn Gymraeg, a'u hannog i ddefnyddio'r Gymraeg wrth ymwneud â'r Cyngor.

Rhannwyd negeseuon ar y cyfryngau cymdeithasol hefyd ar ddyddiadau allweddol fel Dydd Santes Dwynwen a Dydd Gŵyl Dewi i hyrwyddo'r iaith a'r diwylliant Cymraeg.

Mae llawer o weithgareddau Menter Brycheiniog a Maesyfed i hyrwyddo'r iaith a'r diwylliant Cymraeg yn ne Powys wedi symud ar-lein ac ar y cyfryngau cymdeithasol yn ystod y flwyddyn, yn sgil cyfyngiadau Covid. Mae'r Fenter wedi bod yn darparu ac yn cefnogi gweithgareddau i bobl o bob oed, i siaradwyr rhugl a dysgwyr Cymraeg, sydd wedi cynnwys sesiynau canu a dawnsio ar-lein i'r teulu gyda Martyn Geraint, sesiynau Clocsffit gyda Tudur Philips, sesiynau Sgiliau Craidd Beicio Mynydd a Chynnal a Chadw Beic, Clwb Lego, fideos hanes lleol yn trafod y blygain a'r fari lwyd gyda Geraint Roberts a hyd yn oed sesiwn ar ddysgu Cymraeg i'r ci. Caiff Clwb Llyfrau Cymraeg ei gynnal yn rheolaidd hefyd.

Mae'r gweithgareddau eraill yn cynnwys sesiwn Teams gydag 20 o blant o'r ardal i gyfansoddi cerdd gyda'r prifardd Mererid Hopwood, gyda'r cerddor Cerys Havana hefyd yn rhan o'r sesiwn i gyfansoddi alaw ar gyfer y gerdd. Cynhaliwyd prosiect hefyd gyda Chôr Meibion Aberhonddu, y prifardd Twm Morys a'r cerddor Rich Vaughan i gyfansoddi cân Gymraeg newydd ar gyfer y côr.

Comisiynwyd y Welsh Whisperer i weithio gyda phlant ysgolion cynradd o'r ardal i gyfansoddi cân am y Sioe Fawr, i nodi'r dyddiad y byddai fel arfer yn cael ei chynnal yn Llanelwedd. Mae'r gân 'Nôl i Faes y Sioe' bellach wedi ael ei recordio gan y Welsh Whisperer, a'i pherfformio am y tro cyntaf ar Heno ar S4C. Mae'r gân bellach ar gael i'w ffrydio ar Spotify.

Trefnodd Menter Brycheiniog a Maesyfed hefyd 'Bodcast Takeover Tegwen', podlediad yn siarad am y sîn roc Gymraeg, gyda thrafodaethau am gerddoriaeth Gymraeg a chwarae caneuon Cymraeg fel rhan o'r sioe. Roedd y podlediad yn llwyddiannus iawn, gyda Tegwen yn cymryd rhan mewn rhaglenni ar Radio Cymru hefyd ers hynny.

Bu Menter Brycheiniog a Maesyfed a Menter Maldwyn hefyd yn cymryd rhan ym mhrosiect Tafarn y Clo Mentrau Iaith Cymru, gyda gemau, cerddoriaeth a gweithgareddau yn cael eu darparu rhwng 8 a 10 bob nos Fercher yn ystod yr haf gan wahanol Fenter Iaith bob wythnos, a phobl yn ymuno â'r sesiynau o bob rhan o Gymru.

Mae rhaglen waith yn cyd-fynd â'r strategaeth, sy'n cynnig gweithgareddau penodol yn ymwneud ag addysg Gymraeg, yn cynnwys symud ysgolion ar hyd y continwmm iaith, datblygu darpariaeth newydd a datblygu cyfleoedd trochi.

I gyd-fynd â'r Strategaeth ar gyfer Trawsnewid Addysg, mae'r Cyngor hefyd wedi cyhoeddi gweledigaeth ar gyfer cynyddu nifer y dysgwyr cwbl ddwyieithog ym Mhowys, yn Rhagfyr 2020. Mae'r ddogfen yn amlinellu gweledigaeth y Cyngor ar gyfer creu dyfodol dwyieithog i Bowys a'i phobl ifanc, trwy normaleiddio addysg cyfrwng Cymraeg/dwyieithog; gweithio gyda phartneriaid i sicrhau fod darpariaeth feithrin a blynyddoedd cynnar ar gael i bob plentyn; cefnogi newydd-ddyfodiaid i'r ardal a'r rhai sydd wedi dewis addysg Saesneg yn wreiddiol ddewis addysg Gymraeg; sicrhau rhwydwaith o ddarparwyr cynradd cyfrwng Cymraeg/dwyieithog ym mhob ardal yn y sir; a datblygu rhwydwaith o ddarparwyr uwchradd sy'n cefnogi ei gilydd ac sy'n medru cynnig cwricwlwm llawn ar draws Powys yn Gymraeg ym mhob cyfnod allweddol.

Bydd y weledigaeth yn llywio cynnwys Cynllun Strategol y Gymraeg mewn Addysg manwl ar gyfer 2022-2032 a ddaw'n ddogfen orfodol i sicrhau darpariaeth fwriadol ar gyfer cynyddu cyfleoedd i nifer cynyddol o blant a phobl ifanc ym Mhowys i ddod yn gwbl ddwyieithog.

Yn unol â nod y Strategaeth ar gyfer Trawsnewid Addysg i wella mynediad at addysg cyfrwng Cymraeg, mae'r Cyngor wedi bod yn ymgynghori ar gynigion i ddatblygu darpariaeth cyfrwng Cymraeg mewn nifer o ysgolion yn y sir, gyda'r cynigion i'w cyflwyno i'r Cyngor yn ystod 2021-22.

Mae'r tudalennau hyn yn cynnwys gwybodaeth am fanteision bod yn ddwyieithog; y daith ddwyieithog o'r cyfnod cyn geni hyd at addysg uwchradd; tystebau ac astudiaethau achos gan ddysgwyr a rhieni; atebion i gwestiynau cyffredin am addysg cyfrwng Cymraeg; ffynonellau gwybodaeth ddefnyddiol i rieni, a dolenni i'r strategaethau uchod.

1. Purpose

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to present the Draft Welsh Language Standards Annual Report for consideration and approval. The Report outlines work undertaken during 2020-21 to ensure compliance with the Welsh Language Standards under the Welsh Language (Wales) Measure 2011, and performance against the requirements of the Standards.

2. Background

- 2.1 The Council is required, under the Welsh Language Standards, to publish an annual report, outlining the work undertaken to comply with the requirements of the Standards during the previous year.
- 2.2 The Draft Welsh Language Standards Annual Report (attached as Appendix A) includes work undertaken to comply with the;
- Service Delivery Standards – which state how the Council must deliver services to the public, e.g. by telephone, in meetings, through correspondence, in documents and through digital platforms
 - Policy Making Standards – stating how the Council must consider the impact of its decisions and services on the Welsh language
 - Operational Standards – what information, support and procedures the Council must provide to its workforce through the medium of Welsh and to enable them to work more through the medium of Welsh
 - Promotion Standards – how the Council intends to promote and increase opportunities to use the Welsh language within Powys.
 - Safonau cadw Cofnodion – cofnodion penodol y mae gofyn i'w Cyngor eu cadw yn ymwneud â'r iaith Gymraeg
 - Record Keeping Standards – specific records to be kept by the Council regarding the Welsh language

- 2.3 The report also sets out work to be undertaken during 2021-22 to further improve how the Council provides services to its Welsh speaking residents, visitors and workforce; to ensure impacts on opportunities to use the Welsh language and on treating the Welsh language no less favourably than English are considered through the Council's decision-making processes, including how proposals could be amended to ensure a more positive or less negative impact; and to promote the Welsh language and culture through the Council's work.
- 2.4 The final sections include data the Council must record under the Record Keeping Standards under the Welsh Language Measure, which include;
- Complaints received by the Council regarding its compliance with the Welsh Language Standards, along with Welsh Language Standards Investigations conducted by the Welsh Language Commissioner during the 2020-21 financial year
 - Data on the Welsh language skills of Council employees
 - The number of staff undertaking training courses provided by the Council through the medium of Welsh
 - The language skills requirements of new posts and vacancies advertised by the Council during the year.

3. Advice

- 3.1 To approve the Draft Welsh Language Standards Annual Report 2021 to be published on the Council's public website. This provides a review of work undertaken by the Council to ensure compliance with the Welsh Language Standards during the 2020-21 financial year, and to meet its statutory obligations under the Welsh Language (Wales) Measure 2011.

- 4.1 The Draft Welsh Language Standards Annual Report is a review of work undertaken during 2020-21 and of information held by the Council regarding its compliance with the Standards. The work plan included for 2021-22 is within existing budget.

1. Introduction

Powys County Council is required to comply with the Welsh Language Standards, introduced under the Welsh Language (Wales) Measure 2011. The Welsh Language Measure gives the Welsh language official status in Wales, and its basic principles are that the Welsh language should be treated no less favourably than English, and use of the Welsh language should be promoted and facilitated, to make it easier for people to use Welsh in their day to day lives.

There are 5 main sets of Standards the Council must comply with, with the first ones becoming operational from 30 March 2016.

Service Delivery Standards – how the Council provides services through the medium of Welsh, including through correspondence, telephone services, meetings, documents, digital information, reception services, administering grants and contracts and promoting Welsh language services.

Policy Making Standards – how the Council considers the Welsh language and assesses impact on the Welsh language when making decisions and allocating grants, and how to modify any proposals in order to have a better impact on the Welsh language.

Operational Standards – how the Council provides opportunities and encourages the use of Welsh in its internal operations, including employment information and internal policies, complaints and disciplinary procedures, intranet services, training and resources for staff and the recruitment process.

Promotion Standards – prepare and implement a Strategy for promoting the Welsh language in the area, to increase the number of Welsh speakers and increase its use.

Record Keeping Standards – keeping specific records concerning the Council's performance in certain areas under the standards.

A copy of Powys County Council's compliance notice, which outlines all the Standards the Council is under duty to comply with, is available on the Council's website, as well as on the staff intranet.

This Annual Report is published to comply with Standards 158, 164 and 170, which state that the Council must prepare an annual report to deal with the way in which the Council complied with the Standards. This report's main focus is therefore on the period between 1 April 2020 and 31 March 2021.

2. Compliance with the Welsh Language Standards

In the 2019-20 Welsh Language Standards Annual Report, a Work Plan was developed for 2020-21 outlining the activities to be undertaken during the year.



Activity	<p>Powys County Council's Social Services has commissioned the Powys Association of Voluntary Organisations (PAVO) to undertake a mystery shopper exercise to discover how accessible services are to the public. This will enable Social Services to receive an overview of the effectiveness of various customer-facing service areas via quarterly short reports and a full annual report.</p> <p>The Service Specification required that every calendar quarter PAVO provide 10 secret shopper contacts made up of Telephone calls, Emails, Internet contact systems, Letters and face to face queries at a reception desk.</p> <p>Over a year, these 40 contacts will delve into:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Welsh language standards in Social Services • Information Advice and Assistance • Calls to Assist and Children's Services' Front Door & General Council Reception • Phone calls to specific practitioners, randomly chosen from a list of staff, to understand ease of contact and/or response <p>The methodology outlines the data to be collated, as:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Total Contacts 2. Contact Method 3. Time in days to respond 4. Was a response received? 5. Was the query answered? 6. Interaction length 7. Satisfaction Score 8. Language of response mirrors language of contact? 9. Met Welsh Language Standards 10. Satisfaction according to contact language <p>Along with qualitative information about the experience.</p>

	<p>The first round of the mystery shopper exercise was held in the 3rd quarter of 2020-21. Of the 10 contacts, 2 were by online chat, 3 by telephone, 2 by letter and 3 by email.</p> <p>Of the 10 contacts, only 6 received a response (67% of the contacts made in English and 50% of contacts made in Welsh)</p> <p>Only 25% of Welsh contacts received a response in Welsh.</p> <p>Responses to Welsh queries took more time than responses to queries sent in English.</p> <p>The Council is currently awaiting the results of the Quarter 4 exercise to measure improvement on the initial results.</p> <p>The Mystery Shopper exercise has highlighted areas for improvement, finding that the Council does not consistently comply with the Welsh Language Standards. The continued exercise will be used to drive improvement in the service provided in Welsh by Powys County Council’s Social Services, with a Senior Manager identified to oversee the delivery of the improvements. The Mystery Shopper work is embryonic, and changes have been made to the brief following the first round of contacts to ensure clear, accurate and thorough results, and enable the service to track improvement. Clear actions and timescales for improvement will be identified based on the Quarter 4 results.</p>

Action	5. Create a database of useful phrases for staff and elected members, to encourage more use of the Welsh language and provide the Active Offer of a Service in Welsh
Relevant Sections of the Welsh Language Standards	Service Delivery
Activity	<p>Useful phrases for Council staff and elected members to use, to encourage more use of the Welsh language and provide the Active Offer of a Service in Welsh were published during the year and launched on St David’s day, to coincide with messaging to encourage staff and elected members to use more Welsh.</p> <p>The phrases were published and advertised on the Council’s intranet and emails sent to all staff and elected members through the Corporate Communications email. They are also available on the Welsh Language section of the intranet.</p> <p>Lists of phrases are included on downloadable and printable pdfs, and include useful phrases to be used when arranging and conducting bilingual meetings and when dealing with the public, as well as bilingual lists including dates and times; place-names; and service, committee and job titles.</p> <p>Background images were also created for computer screens and mobile devices with phrases to help staff answer the phone with a bilingual greeting.</p> <p>We will continue to raise the profile of the phrase lists and other resources to encourage more use of the Welsh language with regular messages as part of the Active Offer refresher campaign.</p> <p>Below are examples of the phrases provided:</p>



Action	6. Create and introduce a system to automatize the translation request and logging process, to create a user-friendly process to request translation work, and enabling the capture of translation data, allowing the translation team to focus on translation work
Relevant Sections of the Welsh Language Standards	Service Delivery Operational
Activity	<p>During 2020-21, the Council introduced a new system to submit and log translation requests.</p> <p>The system was a collaboration between the Welsh Unit and the Business Intelligence Systems teams to create a user-friendly process to request translation work. It provides the necessary information required by the translation team to undertake the work, and enables the capture of translation data for the Council’s quarterly reporting schedule, and annual budget process. This takes the onus off the translation team to record these details within its database, as the details will be automatically taken from the form.</p> <p>This includes the project title, service area, the relevant priority within the Council’s Vision 2025, document size and category (e.g. letter, agenda, press release, policy/strategy) and any special requirements.</p> <p>Upon submitting the request, an automated email is sent to the requester confirming that the translation team has received the request, and providing a date for when they can expect to receive the translation.</p> <p>The request is then converted into a task within the translation task list which can be picked up or allocated to a member of the team.</p> <p>When complete, the translator can return the translation to the requester, record the number of words and mark the task as complete.</p> <p>The system was extensively tested initially by the Transformation and Communications Service during the 1st quarter of 2020-21, and is now live.</p>

	Some capacity issues were experienced during the roll-out, meaning that the system does not have sufficient capacity to deal with all the work currently submitted for translation. Further development work is being undertaken to enable full roll-out to the whole Council.

Action	7. To digitise the integrated impact assessment process, to make the impact assessment process more accessible, and enable interrogation of the data
Relevant Sections of the Welsh Language Standards	Policy Making
Activity	<p>Powys County Council recognises that the Impact Assessments form one of the most important tools that officers and members should be using to assess and understand the impact of proposals before decisions are taken.</p> <p>During 2020-21, as part of the transformation agenda, the Council worked extensively on developing a digitised impact assessment process. The project was a collaboration between the Transformation and Communication and the Economy and Digital Service Areas, to provide a more efficient and user-friendly method for assessing the impact of the Council's proposals and decisions on the Welsh Language, alongside Equalities, Future Generations, Socio-economic Duty, Council Priorities and other key considerations, to ensure compliance with the Welsh Language Standards and other legislation, and to ensure the best possible decisions are made for the people of Powys.</p> <p>The form also enables the author to identify what mitigating actions are to be implemented to ensure a more positive, or less negative impact, and outlines when the Impact Assessment must be reviewed.</p> <p>The digitised process provides enhanced robustness and introduces an automated flow and sign-off process by Heads of Service and Portfolio Holders to support governance. This means that once the author has completed the draft Impact Assessment (IA), the system will automatically generate an email which sends the form to the relevant Head of Service for sign-off. The Head of Service can either submit comments for the author to amend the draft, or approve the draft IA. When the Head of Service has approved the draft IA, an email will be generated and sent automatically to the Portfolio Holder for final sign-off. Again, the Portfolio Holder can submit comments back to the author to amend the draft or click to approve the Assessment. The assessment will then be ready to accompany the proposal to the decision-making stage.</p> <p>Digitising the Impact Assessment process will also enable the Council to interrogate data from multiple impact assessments, to look at the cumulative impact of decisions on particular geographic areas or groups within the community, to see if any group is impact disproportionately by decisions, and will enable the Council to see if its decisions impacts positively or negatively, on the Welsh language and on the other elements considered. It will also create a central repository of impact assessments for members and staff to access (as well as public access, when appropriate).</p>

	<p>The new process was launched at the beginning of April 2021, with all service areas expected to use the digitised form from this date.</p> <p>Briefing sessions have been held for Cabinet and the Council’s Senior Leadership Team, with a session also to be scheduled for all Council members as part of the member development programme, to ensure all members are familiar with the process, and understand their role within the process.</p> <p>A series of training sessions have been scheduled in June, September and December 2021 for any officers undertaking assessments, along with training arranged specifically for the School Transformation Team in May 2021 on the Impact Assessment process and the digitised form.</p> <p>Communication was sent to all staff via the Corporate Communications channels in March and April 2021 outlining the new process, with further communication scheduled for June 2021.</p>

Action	8. Conduct an internal Active Offer refresher campaign through corporate communication channels to remind staff of the requirements of the Welsh Language Standards
Relevant Sections of the Welsh Language Standards	Service Delivery Policy Making Operational
Activity	<p>Following on from the Active Offer campaign conducted during 2019-20 to highlight the requirement to provide services in Welsh, focussing on answering the telephone; in letters and email; conducting meetings; publishing documents and when sharing information through social media and the web, further messages were shared through the Corporate Communications channels during 2020-21.</p> <p>The main Corporate Communications channels were reserved for messages relating to the Covid pandemic, staff well-being and new working arrangements during the first few months of the year.</p> <p>During the latter part of the year, key messages about providing services in Welsh and providing the Active Offer were shared, including;</p> <p>7 December 2020 – Welsh Language Rights Day Celebrating the Welsh language services provided by the Council, and the rights people have to use the Welsh language when dealing with us. The messaging also included images for staff to use as a background for their PC or phones screens with useful phrases to use when answering the phone, using the same branding as the previous Active Offer campaign. The messages also directed staff to the Welsh Language section on the Intranet for further information and resources.</p> <p>5 February 2021 – Social Media Reminder A reminder to staff who administer social media accounts of the requirements of the Welsh Language Standards, and to publish information in both languages. Staff were reminded that all posts must be bilingual, or that separate Welsh and</p>

English posts are issued, and that text in images and graphics must also be bilingual or that Welsh and English graphics are issued in separate posts. Staff were also reminded of the support available from the translation team, and that they should prepare messages in advance where possible, or have a bank of useful words or phrases available should they need to issue an urgent post.

22 February 2021 – Use of Microsoft 365 Translator

The Council also issued a message about the use of the Microsoft 365 Translator function to aid internal communication, enabling more conversations to be held in Welsh or bilingually within the Council, and for those who don't speak Welsh to be able to understand and direct emails and messages they receive to the correct service or officer, to facilitate providing the Active Offer.

However, it was also clearly stated that it should not be used to provide a final translation for publication, and that documents for external publication should continue to be sent to the Translation Unit.

1 March 2021 – St David's Day

The St David's Day messaging was used to encourage more Council staff to use their Welsh language skills. To give them a helping hand, useful phrases were also published to enable staff to use more Welsh when dealing with the public and working from day to day (outlined in section 5 above), and encouraging them to use the phrases to start conversations in Welsh.

These again used the same branding as the previous Active Offer campaign.

To coincide with the messaging via the Corporate Communications channels, the Active Offer was a key element discussed in the sessions with each Service Management Team (outlined in section 3 above), with the Council's Active Offer branding again used during the session to tie in with the refresher campaign. The section on Service Delivery Standards outlined the requirements when providing Services via different channels, with particular focus given to Social Media and ensuring that 3rd Party Operators also provide the Active Offer, and services according to the requirements of the Service Delivery Standards when operating on behalf of the Council.

Communication was also sent to 3rd Party Operators working on behalf of the Council, outlining the requirement to provide services in Welsh, and the Active Offer when operating on behalf of the Council. The communication also included useful resources and information about support available to help in delivering services in Welsh.

The Staff Induction video, to be used in the Corporate Induction and Line Manager Induction also focusses on delivering services in Welsh and the Active Offer, and again uses branding similar to that of the Active Offer campaign, to ensure employees are familiar with the requirements from the outset, and understand why providing the Active Offer is important.

Communication about opportunities to learn Welsh also tie into the requirement to provide the Active Offer of a service in Welsh.

Action	9. Provide quarterly training for staff on assessing the impact of policies and decisions on the Welsh language as part of the Corporate Impact Assessment training
Relevant Sections of the Welsh Language Standards	Policy Making
Activity	<p>Quarterly training sessions were scheduled for 2020-21 to provide information and guidance to council staff on assessing the impact of policies and decisions on the Welsh language, as part of the Corporate Impact Assessment process.</p> <p>Sessions had originally been scheduled to be held in a training room at County Hall in Llandrindod in May, July and November 2020 and March 2021, but due to the Covid restrictions, the sessions scheduled for May and July 2020 were cancelled.</p> <p>However, the sessions arranged for November 2020 and March 2021 were rearranged to be held virtually via Microsoft Teams. The November session was held successfully for 6 members of staff. With only one participant registered for the March training, the session was postponed, and the member of staff will join the next training session scheduled for June 2021, when the training will be updated to reflect the new digitised Impact Assessment process.</p> <p>108 Council employees have now received the formal Impact Assessment Training.</p> <p>Further sessions have also been scheduled for September and December 2021, which will be advertised through the Council's internal communications channel, and available for staff to book via the Council's intranet.</p>

Action	10. Provide a session for Cabinet on their role in assessing the impact of decisions on the Welsh language, as part of the Corporate Impact Assessment process
Relevant Sections of the Welsh Language Standards	Policy Making
Activity	<p>To coincide with the launch of the Council's new digitised Impact Assessment process on 1 April 2021, a briefing session was conducted for Cabinet members on 20 April 2021 to outline the process and legal requirements, to demonstrate how the new digitised impact assessment process works, including the sign-off and governance procedure, where Portfolio Holders are required to approve the Impact Assessment before it is attached to Cabinet reports, or reject and provide comments to the author if they consider that the impact assessment needs to be developed further.</p> <p>The session outlined the fact that the Impact Assessment process is one of the most important tools that officers and members have to assess and understand the impact of proposals before decisions are taken, and that it enables the Council to comply with the Welsh Language Standards as well as other legislation.</p>

	<p>The Impact Assessment form has been digitised as part of the Council’s transformation agenda, as outlined in section 7 above, with the form newly available in the staff section of the Council’s website, and all services are now expected to use the digitised form for all new assessments.</p> <p>A more robust and streamlined sign-off process is considered one of the benefits of the digitised process, and the role of Cabinet members within the sign-off process was outlined in the session.</p> <p>The approval flow was outlined to Cabinet, showing that once the author submits the Assessment, and automated email is generated and sent to the relevant Head of Service. The email includes a link to the completed form and a unique code to enable them to access the assessment. The Head of Service can either submit comments for the author to amend the draft, or approve the draft IA.</p> <p>Once approved, an automated email is then sent to the Portfolio Holder. Again, the Portfolio Holder can submit comments back to the author to amend the draft or click to approve the Assessment.</p> <p>The Head of Service and Portfolio Holder must be content that the Impact Assessment outlines the relevant impacts, that the mitigation are steps that will be undertaken by the Council, and that the assessment will stand up to scrutiny and challenge.</p> <p>Once approved, the assessment will be ready to accompany the proposal to the decision-making stage, and published when appropriate to do so.</p>

Action	11. Provide training for elected members as part of the Member Training programme on the requirements of the Welsh Language Standards, including Service Delivery, Policy Making, Operational and Promotion Standards
Relevant Sections of the Welsh Language Standards	Service Delivery Policy Making Operational Promotion
Activity	<p>On 16 November 2020, training was provided on the Welsh Language in Powys as part of the Member Training programme.</p> <p>The session was provided by the Portfolio Holder for the Welsh Language, the Chief Executive and the Welsh Language Officer, and included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Information and statistics about the Welsh language in Powys and in Wales, including where they might live, how old they may be, and the numbers and proportion of Welsh speakers in different areas. • The history of the Welsh language, outlining how we got to where we are today. • A change of attitude towards the language in the 20th century, leading to new opportunities to use the language and new legislation. • The Welsh Language Measure (Wales) 2011, the Welsh Language Standards, and what it means to organisations such as Powys County Council, including

providing service to the public, policy making, how the Welsh language is used internally, keeping records, and promoting the Welsh language.

- The Welsh language in other legislation including the Well-being of Future Generations Act
- More than Just Words, the Welsh Government’s Strategic Framework for the Welsh Language in Health and Social Care, and the value and importance of providing an Active Offer, where a service is provided in Welsh without forcing a request, acknowledging that people may not always ask for a service in Welsh, even though they have a right to receive it, and would prefer to have that’s service in Welsh.


Action	12. Provide a Welsh Language Awareness session for all new staff as part of the new Staff Induction process
Relevant Sections of the Welsh Language Standards	Service Delivery Policy Making Operational Promotion
Activity	<p>The face-to-face Corporate Induction sessions for new staff scheduled for 2020-21 were cancelled due to the Covid pandemic.</p> <p>A new virtual programme has been created however, which was introduced in April 2021. Information about the Welsh language in Powys and the requirements under the Welsh Language Standards is included in the induction pack, and new starters are also shown a video, created by the Council, on the Welsh Language in Powys.</p> <p>The video provides information and statistics about Welsh speakers in Powys, outlining the number and proportion of Welsh speakers within Powys as a whole, and also within different areas in the county, and within different age groups.</p> <p>It also discusses the Welsh Language (Wales) Measure 2011, and how it gave the Welsh language official status in Wales, created the role of the Welsh Language Commissioner and introduced the Welsh Language Standards, explaining how</p>

the Council must provide services in Welsh, consider the impact of its decisions on the Welsh language and promote the Welsh language through its work.

Particular emphasis is placed on the Active Offer, and ensuring the council has sufficient Welsh language skills to provide services in Welsh, through recruitment and training, and discusses the importance of the Active Offer and a service in Welsh from a service user's perspective.

Finally, the video outlines the support available to service areas and officers to provide a service in Welsh, in compliance with the Standards, and also to help officers work more through the medium of Welsh.

Activity	<p>As with the Corporate Induction sessions, the face to face Line Manager Induction sessions scheduled for 2020-21 were also cancelled due to the Covid pandemic.</p> <p>A new virtual course was also developed for Line Managers, which was introduced in February 2021, with material sent out to Line Managers including the video created by the Council on the Welsh Language in Powys, above.</p> <p>Key messages for Line Managers included in the video outline the key considerations for the Council when developing proposals and making decisions to assess the impact on the Welsh language, as well as the requirement to plan services to enable the provision of the Active Offer of a service in Welsh,</p>

Action	14. Promote and facilitate training opportunities and informal practice sessions to enable staff to develop their Welsh language skills
Relevant Sections of the Welsh Language Standards	Operational
Activity	<p>We have continued to promote and facilitate opportunities for staff to develop their Welsh language skills throughout the year.</p> <p>Staff are able to access courses through the Work Welsh Scheme, including the Work Welsh Welcome online courses for beginners which include an initial 10-hour course consisting of 10 hour-long modules as well as follow on courses, and also the more intensive Work Welsh courses, such as the new 4* Work Welsh course, which was launched in 2020, which is a mixture of on-line self-study and tutor support.</p> <p>These courses are available free of charge to Powys County Council employees.</p> <p>Staff can also enrol on community courses provided during the working day or in the evening by the National Centre for Learning Welsh, mainly through Learn Welsh Ceredigion, Powys and Carmarthenshire, who provide weekly courses at different levels within the area. These courses would normally be held in classrooms around the county, but are currently being provided via virtual classrooms. The Council supports staff undertaking these courses by paying their course registration fees.</p> <p>Staff can also normally access intensive residential courses, and although members of Council staff had enrolled on such courses this year, the courses were cancelled due to Covid restrictions.</p> <p>Information about the courses available for Council staff is provided within the Welsh Language section on the Council's intranet.</p> <p>Information was also sent out to promote learning opportunities through the Council's corporate communications channels – through news items on the intranet homepage and the corporate communications email. News stories and emails were scheduled to coincide with the Community Courses starting in</p>

	<p>September, and to promote additional and new courses provided during the year.</p> <p>A specific marketing campaign was conducted to promote the new 4* Work Welsh course, outlined above, in October 2020, leading to 47 Council employees enrolling on the course, which started in December 2020.</p> <p>Information was also disseminated about the Work Welsh Welcome course, which employees can access at any time.</p> <p>Learning opportunities were also promoted through the Welsh Language in Powys induction video, the Council’s Staff Handbook, and during information sessions held with service management teams.</p> <p>During the year, the following number of employees enrolled / completed Welsh language courses;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 51 employees completed 89 Work Welsh Welcome on-line courses. • 47 employees enrolled on the 4* Work Welsh Entry 1 Self-study course • 26 employees enrolled on community Welsh for Adults courses


Action	15. Continue discussions with the Urdd to facilitate the National Urdd Eisteddfod’s visit to Powys in 2023

Activity	<p>Discussions have continued with the Urdd to facilitate bringing the National Urdd Eisteddfod to Powys.</p> <p>However, due to the ongoing impact of the Covid pandemic, and the postponement of the Eisteddfod again in 2021, the Eisteddfod’s visit to Powys had now been postponed to 2024.</p>

Action	16. Create a leaflet to promote Welsh-medium education in Powys under the Welsh Education Forum’s Welsh Education Promotion Sub-group
Relevant Sections of the Welsh Language Standards	Promotion
Activity	<p>Emphasis has been placed on promoting Welsh-medium education within Powys during the year, to coincide with the Council adopting a new Strategy for Transforming Education on Powys in March 2020, and a new vision for increasing the number of fully bilingual learners in Powys in December 2020.</p> <p>A new section has been created on the Council’s website, entitled ‘Destination bilingual: the benefits of choosing Welsh-medium education’, which includes information about the benefits of being bilingual, the bilingual journey from pre-</p>

birth to secondary school, testimonials and case studies from learners and parents, answers to common questions about Welsh-medium education, sources of useful information for parents, and links to the Council's strategies to improve Welsh-medium education.



ii. Service Delivery

Further work undertaken during the 2020-21 financial year to ensure compliance with the Service Delivery Standards and to improve how services are provided through the medium of Welsh by Powys County Council is outlined below.

Service Delivery and the Active Offer - 3rd Party Provider Spot Checks

In August 2020, the Council received communication from the Welsh Language Commissioner outlining a Welsh Language Standards Investigation conducted by the Welsh Language Commissioner following a failure by another local authority to comply with the Standards with regard to services provided by a 3rd Party Contractor. A report was presented to the Council's Senior Leadership Team outlining the result of the investigation, and the requirement for 3rd Party Contractors to provide services according to the requirements of the Standards in order for the Council to ensure compliance.

At the meeting, it was agreed to conduct spot-checks on a selection of contractors providing services on behalf of Powys County Council to measure how they are able to provide the Active Offer of a service in Welsh.

3rd party contractors were selected at random from lists of contractors providing services on behalf of each service area, with particular focus on Service Areas providing a direct service to Powys customers.

To measure how contractors were able to provide the Active Offer, the spot checks focussed on 3 elements;

- i) Information on provider's websites
- ii) Services provided by telephone
- iii) Responding to email

The results identified that 60.7% of providers had information in Welsh on their websites. This increased to 76.5% when they had specific sections on their websites relating to services provided in Powys.

Only 40.7% of providers answered the telephone with a bilingual greeting, and calls could be conducted in Welsh during 46.2% of the calls. A call back in Welsh was offered during a further 23% of calls.

60.7% of emails sent in Welsh received a response within 10 working days of the email being sent. However, of the responses received, 76.5% were received in Welsh.

Following the exercise, in December 2020, the Council contacted Contractors who provide services on its behalf to report on the results of the spot checks. The communication also outlined the requirements of the Welsh Language Standards, and the requirements of the contracts with the Council, and directed them towards resources and support available to help them provide more services through the medium of Welsh.

This included information about translation services and digital translation tools, information and advice services, opportunities to develop staff Welsh language skills, and useful resources including useful phrases and vocabulary to use in the workplace.

A series of sessions on Welsh Language Awareness, Providing the Active Offer and Developing Welsh Language Skills were also provided for 3rd Party Providers in collaboration with the Powys Association of Voluntary Organisations and Learn Welsh Ceredigion, Powys and Carmarthenshire, to outline the requirements, discuss the challenges and consider ways in which providers can develop the services they are able to provide in Welsh.

Further communication was sent to 3rd Party Providers in April 2021 to remind them again of the requirements, and to notify them of the intention to conduct further spot checks in the summer of 2021.

Welsh Language Commissioner Assurance Report

As part of the Welsh language Commissioner's work for the annual assurance report, Powys County Council received a detailed report on its performance, which sets out the areas where it is performing well, and which areas need to be improved.

The report received in August 2020 stated as follows;

- Of three telephone calls made to the Council, all the automatic information was available in Welsh, and the Active Offer of a Welsh service was offered at the beginning of the 3 calls.
- Three forms were subject to the survey, with the three available fully in Welsh. The forms were available on the Council's website with a language button on the English version to reach the Welsh form
- Three press releases were subject to the survey, with the three available fully in Welsh. The press releases were available on the Council's website with a language button on the English version to reach the Welsh version
- Three examples of brochures and leaflets were subject to the survey, with the three available fully in Welsh. They were available on the Council's website with a language button on the English version
- Three examples of the Council's corporate identity were subject to the survey, with all three appearing in Welsh

- 30 of the Council's webpages were subject to the survey, with text on 29 pages available and working fully in Welsh
- Of the 15 Facebook posts included in the survey, 13 were available in Welsh, with 15 of 15 Tweets available in Welsh
- 15 posts advertised on the Council's website were surveyed, with the Welsh language mentioned in each one. The advert and job description for each role were available in Welsh, with the application form including an option to note language preference for assessment. The Welsh language was not considered essential for any of these roles.
- Two visits were made to County Hall. The receptionist greeted the visitor in Welsh at the beginning of both visits, and was able to deal with both visits in Welsh. The organisation had signs in the reception area stating that visitors were welcome to use the Welsh language. However, not all Welsh speaking reception staff were wearing badges showcasing this ability.
- Six signs were subject to the survey during visits to County Hall, with the text on each one available in Welsh, and correct in meaning and expression. The text on two signs was set so that the Welsh was likely to be read first.

Weaknesses identified in the report, along with the Council's response, are as follows;

- A reply was not received to 2 emails sent in Welsh
Email 1 - Customer Service were able to identify the email, and stated that a bilingual automatic response was sent. The email was forwarded to the relevant service area. Due to technical issues during the survey period, the service had no record of receiving the email. However, the service was reminded of the need to respond in Welsh to emails received in Welsh, to use the Council's translation unit or Microsoft Translate to understand the text within a Welsh email (if the officer didn't speak Welsh), to send any response in Welsh and to ensure that the email signature included a statement about welcoming correspondence in Welsh. The issue was also raised in a team meeting to remind the team of the requirements. Email 2 – The Service were able to identify the email, and could see that no response was sent. The team established a system where the correspondence would be sent for translation, sent to the team leader who is a Welsh speaker, or Microsoft Translate used to understand the contents, in order to provide a response in Welsh.
- The English message was played first during 2 telephone calls
The Council's Customer Service Team have arranged for the telephone message to be re-recorded, so the Welsh greeting is played first.
- A webpage for requesting repair works included an English paragraph on the Welsh page
However, the page had since been updated, with all the text available in Welsh. The Council also outlined the process for updating and translating webpages to ensure information is published in Welsh and English at the same time.
- Two Facebook posts appeared in English only
The Council was able to identify the Facebook posts published in English only. The communications team have since issued further guidance to Council services who administer social media accounts to remind them of the requirements of the Welsh Language Standards, and outline the support available to enable them to comply. The Council's

communications team now also use Crowd Control to schedule posts, making it easier to schedule posts to published simultaneously in both languages.

Translation and Providing Information Bilingually

Powys County Council has an internal translation unit which supports the Council's services and enables them to provide information bilingually, and provides simultaneous translation in meetings, enabling people to contribute to meetings in their language of choice, and ensuring that all those taking part in the meeting are able to follow the discussion fully.

The Council's Translation Unit received 6499 requests for written translation service during the year, representing 2.96 million words, and an increase in the number of words translated during the previous year, showing that the Council continues to increase the information available bilingually for residents and visitors to the county. An automated translation request and logging process was also developed during the year (as outlined in the activities against the Work Plan above) to facilitate arranging translation work and to support the new working arrangements.

During the year, 95.9% of translation requests were returned within the targets set for completing the work. This varies from a 1 day turnaround target for urgent requests such as urgent press releases, urgent information for the website and intranet, social media posts, correspondence, adverts and committee agendas, 5 working days for less urgent requests such as general letters, posters, job descriptions and documents less than 100 words, or a longer agreed target for larger documents and strategies. This enabled publishing information bilingually to the public, employees and elected members in a timely manner.

The largest proportion of translation work was undertaken for the Schools Service (28.22%) with a significant proportion also undertaken for the Transformation and Communication Service (10.3%), Property, Planning and Public Protection Service (9%) and Workforce and Organisational Development (8.4%).

Simultaneous Translation in Meetings

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, all Council meetings moved to be held virtually during the year. The Council used Microsoft Teams to conduct the meetings, but this posed a challenge in providing simultaneous translation and conducting the meetings bilingually.

As it is not possible to provide simultaneous translation directly through Teams, a temporary system of consecutive translation was introduced at the meetings to enable contributors to speak in their language of choice, and to enable everyone at the meeting to be fully understand the discussion.

Meanwhile, the Council's Communications and Welsh Language, Legal and Democratic, and Economy and Digital teams worked extensively over the first few months of 2020-21 to try to develop a means of providing simultaneous translation through Teams, while also holding discussions with officials within Welsh Government and Microsoft to try to resolve the situation. A number of possible methods of conducting bilingual meetings were tested, including conducting two meetings concurrently within Teams and using plug-ins to provide and access translation. However, the Council did not consider these methods to be practical or user-friendly enough to enable successful bilingual meetings to be held.

As a result, the Council procured Zoom to conduct meetings in October 2020, and has provided training and guidance to officers administering the meetings, the translators and elected members to ensure that bilingual meetings can be conducted successfully. Zoom is now being used for some

committee meetings, to enable simultaneous translation. Some technical issues with voting are also in the process of being resolved to enable Zoom to be utilized for all meetings.

Zoom has also been used by the Council for public consultation meetings, e.g. school transformation consultations, to enable those meetings to be held bilingually.

Summer Holiday Provision – Urdd Gobaith Cymru

As part of the Covid-19 response, Powys County Council made available funded childcare for all children of critical workers and vulnerable children. It also considered it vitally important to have organised activities during the summer as well.

The Council worked with Urdd Gobaith Cymru to provide summer holiday activities through the medium of Welsh in Machynlleth and Llandrindod, with sessions run every weekday from 27 July to 28 August. This included indoor and outdoor provision, and operated under the Childminding and Day Care Exceptions Order. The project was commissioned and run by Children Services, with partners in the project including the Powys Association of Voluntary Organisers (PAVO), Sports Development Team and Youth Services as well as the activity providers. An on-line booking system was developed to assist with prioritising vulnerable children for the activities and checking eligibility to meet the funding requirements, and also ensured compliance with track and trace requirements.

As well as provision for children of critical workers and vulnerable children, the sessions were also opened up for other children where there were spaces available.

The Urdd provided 2 instructors each day to provide activities at each site, with the activities including Problem Solving, Orienteering, Archery and Nature and Observation Activities.

iii. Policy Making Standards

Further work undertaken during the 2020-21 financial year to ensure compliance with the Policy Making Standards and to improve how the impact on the Welsh language is considered within Powys County Council's policies and decisions is outlined below.

Following the Welsh Language Standards Investigation conducted during 2019-20, the Council's Corporate Impact Assessment process, which incorporates the Council's process for assessing the impact on the Welsh language, was updated.

Questions on impact on the Welsh language used within consultation processes were updated to ensure the Council is able to fully consider the impact on Opportunities for individuals to use the language, and not treating the Welsh language less favourably than the English language; Opportunities to promote the Welsh language; and Welsh language impact on staff, as well as considering ways in which proposals could be modified to ensure a more positive or less negative impact on the Welsh language.

Guidance was also issued on when the Council is required to conduct an impact assessment, outlining that services, policies and proposals that have not been assessed are in breach of the Welsh Language Measure, as well as other key legislation. It also clearly states that impact assessments must be conducted before the proposal or decision is approved, as it should formulate part of the decision-making process.

The guidance outlines when impact assessments should be undertaken, which include strategic decisions, new policies and proposals, changes to policies and services, change objectives, budget decisions and decisions impacting staff, as well Integrated Business Plans.

The guidance also provides links to further information and advice, including the Welsh Language Commissioner's advice document on the Policy Making Standards.

On 21 October 2020, as part of a Seminar conducted by the Welsh Language Commissioner on the Policy Making Standards and advice paper published by the Commissioner, Powys County Council's Chief Executive gave a presentation on how the Council had responded to the Welsh Language Standards Investigation to ensure it considers the impact on the Welsh language within its decisions, and gathers the views of the public on the impact on the Welsh language to feed into the decision-making process.

The presentation outlined that the Council decided to respond positively to the Investigation to improve the process. The Council's engagement template had been revised to ensure the correct questions were asked in consultation documents and questionnaires on the impact on the Welsh language. The consultation guidance had been updated, and an internal communications campaign conducted, as well as training sessions for staff and elected members, and the results of the Investigation publicised according to the Commissioner's requirements.

The Chief Executive also took this opportunity to share information about the Council's new digitised Impact Assessment process.

The digitised Impact Assessment process was created as part of the Council's transformation agenda, to form one of the most important tools that officers and members should be using to assess and understand the impact of proposals before decisions are taken. It provides a more efficient and user-friendly method for assessing the impact of the Council's proposals and decisions under the Welsh Language Standards and other key legislation, and to ensure the best possible decisions are made for the people of Powys.

The digitised process provides enhanced robustness and introduces an automated flow and sign-off process by Heads of Service and Portfolio holders to support governance.

Digitising the Impact Assessment process will also enable the Council to interrogate data from multiple impact assessments, to look at the cumulative impact of decisions on particular geographic areas or groups within the community, to see if any group is impacted disproportionately by decisions, and will enable the Council to see if its decisions impact positively or negatively, on the Welsh language and on the other elements considered. It will also create a central repository of impact assessments for members and staff to access (as well as public access, when appropriate).

Further information on the Digital Impact Assessment is available in the section on activities under the Work Plan, above.

iv. Operational Standards

Further work undertaken during the 2020-21 financial year to ensure compliance with the Operational Standards and to improve how internal information, resources and services are provided is outlined below.

Internal Communication and Information

Further work has been undertaken during the year to ensure that information is presented bilingually to staff through the internal communication channels.

The Chief Executive publishes a regular video blog for Council members and staff, which is produced in Welsh and English, and shared through internal communications channels. The video blog outlines key messages and information about council initiatives that the Chief Executive wishes to highlight.

E-mails from the Council's internal corporate communications account are sent either bilingually in tabular form with both languages side-by-side for shorter messages, or in two separate emails – one in Welsh and one in English – sent simultaneously if the messages are longer. The same procedure is now also followed with emails from the Council's ICT Services and Learning and Development accounts.

The Council has also issued communication to staff about the use of the Microsoft 365 Translator function to aid internal communication, enabling more conversations to be held in Welsh or bilingually within the Council particularly with more digital interaction between staff. It also enables those who don't speak Welsh to be able to understand and direct emails and messages they receive in Welsh to the correct service or officer, to facilitate providing the Active Offer. The Council also clearly stated that the Microsoft 365 Translator should not be used to provide a final translation for publication without being checked thoroughly, and that documents for external publication should continue to be sent to the Translation Unit to ensure an accurate and appropriate translation.

The Council also developed a new bilingual internal site during 2020-21 as a portal for all relevant information relating to Covid-19 and Staff Well-being, which included articles for staff, vlogs and videos about the work undertaken, links to relevant advice and documents, a regular Coronavirus Bulletin outlining the most recent information, and well-being information to help staff stay safe and promote physical and mental health and well-being.

Welsh Language Skills Development

Under the requirements of the Operational Standards, but also as part of the council's commitment to increase the number of Welsh speakers within the county, as its contribution towards the Government's target of one million Welsh speakers by 2050, the council encourages its staff to learn Welsh through a variety of options;

a) Work Welsh Welcome on-line course

The council has registered as an employer for the Work Welsh courses, and promotes opportunities to learn through these methods through news articles and a Learn Welsh section on the intranet, and through emails from the Corporate Communications account.

The Work Welsh Welcome Course is available for all Council staff free of charge.

During 2020-21, with Covid-19 movement restrictions and changes in the way in which people work, we saw a significant increase in the number of staff undertaking the on-line Welcome course. 51 employees completed 89 Work Welsh Welcome on-line courses during 2020-21, a significant increase from the 11 courses had previously been completed.

b) Community Welsh for Adults courses

Several staff follow Welsh community courses, either in the evening or during the working day, with the council paying their registration fees.

26 members of staff have attended community courses during this academic year, enrolling through the Council, and with the council paying their fee.

c) Work Welsh 4* course

A new Work Welsh 4* course was introduced by the National Centre for Learning Welsh during the year. The course is an on-line self-study Welsh course at entry level, which includes 60 hours of independent learning for those who have enrolled, along with tutor support via virtual revision sessions, Q&A sessions and support via email, and provided an opportunity to use the level checker before and after the course. This course was also fully funded through the Work Welsh scheme.

Powys County Council secured spaces for its staff on a course to start in December 2020, and 47 employees enrolled and are currently following the course.

d) Other Learning Methods

Although members of Council staff had enrolled on residential courses scheduled for the early part of 2020-21, these courses were cancelled due to Covid restrictions.

v. Promotion Standards

Further work undertaken during the 2020-21 financial year to ensure compliance with the Promotion Standards and connected to Powys County Council's Welsh Language Promotion Strategy to extend the use and opportunities to use the Welsh language, and increase the number of Welsh speakers in Powys is outlined below.

Promoting Welsh Culture and Events

The Council took advantage of national events and initiatives such as Welsh Music Day to raise awareness and celebrate Welsh culture. For Welsh Music Day (Dydd Miwsig Cymru) the Council created a new playlist with music by artists from Powys or who have links to Powys, to promote on social media, along with a series of videos and recordings by artists from the area representing different musical *genres* to generate interest and raise awareness of Welsh language music from the county, as well as provide publicity for the national campaign and celebrations.

The Council also promoted the Welsh Language Rights day, sharing resources provided by the Welsh Language Commissioner on social media, to remind residents of their rights to receive services and information provided by the Council in Welsh, and encourage them to use the Welsh language in their interaction with the Council.

Messages were also posted on social media on key dates such as St Dwynwen's Day and St David's day to promote the Welsh language and culture.

Many of Menter Brycheiniog a Maesyfed's activities to promote the Welsh language and culture in south Powys have moved on-line and to social media during the year, due to the ongoing Covid restrictions. The Menter has been providing and supporting activities for people of all ages, and for fluent Welsh speakers and Welsh learners, which have included online singing and dancing sessions for the family with Martyn Geraint, Clog dancing fitness sessions with Tudur Philips, Mountain Biking Core Skills and Bike Maintenance sessions, Lego Club, local history videos with Geraint Roberts and even sessions on teaching Welsh to the dog. A Welsh Book Club is also held regularly.

Other activities have included a Teams session with 20 children from the area to compose a poem with renowned Welsh poet Mererid Hopwood, with Powys musician Cerys Havana also part of the

session to compose music to set the words to. A project was also undertaken with Brecon Male Voice Choir, poet Twm Morys and musician Rich Vaughan to compose a new Welsh language song for the choir.

The Welsh Whisperer was also commissioned to work with primary school children from the area to compose a song about the Royal Welsh Show, to mark the date it would normally have been held in Llanellwedd. The song, entitled 'Nôl i Faes y Sioe' (Back to the Showground) has now been recorded by the Welsh Whisperer, and performed for the 1st time on Heno on S4C. It is now available to be streamed on Spotify.

Menter Brycheiniog a Maesyfed also provided 'Podcast Takeover Tegwen', a Welsh rock music podcast with discussions about Welsh music, and songs played as part of the show. The podcast was very successful, with Tegwen since having taken part on shows on Radio Cymru.

Menter Brycheiniog a Maesyfed and Menter Maldwyn also took part in the Mentrau Iaith Cymru's Tafarn y Clo (The Lock Inn) initiative, with games, music and activities provided between 8 and 10 each Wednesday night during the summer by a different Menter Iaith each week, with people joining the sessions from all part of Wales.

Powys Education Developments

In April 2020, a 'Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys 2020-2030' was approved. The strategy outlines the reasons why change is needed, and sets out the Council's vision for education in Powys, which is that "all children and young people in Powys will experience a high-quality, inspiring education to help develop knowledge, skills and attributes that will enable them to become healthy, personally fulfilled, productive, socially responsible and globally engaged citizens of 21st century Wales". The document also sets "Welsh-medium provision that is accessible and provides a full curriculum in Welsh from Meithrin to age 19 and beyond" as one of the guiding principles for the Strategy.

The Strategy also includes 4 Strategic Aims, one of which is to 'Improve access to Welsh-medium provision across all key stages', with the aim of ensuring an increase in the number of children accessing Welsh-medium education. A work programme accompanies the strategy, which includes specific activities relating to Welsh-medium education, including moving schools along the language continuum, developing new provision and developing immersion opportunities.

To complement the Strategy for Transforming Education, the Council also published a vision for increasing the number of fully bilingual learners in Powys, in December 2020. The document outlines the Council's vision for building a bilingual future for Powys and its young people, by normalising Welsh-medium/bilingual education; working with partners to ensure Welsh early years provision is available to every child; supporting newcomers to Powys and those who have initially chosen education in accessing Welsh-medium provision; ensuring a network of Welsh-medium/bilingual primary provision in every locality across the county; and developing a mutually supportive network of secondary providers able to offer a full curriculum in Welsh at all key stages.

This vision document will form the basis for the contents of a detailed Welsh in Education Strategic Plan for 2022-2032 which will become the binding document to ensure well planned provision for increasing the opportunities for a growing number of children and young people in Powys to become fully bilingual.

Under the Strategy for Transforming Education’s aim to improve access to Welsh medium-education, the Council has also been consulting on proposals to develop Welsh-language provision at several schools within the county, with proposals due to be presented to the Council in 2021-22.

The Council has also developed a new section on it’s website, entitled ‘Destination bilingual: the benefits of choosing Welsh-medium education’ to promote and share information about Welsh-medium education in Powys. The webpages include information about the benefits of being bilingual; the bilingual journey from pre-birth to secondary school; testimonials and case studies from learners and parents; answers to common questions about Welsh-medium education; sources of useful information for parents; as well as links to the Council’s strategies above.

To complement the information on the website, the Council has also published a leaflet, under the same title, to promote Welsh-medium education within the county, and provide information about the options available to parents.

4. The Number of Employees with Welsh language skills at the end of the year

Powys County Council records staff Welsh language skills using competency levels from 0 to 5;

Competency level	Definition
0	Very little or no knowledge of Welsh.
1	I can pronounce Welsh personal and place-names correctly, and I can give and respond to basic greetings on the telephone or in person.

2	I can communicate routine tasks requiring a simple exchange of information on familiar topics and activities. I can handle very short social exchanges, even though I can't usually understand enough to keep the conversation going myself.
3	I can deal with most situations likely to arise whilst travelling in an area where the language is spoken. I can enter unprepared into conversation on topics that are familiar or pertinent to everyday life (e.g. family, hobbies, work).
4	I can interact with a degree of fluency and spontaneity that makes interaction with native speakers possible. I can take an active part in discussion in familiar contexts.
5	I can take part effortlessly in any conversation or discussion and have a good familiarity with idiomatic expressions and colloquialisms. I can express myself fluently and convey finer shades of meaning precisely.

Skills are recorded by self-assessment by the staff themselves, and the data is stored within the council's iTrent Human Resources site.

For new staff, who have joined the council since April 2017, the language skill level is transferred automatically from the record in their job application form. Staff who worked for the council before that date are required to access iTrent and record their language skill level directly within the system.

Employees can also update their skill levels as they learn and develop their Welsh language skills.

- Powys County Council now has language skills details for 83.5% of its staff. This is an increase of 8.7% on the 2020 figure (74.8%)
- 20.9% of Council staff have no Welsh language skills.
- 49% of staff can communicate routine tasks, can sustain a short social exchange, or can greet and pronounce names correctly as a minimum.
- 11% of staff have stated that they can deal with most situations likely to arise, can enter unprepared into conversations on familiar topics, or are fluent Welsh speakers.

Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence training, Dementia Awareness training, Manual Handling (People), Prevent course and Social Care Wales and NHS Carer Awareness training are all provided bilingually. However, these courses are provided by external providers through the NHS and Home Office e-learning portals, and reporting on these courses, including the language in which they were accessed is not currently available from the provider.

Further training is provided digitally through Netconsent, software which requires employees to read policies, complete surveys and undertake training before they can log in to their PCs. This is provided in Welsh or English automatically, depending on the language selected by each user when they first access Netconsent. User language choice data isn't stored within Netconsent software, and it is not therefore possible to report on the number and percentage of users accessing this training in Welsh.

Fewer courses were provided during 2020-21 due to the Council focussing on business critical activities, but Powys County Council does make arrangements for employees to access other training courses in Welsh when this is required. However, no requests for such training in Welsh was received in 2020-21.

6. The number of new posts and vacancies you advertised during the year that were categorised with different Welsh language skills requirements.

Under the council's Recruitment and Welsh Language Policy, which became operational on 1 April 2018, Welsh language skills are required for all posts which are advertised by the council, with the recruiting manager assessing and setting the appropriate level from 1 to 5. This is outlined in the job description and person specification for each post that is advertised.

During 2020-21, 681 posts were advertised by the council, including posts within the authority and posts within schools. The Welsh language skills required for these posts were as follows.

1. Purpose

1.1 Further to the decision made by Cabinet on the 26th January 2021, the Council has carried out consultation on the following proposal:

- To make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from dual-stream to Welsh-medium
- This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022

1.2 The purpose of this report is to inform Cabinet members of the responses received to the consultation and to determine whether or not to proceed with the statutory process to change the school's language category.

1.3 The report is supported by the following appendices:

2. Background

Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys

2.1 On the 14th April 2020, a new Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys was approved by the Leader via a delegated decision.

2.2 The Strategy was developed following extensive engagement with a range of stakeholders during two separate periods between October

2019 and March 2020. The Strategy sets out a new vision education in Powys, as follows:

'All children and young people in Powys will experience a high quality, inspiring education to help develop the knowledge, skills and attributes that will enable them to become healthy, personally fulfilled, economically productive, socially responsible and globally engaged citizens of 21st century Wales.'

2.3 The new strategy also sets out a number of guiding principles which will underpin the transformation of education in Powys. These are as follows:

- *A world class rural education system that has learner entitlement at its core*
- *Schools that are fully inclusive, with a culture of deep collaboration in order to improve learner outcomes and experience*
- *A broad choice and high quality of provision for 14 – 19 year old learners, that includes both academic and vocational provision, meeting the needs of all learners, communities and the Powys economy*
- *Welsh-medium provision that is accessible and provides a full curriculum in Welsh from Meithrin to age 19 and beyond Provision for learners with Special Educational Needs (SEN)/Additional Learning Needs (ALN) that is accessible as near to home as is practicably possible, with the appropriate specialist teaching, support and facilities that enables every learner to meet their potential*
- *A digitally-rich schools sector that enables all learners and staff to enhance their teaching and learning experience*
- *Community-focused schools that are the central point for multi-agency services to support children, young people, families and the community*
- *Early years provision that is designed to meet the needs of all children, mindful of their particular circumstances, language requirements or any special or additional learning needs*
- *Financially and environmentally sustainable schools*
- *The highest priority is given to staff wellbeing and professional development*

2.4 The new strategy sets out a number of Strategic Aims and Objectives, to shape the Council's work to transform the Powys education system over the coming years. One of the Strategic Aims of the Strategy is to *'improve Welsh-medium provision across all key stages.'* Within this aim, the Strategy sets out a Strategic Objective to *'Move schools along the language continuum'*.

- 2.5 On the 26th January 2021, the Council's Cabinet considered an options appraisal paper in respect of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and agreed to carry out consultation on the following:
- To make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from Bilingual (dual-stream) to Welsh-medium
 - This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022.

The Consultation Period

- 2.6 Consultation on the proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon commenced on the 25th February 2021 and ended on the 15th April 2021.
- 2.7 The consultation document was available on the Council's website throughout the consultation period. The document was also distributed to stakeholders as required by the School Organisation Code (2018). The consultation document that was issued is attached as Appendix A.
- 2.8 Consultees were asked to respond to the consultation by either completing the online consultation form, filling in a paper copy of the form and returning it to the Transforming Education Team, or by writing to the Transforming Education Team.
- 2.9 During the consultation period, virtual meetings were also held with the following:
- Staff of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon
 - Governors of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon
 - School council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

The minutes of these meetings are attached as Appendix C, and the issues raised in the meetings are included in the Consultation Report (Appendix B).

Consultation Responses

- 2.10 71 respondents completed the consultation response form which was included in the consultation document. This included paper copies as well as responses submitted using the online response form. In addition, 9 written responses were received from respondents including Estyn, by e-mail or post.
- 2.11 As well as responses from parents, pupils, staff and governors at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon and members of the local community, responses were received from the following organisations:

Trefeglwys Community Council

Llanidloes Town Council
Mudiad Meithrin
Rhieni Dros Addysg Gymraeg – RhAG

- 2.12 Estyn's response to the consultation is provided on page 18 of the Consultation Report (Appendix B).
- 2.13 The consultation response form asked respondents to answer a number of questions. The findings are provided in full on pages 5 to 8 of the Consultation Report (Appendix B).

Consultation Findings

- 2.14 As part of the consultation, a consultation response form was issued, which was completed by 71 respondents. 54.9 % of respondents indicated that they were associated with Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, 8.5% indicated that they were associated with another school and 33.8% of respondents indicated that they were not associated with any school.
- 2.15 Written comments were also received by e-mail and post. These comments, as well as issues raised by those completing the consultation response form and those raised in the consultation meetings, are listed in the Consultation Report (Appendix B) from page 25 onwards, along with the Council's response to these issues. The issues raised relate to the following headings:
1. General support for the proposal
 2. General disagreement with the proposal
 3. Impact on pupils

3 Advice

- 3.1 Based on the findings of the consultation, the advice of officers is that the Council should proceed with the proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon by publishing a Statutory Notice.
- 3.2 The reasons for this are outlined below:
 - i) To improve educational outcomes
 - Children would no longer be taught in small mixed age classes
 - There would be more pupils who are fluent and confident in using the Welsh and English language equally
 - ii) To improve educational provision
 - Opportunities to develop a broader curriculum to meet the needs of pupils
 - Having one language stream would make it easier to track and target the progress of pupils and their well-being
 - iii) To improve leadership and management
 - The school's management team could work more efficiently
 - iv) To improve efficiency in the delivery of education
 - Potential for the school to operate more efficiently through more efficient deployment of staff and resources
 - v) To increase the number of pupils accessing Welsh-medium education
 - More pupils would be fluent in both Welsh and English, therefore contributing to the Welsh Government's aim to achieve a million Welsh speakers by the year 2050.
- 3.3 It is anticipated that the Statutory Notice will be published in June 2021, and that a further report, summarising any objections received, will be considered by the Council's Cabinet in the autumn term 2021.
- 3.4 The target would be to implement the change on a phased basis, year by year, starting with Reception aged pupils in September 2022.

- 3.5 It must be noted that proceeding with the proposal to change the school's language category does not preclude that school from being a part of future reorganisation proposals.

4. Resource Implications

- 4.1 Based on the current formula, the formula funding requirement will reduce as a result of these proposals and it is estimated that changing the school's language category would eventually result in annual revenue savings to the Council of £122k per annum, once the school is fully single-stream. There would be no saving in the first year, and although there would be opportunities for savings as the phasing takes place, this would be dependent on pupil numbers.

It is not anticipated that there would be an impact on transport costs, and there would be no capital costs.

- 4.2 Implementation of the proposal would require involvement from a number of service areas, including staff from the Schools Service, HR and Finance.
- 4.3 The Head of Finance (Section 151 Officer) notes the content of the report and can support the recommendation.

5. Legal implications

- 5.1 Legal: The recommendation can be supported from a legal point of view.
- 5.2 The Head of Legal and Democratic Services (Monitoring Officer) has commented as follows: " I note the legal comment and have nothing to add to the report".

6. Comment from local member(s)

- 6.1 Cllr Phyl Davies: I hope that Cabinet will take account of all responses before making the decision and thank members of the community for the responses received.

7. Integrated Impact Assessment

- 7.1 An initial impact assessment was considered by Cabinet on the 26th January 2021.
- 7.2 In addition, a range of draft impact assessments were produced as part of the consultation documentation. These included an Integrated Impact Assessment, an Equalities Impact Assessment, a Community Impact Assessment and a Welsh Language Impact Assessment.

7.3 These draft impact assessments have been updated to reflect issues raised during the consultation period, and are attached in Appendix D.

8. **Recommendation**

- To receive the Consultation Report in respect of changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.
- To approve the publication of a statutory notice to make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon to Welsh-medium, on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022.


Powys County Council is consulting on a proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. The proposal is as follows:

- **To make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from dual-stream to Welsh-medium.**
- **This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022.**

1. BACKGROUND

Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon is a dual-stream primary school located in the village of Trefeglwys in North Powys. As well as serving the village of Trefeglwys and the surrounding villages, the school is the only Welsh-medium primary provider in the Llanidloes catchment area, therefore a significant number of pupils from the town of Llanidloes attend the school.

The following map shows the location of the school in the catchment:



Key: Purple – Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, Orange – Llanidloes C.P. School, Green – Llandinam C.P. School, Blue – Caersws C.P. School

The following is a summary of key data relating to Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon:

The very low number of English-medium pupils at the school causes a challenge to the school in providing appropriate provision for these learners. Pupils are taught in small classes, with a high number of year groups in each class.

The Council's Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys includes an aim to 'improve access to Welsh-medium provision across all key stages', as well as an objective to 'move schools along the language continuum'.

In order to meet these aims and objectives, the Council wishes to consult on a proposal to change Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's language category in order to address the small number of pupils accessing English-medium provision at the school. This would ensure that all pupils attending the school have the opportunity to become fluent in Welsh and English, therefore contributing to the Welsh Government's aspiration to achieve a million Welsh speakers by 2050.

The following steps have been undertaken:

- Discussions with representatives of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon
- Options appraisal exercise

- Options appraisal considered and agreed by the Transforming Education Programme Board
- Recommendation considered and agreed by Cabinet

The recommendation agreed by Cabinet on the 26th January 2021 was to commence consultation on the following:

'To make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from bilingual (dual-stream) to Welsh-medium

This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022.'

2. WHY CHANGE IS NEEDED IN POWYS

Powys is a large, rural authority. Covering a quarter of the landmass of Wales, it contains only 4.2% of the population, making it the most sparsely populated county in Wales. Delivering services across such a large, sparsely populated area is challenging and expensive.

Whilst there has been some school reorganisation activity in Powys over recent years, the county's schools' infrastructure largely remains similar to that which was in place 20 years ago.

The Council's new Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys outlines a number of challenges facing education in Powys, which were identified following engagement with key stakeholders during the autumn term 2019 and spring term 2020.

The following is a summary of the main challenges facing the Council:

i) High proportion of small schools

Based on PLASC 2019 figures, there were 33 small primary schools in Powys – this is approximately 40% of the primary provision in the county. 21 schools had fewer than 50 pupils, and for those schools the budget share per pupil is generally higher than the Powys average for primary schools.

ii) Decreasing pupil numbers

Pupil numbers have decreased over the past decade, and are expected to decrease further over the next five years. Pupil numbers in the primary sector in Powys are expected to decrease by approximately 4% by 2025.

iii) High number of surplus places

Based on PLASC 2019 figures, there was 18% surplus capacity in Powys primary schools. With pupil numbers across Powys projected to decrease overall over the coming years, the proportion of surplus places across the county will continue to increase.

iv) Building condition

Whilst the Council has invested in its school's estate through the 21st Century Schools Programme and the Asset Management Plan, building condition remains an issue across Powys, with associated maintenance costs.

v) Financial pressures

The Council is currently facing significant financial pressures in general. This is affecting all service areas, including the schools' sector. There are significant variations in the budget share per pupil across Powys schools, ranging from £3,127 to £7,877 in the primary sector.

vi) Inequality in access to Welsh-medium education

In contrast to other areas of Wales, there has been no growth in Welsh-medium pupil numbers in Powys over recent years. Significant changes are needed to the Welsh-medium offer in Powys to reverse the trend of the last few years and ensure that all Powys learners can access comprehensive Welsh-medium provision throughout their educational careers.

vii) Limited post-14 and post-16 offer

In September 2019, the Council's Cabinet considered a report on post-16 provision, which outlined a number of challenges facing the sector, including decreasing learner numbers, financial challenges and sustainability of the curriculum offer, including Welsh-medium provision.

viii) Inequality in access to SEN provision

Within Powys, pupils with special education needs (SEN) attend a range of settings, including special schools, specialist centres, the pupil referral unit (PRU) as well as mainstream schools.

Currently, not all pupils are educated in the setting that meets their needs best, and depending on where pupils live, they have access to a different quality and type of provision.

ix) Historical lack of political decision making

Although there have been some developments in terms of the schools' infrastructure over recent years, the Council's failure to implement a number of high-profile proposals in the last few years has left a legacy in Powys, and there has been a reluctance to embark on large scale reorganisation of education provision since then.

3. THE STRATEGIC CONTEXT

In the summer of 2019, Powys Education Services were inspected by Estyn. The report published by Estyn following the inspection outlined significant concerns regarding the Council's progress on school reorganisation, and includes a recommendation to 'Ensure that the organisation of provision for non-maintained, post-16, Welsh-medium education and secondary education meets the needs of children and young people of Powys.'

Following the publication of the inspection report, the Council carried out a strategic review of schools during 2019-20, which led to the development of a new Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys. The strategy, which was developed following engagement with a wide range of stakeholders, was approved in April 2020.

The strategy sets out a Vision Statement and Guiding Principles which will underpin the Council's work to transform the Powys education system over the coming years.

The Vision Statement is as follows:

All children and young people in Powys will experience a high-quality, inspiring education to help develop the knowledge, skills and attributes that will enable them to become healthy, personally fulfilled, economically productive, socially responsible and globally engaged citizens of 21st century Wales.

The Council's Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys includes an aim to 'improve access to Welsh-medium provision across all key stages', as well as an objective to 'move schools along the language continuum'.

In order to meet these aims and objectives, the Council is keen to explore options to move Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon along the language continuum. This would ensure that all pupils attending the school have the opportunity to become fluent in Welsh and English, therefore contributing to the Welsh Government's aspiration to achieve a million Welsh speakers by 2050.

4. WHY CHANGE IS NEEDED AT YSGOL DYFFRYN TRANNON

The number of English-medium pupils at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon has decreased over recent years. Current pupil numbers at the school are as follows:

The very low number of English-medium pupils at the school causes a challenge to the school in providing appropriate provision for these learners. Pupils are taught in small classes, with a high number of year groups in each class. There are currently no English-medium pupils in Reception or year 1.

The Council's Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys includes an aim to 'improve access to Welsh-medium provision across all key stages', as well as an objective to 'move schools along the language continuum'.

In order to meet these aims and objectives, the Council wishes to consult on a proposal to change Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's language category in order to address the small number of pupils accessing English-medium provision at the school. This would ensure that all pupils attending the school have the opportunity to become fluent in Welsh and English, therefore contributing to the Welsh Government's aspiration to achieve a million Welsh speakers by 2050.

5. THE BENEFITS OF BILINGUALISM

Between 60% and 75% of the world's population is bilingual, and international research has shown that there are many benefits associated with being bilingual. These include the following:

- Children exposed to different languages become more aware of different cultures, other people and other points of view
- Bilingual children tend to be better than monolinguals at 'multitasking' and focusing attention
- Generally, bilingual people find it easier to learn other languages
- Research suggests that learning another language can delay the onset of dementia

In Wales, being bilingual in Welsh and English brings further benefits when seeking employment, as employers are increasingly looking for people who are able to work in Welsh and English.

Welsh-medium education is the best way to ensure young people become fully bilingual in Welsh and English. Most pupils that access Welsh-medium education don't speak Welsh when they start school, however they are immersed in the Welsh language when they start in school, becoming fully bilingual, and able to communicate fluently in Welsh and English.

More information about bilingualism and Welsh-medium education is available at <https://gov.wales/cymraeg-education>.

6. OPTIONS CONSIDERED

The following options have been identified to address the challenges caused by the school's current dual-stream structure:

Option	Description
1	Status quo – Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon continues to operate as a dual-stream school
2	Change Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's language category to Welsh-medium
3	Change Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's language category to English-medium

SWOT analyses have been carried out for each of these options. In addition, the options have been assessed against a number of Critical Success Factors. These can be found in Appendix B of this document.

Based on the SWOT analyses and the assessment against the Critical Success Factors, the preferred option for Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon is as follows:

Option 2: Change Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's language category to Welsh-medium

The reasons for this are:

- Would enable the school to operate more efficiently as a single stream school
- All pupils at the school would study through the medium of Welsh and would develop bilingual skills
- Potential to increase the number of pupils studying through the medium of Welsh
- More opportunities could be offered through the medium of Welsh
- Improvement in pupils' Welsh language skills through improved Welsh ethos
- Would ensure that all pupils would be taught in appropriately sized year groups
- Small potential financial saving to the authority
- Meets all of the Critical Success Factors
- Supports the Council's objective to 'Move schools along the language continuum', as stated in the Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys

To minimise the impact on current pupils, it is recommended that the emerging preferred option would be implemented on a phased basis, with pupils currently accessing English-medium provision at the school being able to continue to do so until the end of year 6.

To take forward this preferred option, the Council is consulting on the following:

- To make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from dual stream to Welsh-medium
- This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022.

This proposal is further considered in the following section.

PART B – THE PROPOSAL

7. OVERVIEW

Powys County Council is consulting on a proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. The proposal is as follows:

- To make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from dual stream to Welsh-medium.
- This will be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022.

This would mean that:

- Welsh-medium provision would be phased in gradually year by year, starting with Reception in September 2022
- Eventually, all pupils at the school would attend Welsh-medium provision, ensuring that all pupils would be fluent in Welsh and English

8. REASONS FOR THE PROPOSAL

In addition to the strengths and opportunities identified in Appendix B, the Council is proposing to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon for the following reasons:

- To improve educational outcomes
 - Children would no longer be taught in small mixed age classes
 - There would be more pupils who are fluent and confident in using the Welsh and English language equally
- To improve educational provision
 - Opportunities to develop a broader curriculum to meet the needs of pupils
 - Having one language stream would make it easier to track and target the progress of pupils and their well-being
- To improve leadership and management
 - The school's management team could work more efficiently
- To improve efficiency in the delivery of education
 - Potential for the school to operate more efficiently through more efficient deployment of staff and resources
- To increase the number of pupils accessing Welsh-medium education

- More pupils would be fluent in both Welsh and English, therefore contributing to the Welsh Government’s aim to achieve a million Welsh speakers by the year 2050.

9. ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES

The advantages and disadvantages of the current proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon are summarised below:

PART C – LIKELY IMPACT OF THE PROPOSAL

12. IMPACT ON PUPILS

i) Pupils currently attending Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

Should the proposal be implemented, the change in the school's language category would be phased in gradually, starting with the Reception class in September 2022. All pupils currently accessing English-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon would be able to continue to access this provision until they leave school. Therefore, it is anticipated that the impact on pupils currently attending Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon would be minimal.

ii) Pupils currently attending other schools

It is not anticipated that implementation of the proposal would have any impact on pupils attending other primary schools in the area. Whilst it is possible that some pupils could choose to attend other English-medium schools in the local area instead of accessing Welsh-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, it is anticipated that the numbers would be relatively small, and therefore the impact on pupils at these schools would not be significant.

It is not anticipated that implementation of the proposal would have any impact on pupils attending secondary schools in the area.

13. IMPACT ON STAFF

The majority of staff at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon are able to work through the medium of Welsh. Whilst some staff are not able to work through the medium of Welsh, the phasing in of the new linguistic delivery model would provide an opportunity for these staff to improve and develop their own Welsh language skills.

14. IMPACT ON GOVERNANCE ARRANGEMENTS

Implementation of the proposal would not result in changes to governance arrangements at the school.

15. EARLY YEARS PROVISION

Early years provision is available on the school site at Cylch Meithrin Trannon, which offers Welsh-medium provision for pre-school aged children.

The proposal to change Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's language category would not impact on this provision.

16. IMPACT ON QUALITY AND STANDARDS IN EDUCATION

i) Standards, wellbeing and attitudes to learning

Standards and progress overall, of specific groups and in skills

The Council would expect changing Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's language category to have a positive impact on provision, standards and pupil progress overall. As the change is phased in, the Council would expect that implementation would lead to more effective and efficient use of resources as the school would no longer need to duplicate provision, which, in turn, would ensure improved opportunities for learners across all ages.

It is anticipated that changing the school's language category would have a positive impact on provision, standards and progress overall for all pupils, including pupils belonging to specific groups such as English as an Additional Language, eligible for Free School Meals, Looked After Children, Additional Learning Needs.

It is also anticipated that changing the school's language category would have a positive impact on the skills of all pupils, in particular Welsh language skills, as it would enable all pupils to become fully bilingual in Welsh and English. Operating as a single stream school would enable the school to target support across all phases of education more effectively.

Wellbeing and attitudes to learning

Changing the school's language category would mean that eventually, all pupils would receive a fully Welsh medium education. This would mean that all pupils would be taught together, ensuring improved cohesion across the school and impacting positively on pupil well-being.

ii) Teaching and learning experiences

Quality of teaching

The Council would expect that changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon would lead to improvements in the quality of teaching at the school, due to the improved Welsh medium professional development and collaboration opportunities that could be offered to staff, for example collaborating with other Welsh-medium schools within Powys and in other local authorities and educational regions to share best practice in pedagogy.

It could also enhance teachers' ability to build systematically on pupils' existing knowledge, understanding and skills and provide pupils with a suitably wide range of experiences to develop their interest and literacy skills across a range of subjects and areas of learning.

The breadth, balance and appropriateness of the curriculum

It is anticipated that changing the school's language category would have a positive impact on the breadth, balance and appropriateness of the curriculum at the school. Should this be implemented, the school would be

able to focus on delivering in one language medium, which should have a positive impact on the curriculum that could be provided, ensuring that the curriculum meets the requirements of the new curriculum for Wales, as outlined in 'Our National Mission'.

The provision of skills

It is anticipated that changing the school's language category would have a positive impact on the literacy skills of all pupils, through improved opportunities to share staff expertise and resources across all age ranges, and through the ability to target across all phases of education.

In particular, the change would have a positive impact on Welsh language skills, as all pupils would be taught through the medium of Welsh, enabling all pupils to become bilingual in Welsh and English. The change would also enable the school to enhance Welsh language skills in formal teaching activities and in informal situations.

iii) Care support and guidance

Operating as a single stream school would enable the school to improve its tracking and monitoring of pupils.

The Council would expect that changing the school's language category would enable the school to further enhance its provision to prepare pupils, including those with special educational needs, to become active citizens, for example by making decisions about the life and work of the school.

It would also support how well the school's provision helps pupils to develop their understanding of the Welsh language and culture, the local community and the wider world.

iv) Leadership and management

Quality and effectiveness of leaders and managers, self-evaluation processes and improvement planning

It is anticipated that changing the school's language category would lead to improvements in terms of leadership and management at the school. The proposed change would help the school to establish a clear, strategic rationale for the curriculum in terms of its benefits for pupils in preparing them to learn throughout their lives and to play a full part in society. It would also support the extent to which leaders and managers are purposeful and successful in meeting the national priority of providing purposeful opportunities for pupils to develop their Welsh language skills in formal and informal situations.

Operating as a single stream school would enable the school to operate more efficiently, and leaders and managers would have more time to focus on developing effective provision across the school.

Professional learning

Changing the school's language category could provide improved professional learning opportunities for staff through greater opportunities for collaboration with other Welsh-medium schools across Wales.

Use of resources

Should the change be implemented, the school would eventually become a single stream Welsh-medium school and would be funded as such. As a Welsh-medium school, the school would be able to operate more efficiently, as there would be no need to duplicate provision.

v) Impact on vulnerable groups, including children with Special Educational Needs (SEN)

It is noted that should the school move along the language continuum, there could be a negative impact on pupils with ALN who are from families where very little or no Welsh is spoken. This would require the school to provide an enhanced level of support to these pupils in order to meet their needs.

vi) Ability of the school/schools which are the subject of the proposals to deliver the full curriculum at the foundation phase and each key stage of education, including the quality of curriculum delivery and the extent to which the structure or size of the school is impacting on this

It is anticipated that changing the school's language category would have a positive impact on the ability to deliver the full curriculum in the foundation phase and each key stage of education, as there would no longer be a requirement to duplicate provision in two streams.

It is possible that there could be some challenges during the transition period as the school would need to accommodate decreasing numbers of English-medium pupils, however should the change to the school's language category be implemented, the Council would continue to support the school throughout the transition period to ensure that an appropriate curriculum is provided to all pupils.

vii) Impact on the school's ability to deliver the full curriculum in the foundation stage and each key stage, including the quality of curriculum delivery and the extent to which the structure or size of the school is impacting on this

It is anticipated that changing the school's language category would have a positive impact on the ability to deliver the full curriculum in the foundation

phase and each key stage of education, as there would no longer be a requirement to duplicate provision in two streams.

It is possible that there could be some challenges during the transition period as the school would need to accommodate decreasing numbers of English-medium pupils, however should the change to the school's language category be implemented, the Council would continue to support the school throughout the transition period to ensure that an appropriate curriculum is provided to pupils in all key stages.

viii) Impact on other schools

It is not anticipated that implementation of the proposal would have a significant impact on other schools. It is possible that some pupils may choose to access alternative English-medium providers instead of accessing Welsh-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, therefore it is possible that there would be an increase in pupil numbers at these schools. However the numbers are likely to be relatively small therefore it is not anticipated that the impact would be significant.

17. NEED FOR PLACES AND IMPACT ON AVAILABILITY OF PLACES AND ACCESSIBILITY OF SCHOOLS

i) Will the alternative provision have sufficient capacity and provide accommodation of at least equivalent quality for existing and projected pupil numbers?

It is not anticipated that the preferred option would impact on the school's capacity or projected pupil numbers.

It is possible that changing the school's language category could have some impact on pupil numbers, should pupils from the local area choose to attend alternative English-medium providers. However, it is also possible that changing the school's language category could lead to an increase in pupil numbers, as more pupils could choose to attend the school to access Welsh-medium provision.

ii) Is the alternative provision sufficient to meet existing and projected demand for schools of the same language category and (if relevant) designated religious character?

There is sufficient provision to meet existing and projected demand for Welsh-medium provision. For pupils wishing to access English-medium provision, there is alternative English-medium provision available in the catchment area at Llanidloes C.P. School, Caersws C.P. School and Llandinam C.P. School.

The school does not have a religious character – this would continue to be the case following any change to the language category.

iii) What will be the nature of journeys to alternative provision and resulting journey times for pupils including SEN pupils?

The plan to introduce the proposed change to the school's language category on a phased basis would mean that all current pupils at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon would continue to be able to access the school, therefore there would be no impact on journeys to school or journey times for any pupils.

In the future, should pupils choose to attend English-medium provision in other locations instead of accessing Welsh-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, there would be an increase in journeys / journey times in order to access this provision. However there are three other English-medium schools in the Llanidloes catchment. Two of these are located within around 5 miles of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, therefore journeys / journey times to alternative English-medium provision would not be excessive.

iv) Is there evidence of current or future need/demand in the area for additional places?

The latest pupil projection figures received by the Council suggest that there will be a small decrease in pupil numbers at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon over the coming years. However, were there to be an increase in pupil numbers in the future, there is sufficient capacity within the school to accommodate an increase in pupil numbers.

There has been a decrease in demand for English-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon over recent years – there are currently no English-medium pupils at the school in Reception or Year 1.

v) Will the proposals improve access for disabled pupils in accordance with requirements under the Equality Act 2010?

Any change to the school's language category would not impact on access for disabled pupils in accordance with the requirements of the Equality Act 2010.

18. RESOURCING OF EDUCATION AND OTHER FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

i) What effect will the proposals have on surplus places in the area?

The intention is to introduce the change on a phased basis starting with the Reception year group and moving through the school each year as pupils move through the school. The intention is that all current pupils would continue to attend the school, therefore there would be no impact on surplus places.

It is possible that changing the school's language category could have some impact on pupil numbers, should pupils from the local area choose to attend alternative English-medium providers. However, it is also possible that

changing the school's language category could lead to an increase in pupil numbers, as more pupils could choose to attend the school to access Welsh-medium provision.

- ii) Do the proposals form part of the local authority's 21st Century Schools Investment Programme and contribute to the delivery of sustainable schools for the 21st Century and to the better strategic management of the school estate?**

The current plans in respect of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's language category are not part of the local authority's 21st Century Schools Investment Programme.

- iii) What are the recurrent costs of proposals over a period of at least 3 years and is the necessary recurrent funding available?**

There are no recurrent costs associated with changing the school's language category.

- iv) Will additional transport costs be incurred as a result of the proposal?**

The intention is to introduce the change to the school's language category on a phased basis as pupils move through the school. It is not anticipated that additional transport costs would be incurred as a result of the change.

- v) What are the capital costs of the proposal and is the necessary capital funding is available?**

There are no capital costs associated with changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.

- vi) What is the scale of any projected net savings (taking into account school revenue, transport and capital costs)**

It is estimated that changing the school's language category would result in annual revenue savings to the Council of approximately £122k per annum, once the school is fully single-stream.

There would be no saving in the first year, and although there would be opportunities for savings as the phasing takes place, this would be dependent on pupil numbers.

It is not anticipated that there would be an impact on transport costs, and there would be no capital costs.

- vii) Without the proposals, would the schools affected face budget deficits?**

Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon is currently projecting to be in a deficit budget position by 2022/23.

viii) Will any savings in recurrent costs be retained in the local authority's local schools budget?

Any savings would be reinvested in the Council's corporate budget and any reinvestment in the schools' system would be agreed as part of the annual budget planning cycle.

ix) Will the proceeds of sales (capital receipts) of redundant sites be made available to meet the costs of the proposal or contribute to the costs of future proposals which will promote effective management of school places?

Changing Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's language category would not result in any capital receipts.

x) What impact will the proposals have on educational attainment among children from economically deprived backgrounds?

There would be a positive impact on educational attainment among children from economically deprived backgrounds, as they would be able to participate in a fully bilingual curriculum from the beginning of their education.

In the future, any pupils in the Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon catchment who wish to attend English-medium provision would need to attend alternative provision, which would have an impact on travel. However, the Council would hope that all pupils living in the catchment area of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon would attend Welsh-medium provision at the school.

xi) Any equality issues, including those identified through equality impact assessments

Supporting the school to move along the language continuum would have an impact on pupils belonging to the protected characteristic groups, however in the majority of cases, it is not anticipated that this would be a negative impact.

It is acknowledged that there may be concern about the impact of changing the school's language category on pupils with additional learning needs, however, the school would need to provide intensive and specialist support to these pupils to ensure that they weren't disadvantaged.

Should the Council proceed with the statutory process in respect of the preferred option, equality impact assessments will be carried out and regularly reviewed throughout the process to ensure that any issues are identified and fully considered.

- xii) **Whether the school / schools involved are subject to any trust or charitable interests which might be affected by the proposals, for example in relation to the use or disposal of land.**

Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon is not subject to any trust or charitable interests which might be affected by the plans to change the school's language category.

19. FACTORS TO BE CONSIDERED IN RESPECT OF PROPOSALS TO CHANGE LANGUAGE MEDIUM

- i) **The extent to which existing provision by the local authority of education in the medium of English and/or Welsh exceeds or falls short of demand or projected demand from parents for that type of provision, and the contribution the proposal would make to remedying that situation**

There is currently no dedicated Welsh-medium primary provision in the Llanidloes catchment. Implementing the proposed change to the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon would ensure that this type of provision was available.

Implementing the proposed change would mean that education through the medium of English would no longer be available in the village of Trefeglwys. However the trend in Trefeglwys has been an increase in demand for Welsh-medium provision, therefore the proposed change reflects this. The proposed change would also ensure that all pupils attending Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon would be fully bilingual, therefore contributing to the Welsh Government's aim to achieve a million Welsh speakers by 2050.

Should pupils not want to access Welsh-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, there are other English-medium providers available in the Llanidloes catchment.

- ii) **The extent to which the proposal would support the targets in the local authority's Welsh in Education Strategic Plan (WESP)**

Changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon would support the local authority to meet the targets in its Welsh in Education Strategic Plan. The Council's current WESP states that the Council 'acknowledges that designated Welsh-medium schools are the preferred model of delivery for Welsh-medium education', and includes an objective 'To establish and identify opportunities to establish new designated Welsh-medium provision in the primary sector'. The current proposal for Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon is in line with this.

In addition, the Council has recently approved a new Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys, which includes an aim to 'Improve access to Welsh-medium provision across all key stages', and an objective to 'Move schools along the language continuum'. The current proposal for Ysgol

Dyffryn Trannon is in-line with aims and objectives.

20. EQUALITY, COMMUNITY AND WELSH LANGUAGE IMPACT ASSESSMENTS

Draft impact assessments have been carried out in respect of the proposal. These will be updated following the consultation period to reflect any additional issues raised. The assessments are available on the Council's website:

A summary of the assessments are provided below:

i) Equalities impact assessment

Should the proposal be implemented, the medium of instruction of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon would change to Welsh-medium. This would be phased in, year on year, starting with Reception pupils. There would be no impact on existing pupils.

The proposal aims to improve the educational opportunities offered to all pupils in the Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon catchment, including pupils that belong to the protected characteristic groups.

It is noted that there could be concern about the impact of the proposal to change the school's language category to Welsh-medium on any pupils with additional learning needs attending the school in the future. To mitigate this concern, the school may need to provide enhanced support to pupils with ALN as needed in order to meet their needs. The consultation period will provide an opportunity for any concerns about the impact on pupils with ALN to be raised, and these will be considered as the process moves forward.

ii) Impact on the community

The proposal only proposes changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, therefore it is anticipated that the proposal's impact on the community would be minimal. Primary provision would continue to be available in Trefeglwys, and community facilities associated with the school would continue to be available.

It is acknowledged that the proposal would eventually lead to additional travel for any pupils wishing to access English-medium education. However by phasing in the change in language category over a number of years, the intention is that all pupils in the school's catchment area would access Welsh-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, therefore the number of affected pupils would be small. Should pupils wish to access English-medium provision instead of accessing Welsh-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, there are three English-medium schools within 8 miles of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, therefore the additional travel time / distance involved would not be significant.

iii) Impact on the Welsh language

Implementation of the proposal would have a positive impact on the Welsh language, as in time, it would ensure that all pupils in the Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon catchment area would access Welsh-medium education, and would become fully bilingual in Welsh and English, leading to an increase in the number of pupils able to use the Welsh language confidently, and contributing to the Welsh Government's Strategy to achieve a million Welsh speakers by 2050.

Consultation with pupils will take place in accordance with the Welsh children and young people's national participation standards².

The consultation period

The consultation period will commence on the 25 February 2021 and will end on the 15 April 2021.

The statutory process

Consultation on this proposal will follow the guidelines set out by the Welsh Government in the revised School Organisation Code which became operational on the 1st November 2018. The process is summarised below:

i) Consultation

Consultation will start on the 25 February 2021 and will end on the 15 April 2021. Feedback from the consultation will be collated and summarised, and a consultation report will be produced and shared with stakeholders.

It is important to note that responses made to the consultation will not be counted as objections to the proposal, and that only objections can be registered following publication of a statutory notice.

The Council's Cabinet will consider the consultation report and the feedback received during the consultation period, and will decide whether to proceed with the proposal, to make changes to the proposal, or to not proceed with the proposal. If the Cabinet decides not to proceed, that will be the end of this proposal.

It is anticipated that the Consultation Report will be considered by the Cabinet in the summer of 2021.

ii) Statutory notice

If the Cabinet decides to proceed with the proposal, statutory notices would be published after the Cabinet meeting. There would then be a period of 28 days for people to submit written objections.

If there were objections, the Council would publish an objection report providing a summary of the objections and the Council's response to them before the end of 7 days beginning with the day of the local authority's determination. Only written objections submitted during the statutory notice period will be considered as objections and included in this report. Comments submitted as part of the consultation period would not be counted as objections. Should stakeholders wish their consultation responses to be considered as objections, they would need to be re-submitted in writing during the statutory notice period.

A further report would be presented to the Council's Cabinet, which they would consider alongside the objection report, in order to decide whether or not to approve the proposal.

It is anticipated that a final decision would be made by the end of September 2021.

iii) Implementation

If the Council's Cabinet were to approve the proposal, it would be implemented in accordance with the date given in the statutory notice or any subsequently modified date.

2. PAM MAE ANGEN NEWID YM MHOWYS

Mae Powys yn awdurdod gwledig mawr. Mae'n cwmpasu chwarter o dirwedd Cymru, mae'n cynnwys 4.2% o'r boblogaeth yn unig, sy'n golygu mai hon yw'r sir â'r boblogaeth fwyaf gwasgaredig yng Nghymru. Mae darparu gwasanaethau ar draws ardal mor fawr â phoblogaeth mor wasgaredig yn heriol ac yn ddrud.

viii) Anghydraddoldeb o ran y gallu i gael darpariaeth AAA

Ym Mhowys, mae disgyblion ag anghenion addysgol arbennig (AAA) yn mynychu amrywiaeth o leoliadau, gan gynnwys ysgolion arbennig, canolfannau arbenigol, yr uned cyfeirio disgyblion (UCD) yn ogystal ag ysgolion prif ffrwd.

Consultation on changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

1. OVERVIEW OF THE CONSULTATION

Powys County Council consulted on a proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. The proposal was as follows:

- To make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon to Welsh-medium
- This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022

The consultation took place from the 25th February 2021 to the 15th April 2021.

i) Consultation methods

The consultation documentation was available on the Council's website throughout the consultation period, and was distributed to stakeholders, as required by the School Organisation Code (2018). A separate version for pupils was also available on the Council's website throughout the consultation period.

Consultees were invited to respond to the consultation by either completing an online consultation form, filling in a paper copy of the form and returning it to the Transforming Education Team at County Hall, or by e-mailing / writing to the Transforming Education Team.

Meetings were held virtually with the following:

- Staff of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon – 23 March 2021
- Governors of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon – 23 March 2021
- Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon School Council – 24 March 2021

ii) Responses received

A total of 71 respondents completed the consultation response form which was included in the consultation document. This included paper copies as well as responses submitted using the online response form.

In addition, 9 written responses were received from respondents, including Estyn. The response received from Estyn is provided on page 18, in-line with the requirements of the School Organisation Code.

3. CONSULTATION WITH PUPILS

Comments received from pupils are outlined below. This includes the notes of a meeting held with pupils at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, as well as a summary of the written responses received from pupils to the consultation exercise.

i) A virtual meeting with the School Council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

Officers from the local authority met with the School Council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon to get their views on the proposal.

The notes of these meetings are provided below:

A meeting with the School Council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

24th March 2021 – Held virtually on Microsoft Teams

Present: Marianne Evans, Sarah Astley, Huw Rowlands – Powys County Council

Officers from Powys County Council met virtually via Microsoft Teams with representatives from the School Council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trann to discuss the consultation to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from dual-stream to Welsh-medium.

The session was held with two different groups of pupils from the school council, one group representing the English stream and the other representing the Welsh stream.

English stream group

The group consisted of one pupil in year 6 and one in pupil in year 4.

Officers explained the proposals for changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and that they would like to have the views of the pupils on the proposal. The pupils understood that if the change was implemented, it would mean that there would be no English stream in Dyffryn Trannon, and all classes would be taught through the medium of Welsh. This would be phased over time and the proposal would therefore have no effect on existing pupils.

The pupils were asked several questions and their responses are summarised below:

What do you like about the two streams in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon?

- Having two streams is very unique as there are not many bilingual schools

- I like being in a school with Welsh-medium pupils. I like things how they are.

What do you not like about the two streams in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon?

- Nothing really. I like things as they are.

If things were to change, and the English medium provision was phased out of the school, what do you think about that? Do you have any concerns or questions about that?

- Over the last couple of years, numbers in the English stream have increased, as we have gained five pupils from the Welsh stream, and one from another school in Powys. There are now fifteen pupils in my class, but in September, when pupils go to high school, there will only be ten.

How many years do you have in your class and do you think that works well??

- Year 6, 5, 4, 3 and year 2. It can be a bit of a struggle, but it's working really well as we're all great friends and we're independent as well.

Do you mix with children of the Welsh stream, for example at playtime?

- Because of the pandemic, we now have our own bubbles. But before, we had lots of friends in the Welsh stream, even though they were in different classes.

If the proposal goes ahead, what do you think the effect of any change would be?

- I think that we have the best of both worlds at the moment, as we can speak English but also learn Welsh as well.

Any other comments?

- I don't think that enough people know of the English stream at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. We are going to make posters and leaflets to let people know about the English stream at Dyffryn Trannon. I would like more children in my class.

Welsh stream pupils

The group consisted of six pupils, years, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6.

Officers explained the proposals for changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and that they would like to have the views of the pupils on

the proposal. The pupils understood that if the change was implemented, it would mean that there would be no English stream in Dyffryn Trannon, and all classes would be taught through the medium of Welsh. This would be phased over time and the proposal would therefore have no effect on existing pupils.

The pupils were asked several questions and their responses are summarised below:

Questions asked to pupils

What do you think of the dual-stream system? Is it good or bad?

- There are not many pupils in the English stream – there are far more in the Welsh stream. Children in the Welsh stream can speak both languages

Before you had to form bubbles, were the children of the Welsh and English stream mixing?

- Not really, no, only a little. Welsh stream pupils tend to play with Welsh stream pupils and English stream pupils tend to play with English stream pupils

Do you think that it would be better if Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon only had a Welsh stream?

- I'm not sure. There are not many pupils in the English stream, but they might go to other schools where they are only taught in English
- It would be good just to have one stream, as then everybody would be able to speak Welsh, and more Welsh would be spoken at home

Do you think that there will be a problem if a new family which doesn't speak Welsh moves to the area, and Welsh is the only language of the school?

- Yes, it could be a problem, maybe children would go to other schools, further away than where they live.

Questions pupils asked

I would like to know if children will have to speak Welsh all the time if the school's language category was changed.

- If the school's language category was changed, Welsh will be the school's language and you would speak Welsh as you do now.

Why are you considering this change?

- Because Powys County Council are concerned that there aren't enough children in the English stream at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and no children whatsoever in the lower classes of the school, and the Council thinks that the school could be run better with only one language.

Will the English stream teacher have the opportunity to learn Welsh?

- Yes, every opportunity and support will be given for the English stream teacher to learn Welsh, if she so wishes

What will happen to the English stream teacher?

- She will stay, because the English stream will still be here for some years, and she will have the opportunity to learn Welsh.

But when the English stream has ended, will she still have a job?

- That is something which will have to be considered at a later time, if this proposal goes forward.

Why do pupils not go to schools in England if they want to be taught in English?

- In Wales, there are two languages, Welsh and English, and both are the official languages of Wales. There are English schools in the area, such as in Caersws, Llandinam and Llanidloes primary. Dyffryn Trannon is the only school in the area which teaches in Welsh.

Why can't the children themselves choose whether they want to attend the English stream or the Welsh stream?

- It was explained that Powys County Council were worried that pupil numbers in the English stream were very small, and because most pupils were in the Welsh stream, it might be better for the school to be just a Welsh-medium school, as the school could be better run with only one language. However, we are here to listen to what everyone has to say, as we haven't yet made a final decision.

Pupils and the school were thanked for their time in attending the meeting and providing their views.

ii) **Summary of other comments made by pupils**

In addition to the meeting with the School Council, 1 online responses and 0 written responses were received from pupils. Here is a summary of the issues raised in these responses:

- If people want to go to Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon and they are from England they won't understand Welsh as good as other people would and so they would have to go to the English and so they would live in Trefeglwys but have to go to another school.
- It is a lot easier to read with Mum and Dad in English than Welsh because their Welsh is rubbish but they tried hard. Lockdown has been easier because I am in the English class. People in the Welsh class their parents probably didn't understand as much Welsh and so if the English class shuts they will have to move school or just keep going with the same Welsh even if they don't understand.
- I enjoy going to Urdd club and doing Urdd activities since I moved into the English class. I go to DM Pro and after school club and Urdd club where I see more of my other friends from the Welsh class.
- If people have to get buses to go home it is more tricky for them to go to clubs.
- I like working with older pupils in the class, it helps me with hard stuff. I like helping the younger people. It is much easier to show Miss my work in the English class and there are not so many people shouting across the room to another person.
- Don't shut down the English class as younger siblings won't be able to go to the school.
- We could make posters and hang them around places to tell people the English stream is important and know there is an English stream in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.
- If the English class shuts and pupils have to go to another school it would be harder for them to do after school things.
- Why are the questions on this form so hard to understand? There is good presentation for kids but no kids form to fill in.

4. CONSULTATION MEETINGS WITH STAFF AND GOVERNORS

Consultation meetings were held with the staff and governors of both schools.

The issues raised at these meetings are summarised below:

i) Consultation meeting with Staff of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

- Will there be a meeting for parents as part of the consultation?
- How are responses recorded – are names recorded?
- Will the finance currently provided to Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon as a dual-stream school remain the same if the school is a Welsh stream school?
- If the proposal goes ahead, and if for example there is only one pupil in the English stream, would there be a commitment from the authority that the pupil will be funded?
- Would children from Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's Welsh stream be feeding Ysgol Bro Hyddgen or Llanidloes High School?
- Would transport be arranged if pupils wished to attend the secondary provision at Ysgol Bro Hyddgen?
- Will Llanidloes High-School continue to be a dual-stream school if this proposal goes forward?
- As a result of changes to Powys Admissions Policy, only Dyffryn Trannon pupils will be transferring to the Welsh stream at Llanidloes in the future, and they will not have the opportunity to mix with other children and make new friends with other children in the community.
- If parents decide that their children should have English-medium education, what school would they attend, and would they have transport provided?
- Pupils currently in the English stream have the uncertainty of not knowing for how long they will be together.
- Pupils in an English stream in a dual-stream school have the opportunity to mix with pupils in the Welsh stream, and therefore have the opportunity to improve their Welsh. I am concerned that if pupils move to an English-medium school, they will not have this opportunity.
- A lot of changes will be made by the new Welsh curriculum, and as people move into the area, they will have the opportunity to see that Welsh isn't just in the classroom, but it is in the corridor, a living language, and they will be able to blend into the community and it is a positive change happening in Wales.
- After lockdown and all the home learning, you have Welsh learners in homes where there are non-Welsh speaking parents. How sure are you that if you do go forward with the transformation, these families will want to stay in a Welsh stream school because it might have raised the question for some families that at the end of the foundation phase, it would be better for them to go into the English stream? Will you be looking at definite numbers to know how many children in the next stage

of the foundation phase will be wanting to go into the Welsh stream? Otherwise they will be leaving to go to other schools in the catchment area, when we know a school like Llanidloes have large class sizes already.

- There is chatter between parents whose children are due to start with us in Reception this year. They are nervous because they were choosing Trefeglwys because of the safety net of the English stream should the Welsh stream not work out for them. We could lose those children altogether if parents do not feel their children will have that safety net. I don't know what the answer is, but I know they are anxious and a few of them are re-thinking their options.
- There are still a few children in the English stream class who have moved out of the Welsh stream classes as they cannot keep up with it. What is the back-up plan for those children, as there could be many more and what will the provision be for those?
- A pupil has already left Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon because of the consultation. They were afraid of the outcome of the consultation. I feel that the village will be split. You have so many coming in by bus to the school and you will find the children being bussed out of the village as well.
- If we were a Welsh-medium school then we could encourage people to speak Welsh on the playground and in the corridors, and their Welsh language ability would be much better. At the moment, being a dual-stream, it is difficult to encourage children to speak Welsh when they are playing with children who are non-Welsh speaking. If it was all in Welsh, they would be immersed in Welsh and would pick it up a lot easier.
- Staffing in a Welsh-medium school is difficult. Do Powys have a scheme where we can recruit Welsh speaking staff to come to the school? We find it difficult to find Welsh language staff as there are very few in the area, so what can the Council do in relation to this?

ii) Consultation meeting with Governors of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

- There is a question regarding the finance of the school going forward and the continuity of education.
- What is the long-term plan when children reach 11 in terms of the local provision.
- There is a fear for the school that if there is nowhere for the pupils to move on to when 11, the concern is that parents would vote with their feet, with the school diminishing in size as a consequence. People need to see a strategy in place.
- The provision in Machynlleth is too far, and I don't think parents would choose to send their children there.
- What are the numbers required to make the English stream viable?
- I like the concept of a dual-stream school, although I appreciate that there are challenges because the numbers never add up and they will

never add up. It strikes me that this is the beginning of the end for the dual-stream schools concept if this proposal goes forward. Are you saying that dual-stream schools have no future full stop?

- There is a more transient nature to population these days. Trefeglwys village is growing, and it is possible that the outlook of some parents will be short term. They might see themselves moving elsewhere in a few years and therefore Welsh language provision might not be attractive to them. I am therefore concerned that we will see many parents sending their children out of Trefeglwys to their nearest English-medium school.
- What language category will YDT be if the proposal goes forward under the proposed Welsh Government new language categories?
- The concern is unless the secondary option is strong, the school would not necessarily go under, but that could weaken the school from the point of view of parents.
- What are the numbers in Caersws and Llandinam?
- If a Welsh-medium stream was introduced in Llanidloes, and the children who travel in by bus from Llanidloes end up going to Llanidloes instead, what effect will that have on the school?
- The school has a unique selling point being dual-stream, it just needs to be promoted better. Many people don't understand what dual-stream means. We could expand the promotion of the English stream, and COVID hasn't helped. Maybe we could pause the consultation process for the promotion to have time to work. It needs time for the promotion of the English stream to work. The past 12 months have made it difficult.
- Both my daughters attend the English stream and both can speak Welsh. I don't see the system broken, it just needs enhancing. It has been said that this proposal is not about saving money, but I think it is because you're funding two schools and can see a way to save money because of the decline of the English. We need to keep what we've got and just do it better.
- The decline of the promotion of the dual-stream has happened over a number of years. Had the dual-stream been actively promoted we wouldn't be having this conversation now.
- Let's maintain what we have, which is unique to any other school in the area.
- In the past the language in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon was 50/50 split. The school has seen a sustained level of uptake in the Welsh language, despite the fact that we don't have the secondary provision we should have.
- Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon needs to be a future part of the estate in Powys – a stream in Llanidloes could take half of the pupils we have in Trefeglwys.
- I was pleased and relieved to see the commitment from Powys that all current English stream pupils will continue to be able to be taught in the English stream.

- What level of assurance can Powys can give about the continuity of English provision should the proposal be implemented, as the numbers may taper off in the English stream.
- What were the drivers for Dyffryn Trannon being selected for this process at this time, when there are other dual-stream schools or small schools?
- What consideration was given for the consultation to be undertaken on a cluster basis so that we could see better how the pieces of the jigsaw for the cluster fitted together because many of the queries we have had tonight relate to unknown quantities because the picture for the cluster as a whole was unclear.
- Why is Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon being consulted for change when Transforming Education talked about the future of small schools as well as dual-stream schools. Why are we not looking at other schools in the cluster? All the other schools in the cluster are small schools which would potentially realise similar if not greater financial savings than Dyffryn Trannon, then why are you not moving those schools along the language continuum, as all the other schools in the cluster are English-medium.
- What method is the local authority using for those with low or no literacy ability to ensure that they are able to contribute to the consultation?
- The Integrated Impact Assessment refers to activities should the school move along the language continuum, such as enhanced Urdd participation and Menter Maldwyn, all of which are already in place. I just wonder if the Integrated Impact Assessment will be revised further in the process, to reflect the reality of the situation as I don't feel it currently reflects the extent of the extra-curricular and Welsh cultural language activities taking place at the school.
- Will it be possible for Welsh stream pupils to transfer to the English stream after September 2022 should they wish to do so?
- What consideration has Powys given to the potential detrimental impact on recruiting pupils to the Welsh stream by not having a dual-stream site which gives parents the flexibility of moving to the English stream if things don't work out?
- The School Organisation Code on page 9 stipulates that projected transport costs needs to be included and I'm interested in CO2 emissions. None has been included in the Integrated Impact Assessment. Will it be included?
- There are some pupils in this village which if the proposal goes ahead will need to be bussed to alternative provision. There will be data available to make a reasonable assumption as to projected transport costs to make the Impact Assessment a more balanced document.
- We need to embrace this as a positive going forward. The parents have chosen to send their pupils to the Welsh stream.
- We need more detail to make an informed decision.

- I have no doubt that a dual-stream is very beneficial to the pupils' experience.
- I have long term concerns that the numbers of pupils coming to Welsh-medium would plummet.
- There is no evidence of any proactive justification for YDT's proposed change of status – no strategic context i.e. the case made for change appears to be YDT in isolation with no real strategy evident.
- All the reasons cited in support of the proposal could be questioned – the disadvantages listed are fewer in number but potentially have a bigger impact – the risks are understated. Reference is made to impact on other schools but what about the impact on YDT of decisions taken by other schools? – evidence of current / future need or demand appears to ignore the current building work going on and expansion of the village – it is claimed that the impact of the proposal on the community would be minimal but it could well be extremely divisive if we see the children from the village being transported to Llanidloes for their education.
- In approx 2005, the language balance was almost a mirror image of where we have been in the last 5 years or so – admittedly not quite as extreme as the current position but indicative, nevertheless, of an often highly unpredictable issue.
- What is the PCC methodology for reviewing and presenting responses to Cabinet?
- What lessons learned have been considered from elsewhere in Powys or further afield on ALN impact, what is the evidence base to show outcomes ALN pupils taught through a language that may not be spoken at home are comparable to the outcomes of pupils taught in their first language?

5. ESTYN

Estyn's response to the consultation is provided below:

Estyn's response to the proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

This report has been prepared by Her Majesty's Inspectors of Education and Training in Wales.

Under the terms of the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 and its associated Code, proposers are required to send consultation documents to Estyn. However, Estyn is not a body which is required to act in accordance with the Code and the Act places no statutory requirements on Estyn in respect of school organisation matters. Therefore as a body being consulted, Estyn will provide their opinion only on the overall merits of school organisation proposals.

Estyn has considered the educational aspects of the proposal and has produced the following response to the information provided by the proposer and other additional information such as data from Welsh Government and the views of the Regional Consortia, which deliver school improvement services to the schools within the proposal.

Introduction

The proposal is by Powys County Council. The proposal is to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. The proposal is as follows.

- To make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from dual stream to Welsh-medium.
- This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022, with the aim of all of the school's pupils receiving Welsh-medium provision, ensuring that all pupils are fluent in both Welsh and English.

Summary/Conclusion

The proposal aligns with the Welsh Government's aim of achieving a million Welsh speakers by 2050 (Cymraeg 2050: A Million Welsh Speakers) by increasing the use of the Welsh language in education in Powys.

The proposal is consistent with the objectives of Powys County Council's strategy to transform education in Powys, which includes the aim to 'improve

access to Welsh-medium provision across all key stages' and the objective to 'move schools along the language continuum'.

The proposal is also consistent with Estyn's recommendation in its report on Powys County Council's local authority education services, namely 'ensure that the organisation of provision for non-maintained, post-16, Welsh-medium education and secondary education meets the needs of the children and young people of Powys'. The Council has given appropriate consideration to a range of options and has chosen the above proposal.

Estyn is of the opinion that this proposal is at least likely to maintain the current standards of education.

Description and benefits

The proposer provides a clear and rigorous rationale for the logic behind the proposal. It notes fairly that this proposal aligns with the objectives of Powys County Council's strategy to transform education in Powys, in addition to the Welsh Government objectives to increase the number of Welsh speakers.

The proposer identifies clearly the reasons for the proposal, which include improving educational outcomes, improving educational provision, improving leadership and management, improving efficiency in the delivery of education, and increasing the number of pupils who receive Welsh-medium education.

The proposer identifies the advantages, disadvantages and risks associated with the proposal, and the different options in a balanced way. It states firmly why it favours the proposal, and refers soundly to the benefits of changing the language category of the school. The proposal has given valid consideration to other options. These include maintaining the status quo, changing the language category to English-medium, and the favoured option, namely to change the school's language category to Welsh-medium.

The proposer has given thorough consideration to the proposal's effect on Welsh-medium provision within the authority. It states fairly that the proposal would have a positive effect on that provision, and asserts firmly that Welsh-medium education is the best way to ensure that young people become fully bilingual in Welsh and English.

This point of view aligns with the Education Minister's statement in the foreword of 'Guidance on Welsh in Education Strategic Plans (Welsh Government 2021), as follows: 'Cymraeg 2050 is clear that Welsh-medium immersion – which is where the medium of teaching and learning is delivered wholly or predominantly through the medium of Welsh – is the most reliable model for creating Welsh speakers with the skills and confidence to use the language comfortably in their everyday lives.'

The proposer has given sufficient consideration to the proposal's effect on the community and the travel arrangements for pupils who choose English-medium education. It identifies clearly that there are currently very few children in the English stream, and that there are no pupils in the English stream in the Reception class and Year 1. It acknowledges in a balanced way that should pupils choose to attend English-medium provision rather than attend the Welsh-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, that there would be an increase in distance and travel time. However, it identifies correctly that there are three English schools in the Llanidloes catchment area, two of which are within five miles of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. As a result, it states reasonably that distance and travel time to alternative English-medium provision would not be excessive.

Educational aspects of the proposal

The proposer gives detailed consideration to the proposal's effect on the quality of outcomes, provision and leadership within the school.

It refers relevantly to the outcomes of the latest Estyn inspection reports for Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, in addition to the latest inspection of Powys County Council's local authority education services.

It concludes reasonably that it does not anticipate any negative effects on the quality of standards of education, wellbeing and learning experiences for pupils who currently attend the school. It outlines fairly that should the proposal be implemented, the change to the school's language category would be introduced on a phased basis. As a result, pupils who currently receive English-medium provision within the school will be able to continue to receive that provision until they leave the school.

The proposer asserts strongly that the proposal will have a positive effect on pupils' education, including provision, standards and pupils' progress. It states firmly that resources will be able to be used more effectively as there will be no need to duplicate provision in both languages. It will also avoid teaching pupils in small classes with several year groups in each class, as is currently the case in the English stream. It states clearly that this will have a positive effect on the school's ability to teach a full curriculum in the foundation phase and all other relevant key stages.

The proposer identifies decisively that the proposal will lead to all pupils being taught together, which will ensure better cohesion and a consistent language continuum across the school, which will have a positive effect on pupils' wellbeing.

It acknowledges in a balanced way that the school would be required to provide a high level of support for pupils from families that speak little or no Welsh at home, in order to meet their particular educational needs.

The proposer has conducted an equality impact assessment and asserts reasonably that the proposal should not have a detrimental effect on any particular groups. It states robustly that the proposal would have a positive effect on pupils that belong to those groups. The proposer has given appropriate consideration to the possible disruption to current pupils, and has taken suitable action to minimise any effect on them.

9.2 Concerns about the provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

9.2.1	There has always been a problem around communication at YDT. Notifications are rushed and last-minute and the biggest difference is that parents are not welcomed beyond the school gate. We have given feedback on more than one occasion that the school is missing out on a valuable skillset and potentially enriching contributions that the community of enthusiastic parents would be able to offer. Ultimately, we feel really saddened that what should be seen as a real strength of the educational opportunities available at YDT; its dual-stream bilingual nature, is seemingly now perceived to be a negative to the point where the school is under consultation. 9.2.2	Our child had 5 different teachers in one school year and there was an obvious downturn in investment in the English stream vs the Welsh learning environment. 21. COMMENTS ABOUT THE CONSULTATION DOCUMENTATION

21.1 Comments about the consultation document

21.1.1	Throughout the consultation document benefits of implementing the preferred option are cited. Many of these benefits are already in place in YDT. It appears the consultation document was not tailored sufficiently to reflect that YDT is already a dual stream school that provides immersive Welsh language education, tracks and monitors pupils, helps learners develop their understanding of Welsh language and culture, produces bi-lingual learners, offers a full range of professional development opportunities, and links with other Welsh medium schools to name but a few. I therefore dispute the assertion in the consultation document that these elements, and others, would be strengthened by implementing the preferred option.	The Council's view is that the Consultation Document has been suitably tailored to reflect Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and that the benefits indicated in the document are valid.
21.1.2	The cost of English medium provision at YDT was cited frequently in the impact assessment and by PCC officers during Governors engagement meeting. The stream is funded in line with the authority's own Fair Funding Formula and the school has a balanced financial position projected. The appendix of the consultation identifies significant variance in budget share per pupil within the Llanidloes cluster (£3613 up to £7098), with YDT budget share per pupil being nearer the lower end of that range at £4650 per pupil. This is not reflected in the narrative of the consultation document or impact assessment. Geraint Rees welcomed all to the consultation meeting and introduced the officers attending the meeting. The Staff of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon introduced themselves. It was explained that there would be a brief presentation with an opportunity for discussion, comments, and questions for the officers. Geraint explained that the meeting would be recorded, for minuting purposes but they will be deleted once completed.

Geraint Rees and Marianne Evans gave a short PowerPoint presentation to give an overview of the proposals and the consultation process. It was explained that the Council is consulting on the following proposals:

- To make a regulated alternation to the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, from dual-stream to Welsh-medium. This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022.

Geraint Rees then gave staff the opportunity to proceed with any questions or comments they had in relation to the matter.

Staff: Can I just ask a question which has come in from parents who have responded to the consultation? Some are asking will there be a meeting for parents as part of the consultation.

Geraint Rees: The truth is that during this pandemic period, we are currently relying on electronic medium to consult and holding meetings with groups of pupils, staff, governors, but it is difficult to be able to hold one with parents. However, we do know that parents use a lot of social media, and electronic means, so we are having quite a large number of responses through social media and that is the means that the information is coming in. The consultation period has been extended so that there is additional opportunity for people to respond. Parents can ask questions throughout the consultation period via email, and can request that we can send documents to them. However, there is no formal meeting.

Staff: I have also been asked, in terms of responses to the consultation, how are those responses recorded? Are they recorded as to individuals or are names deleted?

Marianne Evans: Everything is confidential, and no names are disclosed. Once the consultation period ends, the next step is to analyse the responses, the concerns, and matters that are raised are put into the report which goes back to Cabinet, but it will not mention any names or show where the response has come from.

Geraint Rees: Every response will be noted in the report to Cabinet, positive or negative, and the officers will need to respond to these, but no names will be named.

Staff: I have a question please. Will the finance we have now as a dual-stream school stay the same if we change to a Welsh only stream?

Geraint Rees: Mari will explain further, but I would just like to say that finance is allocated according to the needs of the school. Therefore, if there is a need to have two classes in one year there will be funding for that. A school with only one stream will be different, but the entitlement of the children is still the same.

Mari Thomas: At the moment, the two streams are treated as two separate schools more or less, except for some shared costs in terms of Headteacher and support costs. Therefore, although the numbers in the English stream are very small, we still give them money, and this will obviously change, were there be a change to a single stream.

Geraint Rees: Any change would be over a period of time. If the proposal goes ahead, then every child in Dyffryn Trannon has a right to education in the language they have chosen, therefore the County would have to work things out over time.

Staff: Can I just follow on from that question please. If for example we have in year 2 one pupil, if that one pupil remains at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon is there a commitment

from the authority that the pupil will be funded? At the moment we have huge concerns from parents as to whether this will be the case. At the moment I am saying to them, yes, the local authority have said yes they will, but when it comes down to the English stream actually having only one pupil will that promise be honoured?

Geraint Rees: I think it is really an important question, and in any local authority when they carry out a transformation process, they must look after everybody who is in the system at the moment. However, it would be quite usual for the parents of a single child in a school to have a conversation with parents as to whether they will support the transition to the Welsh stream through language immersion and whether or not that may be something that will appeal to them. There are social challenges for a child who may be the only child in a whole key stage, further down the line, and there are challenges around wellbeing. Quite often when people grasp the issue that Welsh-medium actually means bilingual, and it isn't exclusive that you either speak Welsh or English, they might change to the Welsh stream. However, it would be the well-being of the child which would be at the heart of this too. It is something we need to look at very carefully.

Staff: I just want to ask, with the discussion about Bro-Hyddgen, would our children from the Welsh stream be feeding Bro Hyddgen or Llanidloes?

Marianne Evans: That is a good question. At the moment Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon feeds to Llanidloes. If the proposal for Ysgol Bro Hyddgen goes through, then this would be part of a discussion for any family in the wider community and they could choose for their child to go to go Ysgol Bro Hyddgen.

Staff: If that were to happen, would they have transport offered or would they need to arrange that themselves?

Marianne Evans: They would have to arrange the transport themselves, as they need to go to their nearest secondary school, with their nearest being Llanidloes, but it all depends on where they live.

Geraint Rees: However, you are aware that we are trying to work with schools and communities of children, both Primary and Secondary, to help with the progression of education for children, and we need to review this as proposals change and things change around us to ensure each child is treated fairly. There is a commitment in the transport policy for it to be reviewed annually, as things change, in order to ensure fairness to every pupil. This hasn't been discussed in detail yet, but this proposal could influence the dynamics and how we see things in the future.

Staff: Just one more thing, can I check that the secondary school in Llanidloes is going to carry on being a secondary dual-stream school?

Geraint Rees: Yes, that is the only plan at the moment. We want those who opt to have secondary education through the medium of Welsh, to have a very high percentage of subjects taught through Welsh and this is a challenge at the moment for schools including Llanidloes because they are trying to provide more than they do now.

Staff: We feel it is important that the parents of pre-school children know when they start at pre-school that they have Welsh language provision in their Primary and Secondary school. If I understand correctly, Welsh provision will still be available at Llanidloes High School. Most of our children travel to Llanidloes as it is the nearest school to Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.

It is a pity because of the wider changes that are happening in relation to Powys admissions policy, with Carno for example, that Carno pupils will no longer naturally feed Llanidloes, and that in relation to Rhayader the Welsh stream is expected to transfer to Ysgol Calon Cymru.

So, I feel that if we are going to have a Welsh primary school in Trefeglwys, and pupils transferring to their nearest secondary provision in Llanidloes, only Dyffryn Trannon pupils will be transferring to the Welsh stream at Llanidloes, and they will not have the opportunity to mix with other children and make new friends with other children in the community. Dyffryn Trannon pupils will be together from pre-school to year 6.

Geraint Rees: It is a clear aim for the Council that there is an increase in Welsh-medium provision in both primary and secondary, and that the provision needs more depth to it. Therefore, we will need to consider how we would do that. You say that if it will only be Dyffryn Trannon pupils at Llanidloes. If so, the number of pupils will be relatively low, making it difficult to have a wide curriculum. But there is no solution to this at this moment in time, except to say that by the end of the summer, we should have submitted a plan to Welsh Government, and we need a long term vision to endure that children have much wider provision than they have at the moment.

The Heads of the dual-stream schools know this, as we also lose children who have their primary education either fully or partly through the medium of Welsh, who lose out significantly in the secondary. We need them to have a clear language progression and if the progression was clearer, it is likely that this would lead to an increase in demand for Welsh primary education as parents could see a clear pattern until 18 years of age.

Marianne Evans: Can I come back on that question please. There are over 100 children now in the Secondary school in Llanidloes in the Welsh stream. We know there are some from Ysgol Dafydd Llwyd and we know a consultation has been completed on the admissions policy for 2022-2023, and I think it is going back to the admissions forum tomorrow, and we will then be able to see the results of the

consultation. I know there are a lot of discussions in Llanidloes with regards to these new proposals, and we will see what will come out. It is a different sort of catchment area to everywhere else.

Geraint Rees: It is complicated because of distances and population numbers. I know that we need a significant improvement to ensure that children have access to language fluency in the primary and secondary.

Because there is a significant investment being made in the primary in relation to Welsh language education, we just need to make sure that that is respected right up to sixth form.

We have discussed a model where secondary schools network together far more than they have done in the past so that there is far more choice in the Welsh language.

Staff: I was just wondering, if parents choose that English is their preferred stream for their children, during lockdown a lot of parents struggled and are going to be thinking twice. Where will be their feeder school from Trefeglwys?

Marianne Evans: Their local school would be Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and should they not choose the Welsh-medium provision then they would have the option of any other school in the catchment or outside the catchment. It would be Caersws, Llandinam, or the English stream at Llanidloes in the catchment.

Staff: But they wouldn't have transport provided?

Marianne Evans: Quite right, they wouldn't have it provided. Transport is provided to your closest or catchment school, so they would only have it provided to their closest provision.

Geraint Rees: It is interesting the dialogue around language and bilingualism, and the situation in Powys is quite different to much of Wales. We are trying to create a bespoke system, where the appreciation that everybody becomes bilingual through their education is important and it is challenging at the moment as there is a perception that education through the medium of Welsh is education for children who speak Welsh at home, which isn't the case. We need to keep working and supporting staff who may not feel comfortable working in Welsh, but with proper support and the opportunity for sabbaticals with support from the Welsh Government to produce bilingual children but also more bilingual adults too. There is a lot of talent that needs to be harnessed in the system that will help move Wales onto the next stage. We as a local authority will be looking to say that if a member of staff is looking to acquire those bilingual skills, we would be keen to work out what support is needed.

Marianne Evans: There is also an opportunity for young families to understand the benefits of bilingual education from a very early age, and the authority will be

launching a promotional campaign about Welsh-medium education and bilingualism. We would be happy to support Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon if the proposal goes ahead to provide the information to the families out there, and we hope that those in the local area will choose Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon and not choose it on the basis of it is an English or a Welsh-medium school, but because it is their local school and it is about naturalising and normalising the Welsh language and the choices that we have. The success that you have had in your Welsh-medium provision over the last few years really proves that there is a demand there for the provision, and if Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon can see this as your own unique journey in order to normalise Welsh-medium provision, then we are on to a winner here.

Staff: I am teaching children at present in the English stream. It is difficult for me to say, because I am slightly biased, but I love working and it has helped me develop my Welsh language. The opportunity to speak both languages is lovely and rare, in a school that is a dual-stream school. The children in my class at the moment, have the uncertainty of not knowing how long they are going to be together. It is more from the children's side, but this is an uncertainty to us knowing how long we are going to be all together?

Geraint Rees: The challenge for a local authority when a proposal comes forward is that initially the impact it has is destabilising, but the worst thing we can do is sit on a fence for 5 years unsure what to do. What we owe to you is that the officers bring forward a report as quickly as possible, tackle the issues that are raised like the one you asked and get to Cabinet for a decision. If they say walk away, so be it. If they say let's go ahead with it, again that needs to be enacted so it doesn't become a nobody knows for a long time. It is interesting the issue you raise with regards to the bilingual nature of the school and your ability to engage in both English and Welsh.

Staff: I can't engage in Welsh as much as I would like to, but I have had help from the lovely staff who have given me the opportunities to learn a little bit more. For the children in my class their Welsh has come along, usually they get the chance to mix and develop the skills. Whereas, if they were in an English stream school, they wouldn't have had the opportunity to practice their Welsh.

Geraint Rees: It does make it more challenging with the relatively small numbers you have at the moment in the English stream, because if you had 40 learners in the English stream and the decision was taken to move along the language continuum there would still be a sizeable group around for a long period of time for it to evolve. Because the numbers are small it is challenging for you as a teacher should that be destabilised as well, which is why I feel we owe it to everyone to consult openly, report accurately and expect the Cabinet to decide in a timely way. Thank you for raising those points.

Staff: Could I just say something else please, in my opinion a lot of the changes coming in now with the new Welsh curriculum, and as people move into the area, they will have the opportunity to see that Welsh isn't just in the classroom, but it is in

the corridor, a living language, and they will be able to melt and blend into the community and it is a positive change happening in Wales.

Geraint Rees: Yes, this has been happening in Carmarthenshire, Ceredigion, Pembrokeshire, Gwynedd, where if people move into the area where Welsh is the language, and the children go to their local school and become bilingual, wherever they may have come from, and whatever the language at home. What has happened in Powys is that it has been possible to move to an area where the Welsh is still vibrant, but you can have education in English, and therefore the children do not obtain full language skills. A lot of things need to be done to normalise Welsh-medium as Marianne said. However, it is a challenge, and it creates uncertainty and worry for people that don't have bilingual skills at the moment. However, as a County we are committed to support those who want to develop their Welsh language skills.

Staff: My question is, after lockdown and all the home learning it presented, that you have Welsh learners in homes where there are non-Welsh speaking parents. How sure will you be that if you do go forward with the transformation, that these families will want to stay in a Welsh stream school because it might have raised the question for some that some families will have decided at the end of foundation phase that it would be better for them to go into the English stream? My question is will you be looking at definite numbers to know how many children in the next stage of the foundation phase will be wanting to go into the Welsh stream, otherwise they will be falling out into other schools in the catchment area, when we know a school like Llanidloes have large class sizes already.

Geraint Rees: The issue around children from non-Welsh speaking homes continuing to make progress throughout lockdown became an issue right at the beginning of the pandemic situation and there has been a strong response from Welsh government, S4C and teachers to help those children who wouldn't otherwise hear Welsh. There is a growing feeling around Wales that the issue that was a huge concern at the beginning, may be far more temporary than people thought it would be because other questions are being asked about lost learning for GCSE and A level students, in whichever language, but most of the world have got lost learning and people can only pick up from where they left off. There isn't much evidence at the moment about drop-outs happening from Welsh-medium. There are cases and it is a challenge for the teachers and support staff to keep them going, but let's hope this doesn't become a routine part of life.

Lynette Lovell: I just wanted to say we have conducted a survey in Powys for the provision that has been given to children during the blended learning approach. For many parents, they are from English speaking homes, but the children receiving Welsh-medium education. However, we have been quality assuring some of the work and the Welsh-medium primary provision through this period has been excellent. I know parents have found the provision from Welsh-medium schools has really helped English speaking parents to enable their children keep their Welsh language skills.

Geraint Rees: We did a survey of parents in the new year and had 3,500 responses, mixed language, as we really needed to get a handle on where we were on this. The overwhelming response we had from parents was that their children had been well served by their teachers and schools during this period, and it seemed to replicate itself in Welsh, but we can't take our eye off the ball. Also, during lockdown there has been a remarkable growth in parents who have wished to develop their Welsh language skills. There seems to be a cultural shift which has happened, and thankfully S4C and the Welsh Government have responded positively to this, we just need those resources to keep coming.

Staff: I have noticed there is a chatter between the parents from those whose children are due to start with us in Reception this year. They are nervous because they were choosing Trefeglwys because of the safety net of the English stream should the Welsh stream not work out for them, I am nervous that we could lose those children all together if they do not feel their children will have that safety net. I don't know what the answer is, but I know they are anxious and a few of them are re-thinking their options.

Geraint Rees: What I would say is, Powys is one of the rare places where you have within the same school the option of an education which is bilingual or just in English, and the safety net hardly exists in other areas in Wales where you just have to make that one decision from the start for every child. It will be interesting to see how it plays out but we do need to be mindful of it. I would hope that as a body of staff, your commitment to seeing children become bilingual and what you put into that might just help carry them over that line.

Staff: Can I just come in on what is being said there. There are still a few children in the English stream class who have diverted out of the Welsh stream classes as they cannot keep up with it. I am wondering what the back-up plan for those children will be, as there could be many more and what will the provision be for those?

Geraint Rees: It will be pretty much the same as it is anywhere else in Wales or bilingual countries. You make your choice and if you don't want it then you make your other choice, but it will usually be in a different place. If the proposal were to go ahead, it strengthens the overall climate of the school and social use of Welsh becomes stronger and it will offer stronger bilingual skills for the children, but it would be a matter for the school as to how that plays out.

Emma Palmer: Could I ask what do you do now when that happens?

Staff: I am a teaching assistant within the English stream class, and I have only just started just before Christmas, so as far as I know those children have just been put into that class. Is that correct?

Staff: Yes, as it is at the moment, if a parent decides they want to transfer their child from Welsh medium provision into English provision, and they are within the local area they will go into the English medium stream. Will this still be offered to pupils from 2022?

Geraint Rees: How many children do you have in the English stream currently?

Staff: 15

Geraint Rees: How many of them moved over to English medium from the Welsh stream?

Staff: 4

Geraint Rees: In terms of numbers we are talking that it occasionally happens, but you also have some strong well regarded English-medium schools in the local area should someone really feel that they want to go into the English stream.

Staff: I know there is already a pupil which has left because of the consultation, and they are driving their child to the new school out of the catchment area which I think is really sad. They were afraid of the outcome, and they are now out of the village. I feel as a village it is going to split it. You have so many coming in by bus to the school and you will find the children being bussed out of the village as well.

Geraint Rees: I think that the challenge there is for the school to work with the local community to normalise bilingualism. Across the world 70% of children speak two languages by the end of primary school and the challenge is that we haven't lived with the normalisation of having bilingualism.

I was interested in the question around how many, because then if it is 4, it is not many. If you had say 3 children per year shifting over to the English stream, you would have 20 odd of them, but because it is a small number it is something we need to consider and respond to in the consultation report.

Marianne Evans: The opportunity is there in front of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon to really change the approach to how it sells and what it can offer in terms of bilingualism. We will be launching a Welsh promotion campaign which will be providing support and information for families. This is a real opportunity for Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.

Geraint Rees: We are consulting in order to gather the views both positive and negative and report them to Cabinet so that Cabinet can make a decision.

Staff: I just wanted to say, in relation to children moving from the Welsh-medium to the English stream, if we were a Welsh-medium school where both languages were used, then we could encourage people to speak Welsh on the playground and in the corridors, and their Welsh language ability would be much better. At the moment,

being a dual-stream, it is difficult to encourage children to speak Welsh when they are playing with children who are non-Welsh speaking. If it was all in Welsh, they would be immersed in Welsh and would pick it up a lot easier.

Geraint Rees: Yes, that is fair enough, I agree, and we will make note of this.

Staff: If we were to change to a Welsh-medium school, staffing in a Welsh-medium school is difficult. Do Powys have a scheme where we can recruit Welsh speaking staff to come to the school? We find it difficult to find Welsh language staff as there are very few in the area, so what can the Council do in relation to this?

Geraint Rees: As part of our Welsh in Education Strategic Plan we need to report to Welsh Government our intentions regarding the recruitment and development of staff. We have found that there are a number of teachers who would like to teach through the medium of Welsh, but don't choose to come to Powys because the opportunity to teach in the Welsh language is restricted. We do need to address this problem.

Sarah Christoforou offered all staff the opportunity to speak with her or the HR business partners privately if they would like to do so and ask any queries which they may have with regards to staffing structures.

Geraint Rees brought the meeting to an end and thanked everyone very much for their thoughtfulness and comments. There was also a slide shown explaining that the Council will prepare a consultation document report outlining the feedback received, which Cabinet will later consider and agree how to proceed.

If Cabinet agree to proceed with the proposal, a statutory notice will be published with 28 days given to object. The council will then prepare an objection report, for Cabinet to further consider and make a final decision.

Geraint Rees welcomed all to the consultation meeting and introduced the officers attending the meeting. The Staff of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon introduced themselves. It was explained that there would be a brief presentation with an opportunity for discussion, comments, and questions for the officers. Geraint explained that the meeting would be recorded, for minuting purposes but they will be deleted once completed.

Geraint Rees and Marianne Evans gave a short PowerPoint presentation to give an overview of the proposals and the consultation process. It was explained that the Council is consulting on the following proposals:

- To make a regulated alternation to the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, from dual-stream to Welsh-medium. This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022.

Geraint Rees then allowed for the Governors to proceed with any questions or comments they had on the matter.

Governor: There is a question regarding the finance of the school going forward and also around the continuity of education and what the long-term plan is when children reach 11 in terms of the local provision.

Geraint Rees: Currently Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon is being funded as a dual-stream school which is essentially almost giving you the budget for two schools. One of the challenges with dual-streams is that in some schools the Welsh stream is small and expensive to maintain and in others the English stream is small and expensive to maintain.

Mari Thomas: The way the formula works at the moment is that there are shared costs across the school, for example headteacher, premises and administration costs, but otherwise the school is funded almost like two schools.

If the school becomes Welsh-medium, there would be no need for the extra funding for the English stream and that would be phased out.

Geraint Rees: A lot of local authorities have moved away from dual-stream schools because of the imbalance it causes and the costs are high. But that's not the rationale here; the difference in numbers between the two streams is quite marked and causes financial and educational challenges.

As to the second question asked regarding progression and secondary education, this proposal is a stand alone proposal not dependent on any secondary proposal, but we have to move to a point where learners who wish to study in Welsh have access to a broad curriculum in Welsh and other features to develop their bilingualism.

Governor: There is a fear for the school that if there is nowhere for the pupils to move on to when 11, the concern would then be that parents would vote with their feet, with the school diminishing in size and suffering as a consequence. People need to see a strategy in place.

Marianne Evans: Your secondary provision is the Welsh stream at Llanidloes High School and there are over 100 pupils in that stream. The school also has ambition to improve the provision.

We have also finished consulting on changing the language category of Ysgol Bro Hyddgen, and are in the process of analysing consultation responses in relation to changing the language category of Bro Hyddgen from dual-stream to Welsh-medium.

Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon is a dual-stream school in a catchment where you are the only provider of Welsh-medium primary provision. Llanidloes High School doesn't have many Welsh language pupils feeding in, although an increasing number of Dafydd Llwyd pupils are choosing it for secondary provision.

There has also been a consultation for changes to the admissions process with proposals which might affect the feeder schools of Llanidloes High School which might also have an impact on things.

Governor: The provision in Machynlleth is too far, and I don't think parents will choose to send their children there.

Governor: What are the numbers required to make the English stream viable?

Geraint Rees: It's not just a matter of the cost of educating a child. It's a matter of what kind of curriculum can be provided and what the social experience of the child would be. For example, there is one child in year two who wants an education in English, and it's not a matter of cost, but how do you make sure that child has a rounded social experience.

Because Powys has historically built its educational provision around dual-stream schools, there is not at the moment Welsh-medium secondary provision in Powys. This is out of synch with what is happening elsewhere in Wales and beyond in terms of how you ensure multilingualism and access to a full curriculum.

You couldn't reasonably expect to sustain a primary school in Wales over a long period of time, with less than 25 pupils in its classes.

There are so few children in the foundation phase at Dyffryn Trannon at the moment, it raises questions as to its stability, however much money is thrown at it.

Governor: My concern is that I like the concept of a dual-stream school, although I appreciate that there are challenges because the numbers never add up and they will never add up.

It strikes me that this is the beginning of the end for the dual-stream schools concept if this proposal goes forward. Are you saying that dual-stream schools have no future full stop?

Geraint Rees: Not necessarily. There may be corners of Powys where they may be the only reasonable provision going forward. In other parts of Powys, for example Dyffryn Trannon where there are English-medium schools not far away, this might be so. Because of the nature of dual-stream, one of the key things that hasn't happened is normalising the question of education in the minority language. In other parts of Wales, people move in from Somalia or Latvia or Birmingham and they assume that if the education is in Welsh it guarantees bilingualism and that's it.

Because the dual-stream option exists a choice has to be made and in a situation where you are with an enormous disparity in numbers you have to go over all kinds of hurdles to make sure nobody is disadvantaged. Nobody has any ambitions but for Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon to be a vibrant school which serves its community. It will be interesting to see if this proposal goes through, will families who move to the surrounding area say that's the village school and my children will be bilingual when they leave that school. That's the normalisation which we probably haven't achieved so far, but other areas of Wales have.

Governor: There is a more transient nature to population these days, and Trefglwys village is growing, and it is possible that the outlook of some parents will be short term. They might see themselves moving elsewhere in a few years and therefore Welsh language provision might not be attractive to them. I am therefore

concerned that we will see many parents sending their children out of Trefeglwys to their nearest English-medium school.

Marianne Evans: I see this as an opportunity for Dyffryn Trannon to provide a unique provision for the local area. We need to educate young families about the advantages of bilingualism. People don't understand what Welsh-medium education is and what it can offer. If the proposal goes ahead, then the school could support young families and tell them what the advantages of Welsh-medium education are.

Governor: What language category will YDT be if the proposal goes forward under the proposed Welsh Government new language categories?

Geraint Rees: There has been a consultation regarding changing the definitions of school language categories. It will take some time for any new categories to be agreed, and a number of issues have been raised during the consultation. In terms of categorising this proposal, then it would take this to whatever the furthest point is in terms of all learners being entitled to bilingualism, but I don't know how they are going to define this at the moment.

Governor: What are the numbers in Caersws and Llandinam?

Geraint Rees: A phrase that has been used earlier on is "if Dyffryn Trannon goes under". What we're planning here is that Dyffryn Trannon becomes a permanent part of the Powys school estate. There's no notion of Dyffryn Trannon "going under".

Governor: The concern is unless the secondary option is strong, the concern is that the school would not necessarily go under, but that could weaken the school from the point of view of parents.

Geraint Rees: That risk has to be tackled by ensuring that when pupils go on to secondary provision that the secondary provision enables pupils to carry on with their bilingualism. Our engagement last year manifested frustration that whilst the primary school did a great job, in the secondary, Welsh language provision was unreliable and patchy. We have to tackle the secondary provision or our solution will only be partial.

By the end of this summer we should have a new Welsh in Education Strategic Plan, (WESP), in place, which will show where we will be by 2032, and that will go some way to ensure better continuation between primary and secondary.

Governor: If the Welsh-medium provision increases in Llanidloes and the children who travel in by bus from Llanidloes end up going to Llanidloes instead, what effect will that have on the school.

Also, I think the school has a unique selling point in being dual-stream, it just needs to be promoted better. Many people don't understand what dual-stream means.

Marianne Evans: There is no Welsh-medium provision in the primary at Llanidloes. The secondary school is dual-stream.

Governor: I'm talking about the future. A Welsh stream might be introduced at Llanidloes in the future.

Marianne Evans: We have no plans to introduce any Welsh-medium at Llanidloes primary, but I appreciate that things can change.

Geraint Rees: Did you mean promoting the English stream at Dyffryn Trannon, in order to increase the numbers?

Governor: Yes. I think we could expand the promotion of the English stream, and COVID hasn't helped. Maybe we could pause the consultation process for the promotion to have time to work.

Geraint Rees: Is it some 15 pupils that you have across the 2 key stages in the English stream? The numbers are significantly higher in the Welsh stream. That imbalance of numbers is a problem. The question of how the budget is deployed is hugely challenging. There are only 90 learners between the two schools in Caersws and Llandinam. Therefore, there isn't a large population in the area to be able to attract to the English stream at Dyffryn Trannon. If we're wrong say it, but it doesn't look like it at the moment.

Governor: I just think it needs time for the promotion of the English stream to work. The past 12 months have made it difficult.

Geraint Rees: Did the school evolve to be a dual-stream, or was there a conscious policy to start it?

Governor: Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon was Ysgol Gynradd Trefeglwys, but it's historically dual-stream.

Geraint Rees: Dual-stream has been there as an option for a long period of time, but the take up of the Welsh stream is such that it is greater. The majority of learners in the Welsh stream are not from Welsh speaking families, so you have managed to reach families who have moved in and those who have lived in the area both of which have lost their Welsh. The challenge is to normalise the use of Welsh, so that moving to the area and having Welsh-medium education is not a problem.

Governor: Both my daughters attend the English stream and both can speak Welsh. I don't see the system broken, it just needs enhancing. Geraint has said that this proposal is not about saving money, but I think it is because you're funding two schools and can see a way to save money because of the decline of the English. We need to keep what we've got and just do it better.

Geraint Rees: As far as the authority is concerned, if change happens, it's not a saving to Powys but it's actually a commitment to education and to improve equality across the board wherever people are in Powys. It is a time of investment not a time of saving.

Marianne Evans: It might look as if this has come out of the blue. However, we have had conversations over many years with Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon about the sustainability of the English stream. We have 12 pupils in the English stream and this will go down to 8 in September. This is not educationally or financially sustainable.

Governor: I feel that the decline of the promotion of the dual-stream has happened over a number of years. Had the dual-stream been actively promoted we wouldn't be having this conversation now. Let's maintain what we have, which is unique to any other school in the area.

Cllr Phyl Davies: Valid points have been made, especially regarding the secondary provision going forward. However, when I was in YDT the language was 50/50 split, and Dyffryn Trannon has seen a sustained level of uptake in the Welsh language, despite the fact that we don't have the secondary provision we should have.

Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon needs to be a future part of the estate in Powys and we are not looking at a stream in Llanidloes which could take half of the pupils we have in Trefeglwys.

Emma Palmer: I just wanted to give a commitment from the transformation perspective that we are looking to strengthen the secondary provision across the County. We have had discussions with Welsh Government about securing funding for Welsh-medium provision. There is also the Estyn recommendation to strengthen Welsh language provision across all ages across the county.

This is about a commitment from the local authority that we absolutely want to strengthen the Welsh-medium provision across Powys, and in terms of Welsh-medium here, this gives you a sustainable future here.

Governor: There is a comment in the chat from Iwan and a few other comments which need to be noted.

Governor: I was pleased and relieved to see the commitment from Powys that all current English stream pupils will continue to be able to be taught in the English stream.

What level of assurance can Powys can give about the continuity of English provision should the proposal be implemented, as the numbers may taper off in the English stream.

Geraint Rees: How do you balance the commitment made by the local authority and the well-being of a child? The authority can make a commitment, but the well-being of the child has to be central.

It would be interesting to know if this goes ahead, how many parents would be interested for their children to have an immersion experience for some 11 or 12 weeks, and transfer from the English stream to the Welsh stream, but the well-being of pupils is key to this.

Governor: What were the drivers for Dyffryn Trannon being selected for this process at this time, when there are other dual-stream schools or small schools? Also, what consideration was given for the consultation to be undertaken on a cluster basis so that we could see better how the pieces of the jigsaw for the cluster fitted together because many of the queries we have had tonight relate to unknown quantities because the picture for the cluster as a whole was unclear.

Geraint Rees: So where else in this cluster is there Welsh-medium provision which we could be looking at as part of this equation?

Governor: My query relates specifically to the two small schools in the cluster, in Llandinam and Caersws, and in the strategy both dual-stream and small schools were not favoured, and I want to understand why Dyffryn Trannon, and why not other schools in the cluster at this time?

Geraint Rees: Dyffryn Trannon is the only school with Welsh provision in the primary and it is very successful. I don't know if the suggestion is that we should have gone to Caersws to tell them to switch to Welsh so that Dyffryn Trannon could then become single stream English or what. You're successful with your Welsh stream and it seems sensible to build on that.

Governor: Apologies if I'm not explaining myself very well. What I want to understand is why is Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon being consulted for change when Transforming Education talked about the future of small schools as well as dual-stream schools. Why are we not looking at other schools in the cluster? All the other schools in the cluster are small schools which would potentially realise similar if not greater financial savings than Dyffryn Trannon, then why are you not moving those schools along the language continuum, as all the other schools in the cluster are English-medium.

Marianne Evans: There are a number of different strands to the strategy and a number of different waves. We have taken a cluster approach in a number of areas in the county, but we have also taken the approach of looking at the data in individual small schools across the County. There is also a strategic aim of moving schools along the language continuum. When we were invited to your governors' meeting in November last year, and saw the numbers in the English stream were so low, it made sense to move Dyffryn Trannon along the language continuum. So there's different approaches across the whole County. We will be looking at every catchment as we go forward, so there will be opportunities to look at the catchment to be included in the next wave of activity.

Governor: You say that you were invited to the governing body in November. By whom?

Marianne Evans: By the governors, if my recollection is correct.

Governor: It's news to me that you were invited by the governors to the meeting, but we can pick that up another time.

What method is the local authority using for those with low or no literacy ability to ensure that they are able to contribute to the consultation?

Geraint Rees: We are consulting in accordance with Welsh Government guidelines, including guidelines recently issued regarding consulting during the pandemic. Powys. We've also discussed whether or not we should do this at all during the pandemic. However, Powys needs to move on to improve its education provision

However, what we have found during this Covid period, is that the number of responses we have for consultations is better than what they have been in the past. For example, there were some 3,500 responses to a survey regarding blended learning. Therefore, the response seems to be higher than what we have had in the past. However, we will be evaluating this in order to be sure that we are engaging properly. If you are aware of any individuals with protected characteristics who you feel are excluded who otherwise would have taken part, let us know and we will act on it.

Governor: The Integrated Impact Assessment refers to activities should the school move along the language continuum, such as enhanced Urdd participation and Menter Maldwyn, all of which are already in place. I just wonder if the Integrated Impact Assessment will be revised further in the process, to reflect the reality of the situation as I don't feel it currently reflects the extent of the extra-curricular and Welsh cultural language activities taking place at the school.

Marianne Evans: Absolutely, it is a draft at the moment and it will be updated and revised to include anything that comes through during the consultation.

Geraint Rees: Things like the Impact Assessment are put forward before the consultation and will be changed following comments received during the consultation process.

Governor: I completely appreciate that the Impact Assessment was draft

Marianne Evans: The information about the Welsh language activities were provided by the school itself. If there is additional information we can then add that to the final Impact Assessment.

Governor: Will it be possible for Welsh stream pupils to transfer to the English stream after September 2022 should they wish to do so?

Geraint Rees: The local authority is sustaining the two streams to see them through, and there is an expectation that we have to work through that with people. However, the traffic might be the other way with people asking for immersion experience to transfer from English to Welsh.

Governor: I've spoken to some parents, and a number have voiced concern that removing the dual-stream will discourage some from choosing the Welsh stream. Many parents who have children in the Welsh stream now have said that one attraction to that was the safety net of the English stream, so that they could move from the Welsh stream to English if the Welsh did not work out. In the last couple of years there have been at least 4 children who have transferred from the Welsh to the English stream.

What consideration has Powys given to the potential detrimental impact on recruiting pupils to the Welsh stream by not having a dual-stream site which gives parents the flexibility of moving to the English stream if things don't work out?

Geraint Rees: The record across Wales is that it doesn't make the difference that people believe that it will. It's an insurance policy that is not often cashed in. I

understand that 4 have made the switch from Welsh-medium to English, so it doesn't happen often. The bottom line is when we are actively promoting the school to provide for every learner to be bilingual, very rarely do people want to move.

Maintaining dual-stream as an insurance policy is a very expensive plan. Whether the provision is English-medium or bilingual we need to support what the schools aim to do and support the schools in doing that.

Governor: I was not suggesting that we should retain the dual-stream as an insurance policy, but some parents may view it in this way.

My next point is that the School Organisation Code on page 9 stipulates that projected transport costs needs to be included and I'm interested in CO2 emissions. None has been included in the Integrated Impact Assessment. Will it be included?

Marianne Evans: In the Impact Assessments we have mentioned that there are no transport costs linked to this proposal and therefore no CO2 considerations.

Governor: That is incorrect as there are some pupils in this village which if the proposal goes ahead will need to be bused to alternative provision. There will be data available to make a reasonable assumption as to projected transport costs to make the Impact Assessment a more balanced document.

Marianne Evans: We will respond.

Governor: Can I invite any governors who have not had the opportunity to ask questions to do so? I was not aware that the meeting was scheduled to end at 19:30

Governor: This is disappointing. If I had known of the fixed timescale I would have asked some questions in beforehand.

Emma Palmer: The calendar invite has the meeting noted as one and a half hours, but sorry about that.

Governor: I think we need to embrace this as a positive going forward. The parents have chosen to send their pupils to the Welsh stream. It's a very difficult and delicate situation but that's my opinion.

Governor: We're still looking at a skeleton plan. We need more detail to make an informed decision. I have numerous concerns, for example if Newtown have a full Welsh-medium secondary we could be in trouble, particularly if Welsh-medium secondary was pushed out of Llanidloes. I'm struggling to come to a decision without knowing the wider implications.

In terms of ideology of what we're trying to do, we moved to Trefeglwys and placed our children in the Welsh-stream, but talking about the children's experience I have no doubt that a dual-stream is very beneficial to the pupils' experience. I also have long term concerns that the numbers of pupils coming to Welsh-medium would plummet.

Governor: I'm all for changing the language category, because the school has shown that's what it's good at. For myself, I was taught in Glantwymyn and Bro

Ddyfi, and when I moved to the Llanidloes area, people were saying that I spoke Welsh fluently, and mentioned their disappointment that they were not fluent in Welsh. My answer was that I can do that because I was taught through the medium of Welsh from start to finish. You naturally pick up English. If it's a bilingual school the Welsh language will suffer.

Headteacher: I have my own personal views but I wouldn't want to share those personal views in the forum. I was appointed as Headteacher of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon when it was a dual-stream school and so long as it is dual-stream I will do the best for all pupils in the school. If the language category changes then I will do the best for those pupils as well.

Geraint thanked everybody for attending the meeting.

Comments made in the meeting Chat

Part A - no evidence of any proactive justification for YDT's proposed change of status - no strategic context ie the case made for change appears to be YDT in isolation with no real strategy evident

Part B - all the reasons cited in support of the proposal could be questioned - the disadvantages listed are fewer in number but potentially have a bigger impact - the risks are understated

Part C - reference is made to impact on other schools but what about the impact on YDT of decisions taken by other schools? - evidence of current / future need or demand appears to ignore the current building work going on and expansion of the village - it is claimed that the impact of the proposal on the community would be minimal but it could well be extremely divisive if we see the children from the village being transported to Llanidloes for their education

Approx 2005, the language balance was almost a mirror image of where we have been in the last 5 years or so - admittedly not quite as extreme as the current position but indicative, nevertheless, of an often highly unpredictable issue

3. Consultation meeting with the School Council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

24th March 2021 – Held virtually on Microsoft Teams

Present: Marianne Evans, Sarah Astley, Huw Rowlands – Powys County Council
Caroline Harries – Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

Officers from Powys County Council met virtually via Microsoft Teams with representatives from the School Council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon to discuss the consultation to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from dual-stream to Welsh-medium.

The session was held with two different groups of pupils from the school council, one group representing the English stream and the other representing the Welsh stream.

Pupils were reminded that if they or their friends thought of any further questions or comments following the meeting, they were welcome to ask for their teachers' assistance to send those to Powys County Council by the 15th of April the date the consultation ends.

It was explained that after the 15th of April all comments received would be considered and then a report made summarising comments received during the consultation. Powys councillors would then consider the report before deciding what to do.

English stream group

The group consisted of one pupil in year 6 and one in pupil in year 4.

Officers explained the proposals for changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and that they would like to have the views of the pupils on the proposal. The pupils understood that if the change was implemented, it would mean that there would be no English stream in Dyffryn Trannon, and all classes would be taught through the medium of Welsh. This would be phased over time and the proposal would therefore have no effect on existing pupils.

The pupils were asked several questions and their responses are summarised below:

What do you like about the two streams in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon?

- Having two streams is very unique as there are not many bilingual schools
- I like being in a school with Welsh-medium pupils. I like things how they are.

What do you not like about the two streams in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon?

- Not really. I like things as they are.

If things were to change, and the English medium provision was phased out of the school, what do you think about that? Do you have any concerns or questions about that?

- Over the last couple of years, numbers in the English stream have increased, as we have gained five pupils from the Welsh stream, and one from another school in Powys. There are now fifteen pupils in my class, but in September, when pupils go to high school, there will only be ten.

How many years do you have in your class and do you think that works well?

- Year 6, 5, 4, 3 and year 2. It can be a bit of a struggle, but it's working really well as we're all great friends and we're independent as well.

Do you mix with children of the Welsh stream, for example at playtime?

- Because of the pandemic, we now have our own bubbles. But before, we had lots of friends in the Welsh stream, even though they were in different classes.

If the proposal goes ahead, what do you think the effect of any change would be?

- I think that we have the best of both worlds at the moment, as we can speak English but also learn Welsh as well. I think we've got the best of both at the moment.

Any other comments?

- I don't think that enough people know of the English stream at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. We are going to make posters and leaflets to let people know about the English stream at Dyffryn Trannon. I would like more children in my class.

Welsh stream pupils

The group consisted of six pupils, years 2, 3, 4, 5, 6.

Officers explained the proposals for changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and that they would like to have the views of the pupils on the proposal. The pupils understood that if the change was implemented, it would mean that there would be no English stream in Dyffryn Trannon, and all classes would be taught through the medium of Welsh. This would be phased over time and the proposal would therefore have no effect on existing pupils.

The pupils were asked several questions and their responses are summarised below:

Questions asked to pupils

What do you think of the dual-stream system? Is it good or bad?

- There are not many pupils in the English stream – there are far more in the Welsh stream. Children in the Welsh stream can speak both languages

Before you had to form bubbles, were the children of the Welsh and English stream mixing?

- Not really, no, only a little. Welsh stream pupils tend to play with Welsh stream pupils and English stream pupils tend to play with English stream pupils

Do you think that it would be better if Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon only had a Welsh stream?

- I'm not sure. There are not many pupils in the English stream, but they might go to other schools where they are only taught in English
- It would be good just to have one stream, as then everybody would be able to speak Welsh, and more Welsh would be spoken at home

Do you think that there will be a problem if a new family which doesn't speak Welsh moves to the area, and Welsh is the only language of the school?

- Yes, it could be a problem, maybe children would go to other schools, further away than where they live.

Questions pupils asked

I would like to know if children will have to speak Welsh all the time if the school's language category was changed.

- If the school's language category was changed, Welsh will be the school's language and you would speak Welsh as you do now.

Why are you considering this change?

- Because Powys County Council are concerned that there aren't enough children in the English stream at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and no children whatsoever in the lower classes of the school, and the Council thinks that the school could be run better with only one language.

Will the English stream teacher have the opportunity to learn Welsh?

- Yes, every opportunity and support will be given for the English stream teacher to learn Welsh, if she so wishes

What will happen to the English stream teacher?

- She will stay, because the English stream will still be here for some years, and she will have the opportunity to learn Welsh.

But when the English stream has ended, will she still have a job?

- That is something which will have to be considered at a later time, if this proposal goes forward.

Why do pupils not go to schools in England if they want to be taught in English?

- In Wales, there are two languages, Welsh and English, and both are the official languages of Wales. There are English schools in the area, such as in Caersws, Llandinam and Llanidloes primary. Dyffryn Trannon is the only school in the area which teaches in Welsh.

Why can't the children themselves choose whether they want to attend the English stream or the Welsh stream?

- It was explained that Powys County Council were worried that pupil numbers in the English stream were very small, and because most pupils were in the Welsh stream, it might be better for the school to be just a Welsh-medium school, as the school could be better run with only one language. However, we are here to listen to what everyone has to say, as we haven't yet made a final decision.

Pupils and the school were thanked for their time in attending the meeting and providing their views.

10. Overall Summary and Judgement of this Impact Assessment?

This impact assessment has been updated following the consultation exercise. A number of concerns were raised during the consultation about the impact of the proposal on the community, on pupils with ALN, and on any pupils choosing to attend alternative English-medium provision instead of accessing Welsh-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.

The Council proposes to mitigate the impact on pupils with ALN by ensuring that any pupil with SEN/ALN who requires targeted support through the medium of English at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon is provided with this support as part of the agreed alternative learning provision under the new Additional Learning Needs and Education Tribunal (Wales) Act 2018.

Following consultation, it is judged that the impact of the proposal remains positive overall. The proposal would eventually provide a more sustainable model for delivering education in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, ensuring that all pupils are fully bilingual in Welsh and English when they leave the school. The proposal is to change the school's language category over time, which minimises the impact on pupils currently attending Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, but would also ensure that, eventually, all pupils would be taught through the medium of Welsh, and would become fully bilingual in Welsh and English. This would lead to enhanced opportunities to promote the Welsh language within the school and within the community and would provide those pupils with bilingual skills to take into the workplace.

v) If accommodation, facilities or services are provided by a school, where would they be provided in the event of closure?

The proposal would not close or affect in any way any accommodation, facilities or services provided by Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.

vi) Distance and travelling time involved in attending an alternative school of the same language category

Should the proposal be implemented, there would be no impact on distance and travelling time for current pupils at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. All pupils currently receiving English-medium education at the school would be able to continue to access this provision until they leave the school.

In the future, pupils wishing to access English-medium education would need to travel to alternative provision. In respect of primary provision, the nearest alternative schools would be as follows:

vii) How parents' and pupils' engagement with the alternative school and any facilities it may offer could be supported

Should the proposal be implemented, all current pupils would be able to continue to receive education through the medium of Welsh or English at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon throughout their time in the school, therefore there would be no change in terms of parents' and pupils' engagement with the school.

viii) Any wider implications e.g. impact on public transport provision, wider community safety issues

The implementation of the proposal would not impact on public transport provision or community safety.

ix) Issues raised at consultation

A number of comments were received during the consultation period which related to the proposal's impact on the community. Most of the comments suggested that the proposal would have a negative impact on the community.

The comments received are listed in full in the consultation report produced in respect of this proposal along with the Council's response to the points raised. The points raised are also summarised below:

Reference to transport arrangements

- Additional travel would be required
- Reference to the Council's transport policy
- Reference to transport costs
- Concern about impact on access to extra-curricular activities
- Reference to pupils travelling into Trefeglwys

Negative impact on the community

- The area would not be attractive to people looking to move in to new housing
- The area is largely an English speaking area
- The proposal would lead to community division

x) Conclusion

The proposal only proposes changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, therefore it is anticipated that the proposal's impact on the community would be minimal. Primary provision would continue to be available in Trefeglwys, and community facilities associated with the school would continue to be available.

It is acknowledged that the proposal would eventually lead to additional travel for any pupils wishing to access English-medium education. However by phasing in the change in language category over a number of years, the intention is that all pupils in the school's catchment area would access Welsh-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, therefore the number of affected pupils would be small. Should pupils wish to access English-medium provision instead of accessing Welsh-medium provision at

Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, there are three English-medium schools within 8 miles of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, therefore the additional travel time / distance involved would not be significant.

ii) After school / extra-curricular activities which provide additional opportunities for pupils to use Welsh

All of the after-school clubs provided by the school provide opportunities for pupils to use Welsh, either as a first or second language. These include the following:

Urdd Club – an opportunity for children from year 1 to year 6 to come together after school to play games, create artwork to compete in Urdd competitions, create items to sell in the Christmas Fair, and other various activities.

It also gives children the opportunity to practice dancing, singing and recitation as preparation for competitions and the Urdd Eisteddfod. It also gives pupils the opportunity to use Welsh outside class so that they can see that the Welsh language is a living language that can be used socially in the community.

iii) Opportunities provided by the school for members of the community to learn Welsh, or undertake activities through the medium of Welsh

Siarter iaith / Criw Cymraeg Campus arrange a “Speaking Welsh afternoon” – inviting local people to attend the school to have tea or coffee and socialise through the medium of Welsh.

The school promotes any Welsh learning sessions organised by Menter Maldwyn and similar organisations.

iv) Other links between the school and the Welsh language community

The school has strong links with the Welsh language community as follows:

- The school organises concerts so that pupils have the opportunity to perform with famous Welsh language people
- The school sings carols in the Winter Fair
- Various services held in the local church such as Thanksgiving

v) Other considerations

- Whether it might be appropriate to provide additional after school facilities at any alternative school to further secure standards in the Welsh language

Should the proposal be implemented, the use of the Welsh language would increase and there would be enhanced opportunities for pupils across all age ranges to take part in Welsh language activities, including after school activities.

There is therefore no need to consider providing additional after school facilities at any alternative school in order to further secure standards in the Welsh language.

- How parents’ and pupils’ engagement with any alternative school and any specific language enhancement it offers could be supported

Should the proposal be implemented, all current pupils would be able to continue to receive education through the medium of Welsh or English at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon throughout their time in the school, therefore there would be no change in terms of parents’ and pupils’ engagement with the school.

- **Observations provided by the local authority's Welsh medium Education Forum**

The following is a summary of observations provided by the local authority's Welsh medium Education Forum at a meeting held on 29th January 2021:

"The Welsh-medium Education Forum fully supports the proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, from the current dual-stream to Welsh-medium, on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022.

The proposal supports the Council's strategy to improve access to Welsh-medium education in the county, and it is sensible that consideration is given to the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon as the number of pupils attending the English stream has decreased substantially over the last few years. There are no English-medium pupils in Reception or year 1 class, and this shows that the demand in the Dyffryn Trannon catchment is for Welsh-medium education.

The Forum's view is that the proposal will improve educational provision. It will provide the opportunity for pupils to be educated in more appropriately sized classes, without the need to mix age groups, and in classes where there is no need to duplicate language provision.

The Forum also welcomes the fact that Powys County Council will support the provision of immersion provision in order to facilitate the process of changing the school's language category.

This is a positive step in relation to the educational provision in the Llanidloes catchment, where there is currently no Welsh-medium provision. If the proposal is successful, it will strengthen the need for Welsh-medium secondary provision in the Llanidloes catchment.

Alongside the consultation, the Forum recommends that the Council should also share information about the benefits of bilingualism and Welsh-medium education, as part of a promotional programme for parents and carers.

The Forum also recommends that the Council works in partnership with those providing early years provision in Welsh or English in the catchment, including cylchoedd meithrin and any other providers. There has already been close co-operation with Mudiad Meithrin in order to ensure Welsh-medium early years provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.

If the proposal is implemented, the Welsh-medium Education Forum would be happy to work with Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, to support the school to move along the language continuum, to ensure that the best possible opportunities are offered to Powys pupils by providing Welsh-medium provision which will create bilingual citizens."

- **How does the proposal fit with the authority's Welsh in Education Strategic Plan**

Since the Council's WESP for 2017-20 was developed, the Council has agreed a new Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys 2020-2030. This Strategy

includes a strategic aim to 'improve access to Welsh-medium provision across all key stage' and a strategic objective to 'move schools along the language continuum'. The proposal for Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon aligns with this.

- **Any future actions that will be needed in consequence of the change to continue to comply with the scheme or meet targets in the scheme.**

The proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon will have a positive effect on the Welsh language. It is not therefore anticipated that any future action will be needed in order to continue to comply with the scheme or its targets.

However, the Council recognises that if the proposal is implemented, it will need to actively monitor progress of the implementation of the change of language category at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, especially as it is happening on a year-by-year basis, in order to ensure its success.

vi) Issues raised at consultation

A number of comments were received during the consultation period which related to the proposal's impact on the Welsh language.

The comments received are listed in full in the consultation report produced in respect of this proposal along with the Council's response to the points raised, and are also summarised below:

- Comments relating to the positive impact of Welsh-medium education on pupils
- Additional support would be needed to support the change of language category e.g. working with other Welsh-medium schools / promotion of Welsh-medium education for non-Welsh speaking parents
- The proposal would have a positive impact on the Welsh language in the community
- The proposal would lead to increased use of the Welsh language
- Reference to the benefits of bilingualism
- Reference to the Welsh Government's 'Cymraeg 2050' strategy

vii) Conclusion

Implementation of the proposal would have a positive impact on the Welsh language, as in time, it would ensure that all pupils in the Trefeglwys catchment would access Welsh-medium education, and would become fully bilingual in Welsh and English, leading to an increase in the number of pupils able to use the Welsh language confidently, and contributing to the Welsh Government's Strategy to achieve a million Welsh speakers by 2050.

REPORT FOR: Decision

1. Purpose

- 1.1 On the 29th September 2020, the Council's Cabinet considered a Strategic Outline Case (SOC) which considered a range of options in order to address issues with the current operating model of Ysgol Calon Cymru, a dual stream secondary school which operates across two campuses in Mid Powys.
- 1.2 This is the **first phase** of the Ysgol Calon Cymru catchment transformation programme. The **second phase** will focus on reviewing primary and early years provision in the area.
- 1.3 Without requiring Cabinet to make a decision on the future operating model for Ysgol Calon Cymru, the SOC considered by Cabinet identified a 'preferred way forward', which is as follows:
- A new 11-18 English-medium campus in Llandrindod Wells; plus
 - A new/remodelled 4-18 Welsh-medium all-through campus in Builth Wells.
- 1.4 This report requests Cabinet approval to commence **informal engagement** with stakeholders on the preferred way forward.

2. Background

Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys

- 2.1 On the 14th April 2020, a new Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys was approved by the Leader via a delegated decision.
- 2.2 The Strategy was developed following extensive engagement with a range of stakeholders during two separate periods between October 2019 and March 2020.

2.3 The Strategy sets out a new vision for education in Powys, which is as follows:

'All children and young people in Powys will experience a high quality, inspiring education to help develop the knowledge, skills and attributes that will enable them to become healthy, personally fulfilled, economically productive, socially responsible and globally engaged citizens of 21st century Wales.'

2.3 The Strategy also sets out a number of guiding principles which will underpin the transformation of education in Powys. These are as follows:

- *A world class rural education system that has learner entitlement at its core*
- *Schools that are fully inclusive, with a culture of deep collaboration in order to improve learner outcomes and experience*
- *A broad choice and high quality of provision for 14 – 19-year-old learners, that includes both academic and vocational provision, meeting the needs of all learners, communities and the Powys economy*
- *Welsh-medium provision that is accessible and provides a full curriculum in Welsh from Meithrin to age 19 and beyond Provision for learners with Special Educational Needs (SEN)/Additional Learning Needs (ALN) that is accessible as near to home as is practicably possible, with the appropriate specialist teaching, support and facilities that enables every learner to meet their potential*
- *A digitally rich schools' sector that enables all learners and staff to enhance their teaching and learning experience*
- *Community-focused schools that are the central point for multi-agency services to support children, young people, families and the community*
- *Early years provision that is designed to meet the needs of all children, mindful of their particular circumstances, language requirements or any special or additional learning needs*
- *Financially and environmentally sustainable schools*
- *The highest priority is given to staff wellbeing and professional development*

3. The Case for Change

3.1 Ysgol Calon Cymru is a school that was established in September 2017, following the merger of Llandrindod High School and Builth Wells High School. It provides secondary education for pupils aged 11 – 18 across two campuses in both towns. The number on roll based on Teachers Centre data 11th May 2021 is 976. The school is a dual stream school with a small Welsh-medium stream delivered from the Builth Wells campus only. A new permanent headteacher was recently appointed, following a period of interim leadership arrangements.

3.2 The following summarises the case for change included within the SOC for Ysgol Calon Cymru, which identified three key issues:

- i) The current arrangement does not meet the strategic aim of the Council to improve learner entitlement and experience. The current operating model is neither educationally effective, financially efficient nor sustainable. The school had a deficit of £173,450 as of 31 March 2021 (previously forecast to be over £400,000) and is forecasting that this will grow to over £750,000 by the end of this financial year.
- ii) There is a risk to the authority's budget if the school is unable to bring its budget back to a balanced position.
- iii) The condition of the Llandrindod campus, in particular, is very poor and in need of significant investment. Condition assessments of both campuses were undertaken in February 2021, which identified that the estimated cost of bringing Llandrindod campus up to the whole school up to a condition A standard was £2.7m, and the overall condition is categorised as C, with three blocks C-. The Builth Wells campus also has a condition rating of C, with an estimated cost of £1.7m.
- iv) There is a need to significantly improve the learning entitlement and experience for Welsh-medium pupils and expand the limited offer of provision currently available. There are currently 139 pupils in the Welsh stream on the Builth Wells campus, and pupils transfer to the Welsh stream from dual-stream primary schools in Builth Wells, Llandrindod Wells and Rhayader, with some pupils also travelling from further afield.

3.3 Officers have been considering and testing various ways of achieving the preferred way forward, due to the significant complexities, constraints and dependencies that need to be factored in. These include:

- Phasing of the programme, further complicated by legislative requirements, capital funding requirements, building design and construction requirements;
- Complexities of establishing a very small Welsh-medium all-age school in terms of governance, staffing and funding;
- Impact of overall whole-life costs of the programme.

3.4 Having considered these issues, it is the view of officers that the best way of achieving the preferred way forward is as follows. Please note that this is indicative at this stage and would be further refined following a period of informal engagement.

Explanatory note

Llandrindod Wells

- Ysgol Calon Cymru pupils would remain on the Builth and Llandrindod campuses until the new build in Llandrindod is completed, when all English-medium pupils would transfer to the new accommodation. Free home-to-school transport would be provided for eligible pupils to

attend the new campus in Llandrindod, subject to a revision of the Home-to-School Transport Policy.

- It is expected that the new campus in Llandrindod Wells would be sited on the current playing fields of Ysgol Calon Cymru. This would mean that access to alternative sports facilities would be needed during the construction phase.
- There would be a need to ensure the complete safety of pupils and staff during the construction period, and the need to minimise any disruption to the operational management of Ysgol Calon Cymru
- Staff would be consulted about any potential change of work location
- The new build campus in Llandrindod Wells would have capacity for 950 pupils.
- Ysgol Calon Cymru would no longer deliver subjects through the medium of Welsh, apart from Welsh as a subject.

Builth Wells

- A temporary governing body would be established from January 2023 to oversee the establishment of the new all-age Welsh-medium school. The temporary governing body would work closely with the governors and SLT of Ysgol Calon Cymru on the establishment of the school.
- The school would open for pupils in Years 7 to 11 in September 2024 and it is recognised that the school would be very small to begin with with approximately 133 pupils in years 7 to 11. Sixth form provision would also be provided but it is not possible to estimate these numbers. Assuming that all current pupils in Welsh medium streams in the feeder primary schools will transfer to the new Welsh medium secondary school in Builth Wells, the year group sizes are estimated to be as follows:

- This is a similar position to many new Welsh-medium schools across Wales which start as small schools but in general these schools have grown over time as parents are reassured that there is a clear progression route for pupils through all key stages. As is common practice across Wales, immersion facilities will also be put in place to enable those pupils that have not attended Welsh medium provision prior to Key Stage 3 to join the Welsh Medium secondary provision
- The target size for the secondary phase would be 300, based on year group sizes of 60. This is a similar size to the secondary phase of Ysgol Bro Hyddgen, Machynlleth.

- Builth Wells Primary School would become an English-medium primary school in September 2025, when the Welsh-medium primary pupils join the all-age school in Builth Wells.

The reasons for this are:

- Would retain secondary provision in both towns
- Would provide some stability in Llandrindod Wells as Ysgol Calon Cymru would remain as the provider
- Would provide a greater mass of English-medium learners on one campus
- Broader curriculum could be provided to English-medium learners
- Would be no need to duplicate English-medium provision across two sites
- Would improve post-16 offer by having a greater number of learners in one location
- A new Welsh-medium all-age school would be established which would provide an opportunity to 'rebrand' Welsh-medium provision in the Mid Powys area
- A Welsh-medium all-age school would provide an improved Welsh-medium experience
- Would provide access to designated Welsh-medium primary provision
- All-age Welsh-medium model would promote transition into Welsh-medium secondary provision
- Broader Welsh-medium curriculum could be provided
- Two separate schools which would be funded separately, therefore no requirement for one site to subsidise the other
- Would be more attractive to prospective headteachers
- Meets all the Critical Success Factors

7 Advice

- 7.1 It is therefore advised that Cabinet approves a period of informal engagement takes place. It is anticipated that this will take place during September and October 2021.
- 7.2 The reason for this is to ensure that all stakeholders would be able to contribute to the development of the strategic vision for transforming education in the area, and to inform the development of proposals that would then be subject to formal consultation. The complexity of the plans require further engagement to understand any potential issues that are currently unforeseen.
- 7.3 The informal engagement would take the form of focus groups with parents, governors, pupils and other stakeholders, and other means e.g. surveys etc. A report would then be produced for the consideration of Cabinet, and, if approved, formal consultation would then proceed.

8. Resource Implications

- 8.1 The estimated capital cost of the plans for the two campuses of Ysgol Calon Cymru as set out in the Strategic Outline Case amounted to £46 million, split between the Llandrindod Wells campus new build proposal at £28 million and a re-modelling of the Builth Wells campus at £18 million. These are high level estimates at this stage which will be refined further during the business case process. No capital funding has been identified for these projects at this time, however following the outcome of the consultation process, a strategic outline case will be submitted to Welsh Government 21st Century Schools Programme and will be included within the overarching financial strategy which is currently under development. If this were successful then the capital investment required of Powys County Council would be £16 million (£10 million at the Llandrindod Wells campus and £6 million at the Builth Wells campus). This capital investment would avoid the existing backlog maintenance costs totalling over £7 million identified in the SOC and highlighted in paragraph 1.3(b) above.
- 8.2 The amount of funding provided to schools is driven by the funding formula. Any change to the formula funding provided will impact on the Council's revenue budget. As set out in the previous report, the initial SOC for the entire scheme suggested an annual revenue saving to the Council's revenue budget of around £300,000 upon full implementation, however this was a high-level estimate based on the scheme as proposed at the time, excluding estimated transport costs. All costs / savings estimates will be further refined as plans are developed further.
- 8.3 The costings of the proposals set out in this report relate to phase 1 of the transformation for this catchment only and the savings identified in the SOC are anticipated to be delivered by the second phase of the overall scheme. The estimated costings to the Council based on the projected pupil numbers set out above are:
- A net effect on the delegated formula of an increase of around £150,000 per annum. This includes an initial estimate of £66,000 for additional rates charges for the new buildings.
 - An initial assessment of transport costs estimates an additional cost of approximately £350,000 per annum to provide home-to-school transport for pupils upon full implementation of the scheme, although this may be partially mitigated by co-ordinating the timings of the school day at the schools. It should also be noted that further work is required to develop the most cost effective and efficient school transport solution.
- 8.4 These costings do not include the revenue savings that would fall to Ysgol Calon Cymru itself, resulting in the avoidance of the recurring annual in-year deficit currently projected at between £370,000 and

£440,000. The Council will continue to work with Ysgol Calon Cymru to ensure that the school budgets comply with the scheme for financing schools and are within the funding envelope available and that any cumulative deficit is minimised. The initial SOC estimated that the schools themselves would also benefit from a reduction in their running costs when the proposals are fully implemented, although this would not impact directly on the Council's budget.

- 8.5 A virement of £500,000 to develop initial feasibilities for the Ysgol Calon Cymru Llandrindod campus scheme was approved by Cabinet on the 18th May 2021, and it is noted that this is carried out at risk should the project not go forward.
- 8.6 Development and implementation of the proposal would require involvement from a number of service areas, including staff from the Schools Service, Finance, HR and ICT. These service areas are kept informed of the development of the proposal throughout the statutory process.
- 8.7 The Head of Finance (Section 151 Officer) states: *“The revenue funding to support the Schools funding formula is considered as part of the Council Budget process and the individual allocation to the new school will be recalculated at the point of opening. Confirmation of the funding for the scheme will be considered at Full Business Case submission and is not subject to approval at this stage.”*

9. Legal implications

- 9.1 Legal: the recommendations can be accepted from a legal point of view
- 9.2 The Head of Legal and Democratic Services (Monitoring Officer) has commented as follows: “ I note the legal comment and have nothing to add to the report”.

11. Integrated Impact Assessment

- 11.1 An integrated impact assessment has been carried out on the preferred way forward as part of the Programme Business Case considered by Cabinet on 29th September 2020.

12. Recommendation

- 12.1 It is recommended that:

- Cabinet approves the commencement of a period of **informal engagement** on the preferred way forward for Ysgol Calon Cymru
 - A new 11-18 English-medium campus in Llandrindod Wells; plus
 - A new/remodelled 4-18 Welsh-medium all-through campus in Builth Wells.

- The informal engagement will take place in September and October 2021, and an engagement report would then be produced for the consideration of Cabinet towards the end of the year and, if approved, formal consultation would then proceed as part of the statutory school reorganisation process.

REPORT FOR: Information and Decision

1. Purpose

- 1.1. To provide Cabinet with the revenue budget outturn for the 2020/21 financial year. This includes information on the additional funding streams received from Welsh Government since the last report and how this impacted on the outturn position.

2. Background

- 2.1. The Council has encountered unprecedented challenges since the COVID crisis began, business critical activity was prioritised for most of the year and directed resource away from normal activities. Despite the additional pressures the Council has completed the closure of its accounts and produced the year end management accounts to report the financial position.
- 2.2. The Councils budget was closely monitored and controlled during the year with regular reports presented to Cabinet. The final outturn produced a net underspend, after contributions to specific reserves, of £4.24 million against the £187.7 million budget a 2.3% variance (excluding Schools and the Housing Revenue Account).
- 2.3. Appendix A provides a breakdown of the financial position for each service, broken down into categories covering cost pressures, cost underspends, grants received, service reductions and loss of income.
- 2.4. The Council's financial position has been greatly helped by the support provided by Welsh Government to fund a substantial element of Covid related expenditure, without which the outturn would be a significant overspend. The pandemic and the restrictions imposed continue to impact on the delivery of services across the Council, which resulted in additional costs and loss of income throughout this year and into 2021-22. Funding claimed and received through the Welsh Government Hardship Fund during 2020/21 is just over £18 million.

3. Revenue Outturn

- 3.1. Table 1 below summarises the outturn position across Council services excluding HRA and delegated schools, a £4.24 million underspend after agreed specific reserve movements have been completed.
- 3.2. Schools underspent against their approved budgets by £5.27 million and these will be carried forward within their delegated reserves.
- 3.3. The HRA outturn was a £1.92 million underspend which is carried forward into its specific reserve.

- 3.4. Through February and March a number of Welsh Government funding announcements were made with additional grants provided to support council services, some of this funding has to be carried forward and utilised in 2021/22, whilst other funding is now offsetting expenditure in 2020/21 that the Council expected to support. This funding significantly improved the Council's financial position during the final quarter of the year. Council considered this non-recurring improvement, in February 2021, as they finalised and approved the budget for 2021/22 and approved the setting up of some specific reserves to support recovery from the pandemic and to support the Capital Programme and Transformation as a priority.
- 3.5. In light of the improved position, the Schools Service and Section 151 Officer reviewed the central education budget and costs of £496k supporting the Transforming Education strategy programme (including ALN transformation) were funded from the service revenue budget rather than utilising 21st Century schools funding, this will safeguard the funding streams in future years.
- 3.6. Further pressure is falling on services as they move into recovery, with demand for services in some areas increasing beyond the budget allocations approved for 2021/22. The improved outturn position provides additional opportunities for the Council to address this non recurrent demand quickly and it is proposed that a further £1 million is set aside to assist council services with this recovery. Services

will draw upon this support through the submission and approval of a business case clearly demonstrating need and the benefits to our residents.

- 3.7. The council is also able to draw support from other sources of recovery funding, including Levelling up Funding, match funding is required as leverage to draw upon this funding and it is proposed that £1 million is set aside in a specific reserve for this purpose.
- 3.8. It is proposed that the remaining balance of the surplus, £2.241 million, be transferred into a specific Capital Financing Reserve to support the Council Capital Programme, reducing the Councils borrowing requirements and easing the pressure on the revenue budget.
- 3.9. Further detail about the outturn position for each service area is provided in Appendix B, with Heads of Service setting out their narrative that explains the financial position and activities being undertaken.
- 3.10. A summary of the financial movements between February and March are explained in Appendix C.

4. Welsh Government Support

- 4.1. The Welsh Government Local Authority Hardship Fund continues to support additional costs incurred by the Council and its stakeholders due to the Covid Pandemic. It supports the additional cost associated with Social Care, Homelessness, PPE, Free School Meals, general additional expenses, and the Mortuary Facility. The fund also provides support for the loss on income to the Council. In addition Welsh Government has provided unhyponothecated funding to support the Council summarised in Table 2.

- 4.2. The Council has also worked with wider public sector partners across Wales and Welsh Government to provide significant one-off support through numerous funds for support to local businesses, the voluntary sector and a one off £500 payment to carers. The Council acted as an agent for the Welsh Government in reviewing, collating, agreeing, and processing these payments across the schemes, as summarised in Table 3.

4.3. Claims totalling £94,492 were made for 174 staff on furlough from the Governments' Job Retention Scheme for March 2021. This takes the total recovered under the scheme for the year to £866,683.

5. Cost reductions

5.1. In March 2020, the Council approved cost reduction proposals of £10.79 million. In addition, undelivered cost reductions in 2019/20 of £1.60 million have been rolled forward for delivery in the current year. This increases the value of cost reductions required during 2020/21 to £12.394 million.

5.2. The summary at Table 4 shows that 76% or £9.468 million has been delivered in year. £2.926 million, 24% is unachieved. The budget approved by Council in February 2021 removed £1.634 million of the unachieved savings from service budgets which are not considered to be deliverable, thus ensuring a robust and deliverable budget for next year.

6. Reserves

6.1 The reserves position at Table 5 sets out the reserve movements and balances at year end. Budgeted movements from reserve were planned totalling £3.959 million, whilst the actual year end movement is an increase of £19.752 million to £52.255 million, with the general reserve £13.713 million representing 7.3% of total net revenue budget. (excluding Schools and the HRA).

6.2 Within specific reserves the key movements are:

a) Two specific reserves have been set up, as agreed in the February cabinet report:

- £1.8 million of one-off funding to put in place a Powys Recovery Fund, this fund will support Communities and Council Services and drawn down over the next 2 years.
- £1.5 million of the surplus for remedial works by way of setting up a specific reserve to fund both revenue and capital essential remedial work to minimise the level of risk that the Council would be placed under.

b) Some grants received, mainly late in year, have not been utilised and rolled forward for use in 2021-22 these total £2.5 million and are held in the grants unapplied reserve. In comparison last year we held £0.92 million and the movement is £2 million.

c) A number of specific reserves have established from some service underspends these are requested as virements in section 7 totalling £3.1 million.

6.3 The specific reserves proposed in sections 3.6, 3.7 and 3.8 above, if approved by Council, will reduce the increase in the General Fund reserve and increase the level of Specific reserves.

6.4 The Housing Revenue Account business plan originally planned to utilise £1.379 million of reserves, but this position has now reverted to a contribution of £562,000 to reserves. This is due to less budget required to support repairs and maintenance delivery.

6.5 The breakdown of the school's balances and the transfer to reserve is set out below at Table 6.

6.4.1 The year end position for schools has moved significantly since last month's forecast, this is due to the allocation of over £4m grant to support schools core costs, see section 7.2 for further detail.

6.4.2 **Primary** - The outturn position was a contribution to reserves of £2.35 million a swing of over £3 million against the budget plan.

6.4.3 **Secondary** - The Secondary sector had a forecast call on reserves £910,000, which materialised as a contribution to reserves of £1.354 million, a swing of £2.264 million in month.

6.4.4 **Special** - The special sector had a £241,000 forecast contribution to reserves, this increased to £435,000 since last month.

7. Carry Forward Balances and Grants

7.1 Several requests have been made to utilise year end underspends to support specific essential activities and pressures in the new financial year. Specific reserves will hold these balances until drawn down in 2021-22. As per the Councils' Virement Rules, *"if appropriate, and on the advice of the Section 151 Officer, the Cabinet may agree the carry forward of departmental underspends of up to £500,000 and Full Council may agree to carry forward departmental underspends of £500,001 and above provided always that there is an overall underspend on the Council's reserve budget."*

7.1.1 Social Care - Essential maintenance work totalling £350,000 at the Powys owned care homes. As the work will be incurred in 2021-22 the funding will be held in a specific reserve until work is completed and then drawn down by the provider. Identification and planning for these activities were delayed due to the pandemic limiting visitors to care homes. When surveys were conducted several deficiencies were identified and work required on fire doors, fire compartmentation, and fire alarms. This work has commenced and £220,000 was funded earlier in 2020-21. The outlay is funded within Adult Social Care and is part of their overall outturn.

7.1.2 Transport fund - The fleet service has reported an underspend against depreciation charges of £637,000 (due to delayed replacement of the waste vehicles) and has received sales receipts for vehicles equating to £93,000 in the financial year. The service have asked to utilise this underspend by contributing to the transport fund of £730,000 to assist the financing of the procurement of new waste vehicles in 2021/22 because the service has seen an increase in the cost of replacing the vehicles of £606,000

- 7.1.3 Highways Roads Maintenance – Received £950,000 road maintenance revenue grant, which has released previously committed county revenue budget which the service have requested to be paid into a specific reserve to finance storm expenditure in 21/22 as a contingency in the event that Welsh Government grant for floods is not made available.
- 7.1.4 Actuarial Pension Review - £236,000 of over collected pension contributions are transferred into the specific reserve in readiness for the actuarial pension review,
- 7.1.5 New Ways of Working Reserve – A transfer of £435,000 is made into a specific reserve to enable appropriate equipment for home working.
- 7.1.6 Mid Wales Growth Deal Reserve – A transfer of £100,000 is requested from the underspend in the Regeneration service to the specific Mid Wales Growth Deal reserve to fund the ongoing costs of the growth deal in 2021-22.
- 7.1.7 RDP Town/Community Plan – A transfer of £100,000 is requested into a specific reserve, this will fund the match funding requirement of an EU funding offer and will support COVID recovery.
- 7.1.8 Development Management – Planning fee income of £150,000 received in March is requested to be transferred into a specific reserve to support the costs of additional costs of the planning team relating to this large planning application in 2021-22.
- 7.1.9 Transformation and Communication - £155,640 under spend is rolled forward into 2021-22 for two key activities:
- £73,500 of income received to be rolled forward to support Communications activities, from a three-month campaign to recruit volunteers supporting the Public Service Board's response to Covid; a county-wide Support Powys Local campaign; a marketing campaign to encourage 16/17year-olds to take part in the 2021 Senedd elections; a communications and marketing campaign supporting regeneration activities and support for the Wales Trading Standards team.
 - £82,140 for data visualisation and analytic work to support COVID19 undertaken for Track and Trace. For the update of Population Assessment (includes but not limited to the gathering of datasets and refresh of existing data, connection to gateways and creation of PowerBI reports).using WG funding to undertake Well-being Assessment in 2021/22 – including analytics, graphic design, translation and communications.
- 7.1.10 ICT Refresh Reserve – Two requests are made:
- Payments from services for additional ICT equipment are transferred into a specific reserve for replacement of equipment in future years when equipment needed, £36,570
 - The service also requests to transfer £100,000 of their underspend into a specific reserve for future replacement of equipment rather than utilise capital.
- 7.2 A number of grants received in year have funding conditions that require underspends to be rolled forward into 2021/22, and a specific reserve has been set up that will be fully drawn down next year. As per the Councils' Virement Rules, Cabinet shall be notified where the Authority receives an allocation of funding from another public body for a specified purpose, and the sum shall be incorporated into the revenue budget or capital programme as appropriate.:
- 7.2.1 Land Drainage – Unspent grant £205,942 from Welsh Government that the service have requested to be paid into a specific reserve to fund any shortfall in the statutory fee income target over the next 5 years.
- 7.2.2 Elections - A grant was received to support electoral reform, the remainder of the grant £50,225 is rolled forward into 2021-22.

- 7.2.3 Army Covenant Grant £114,740 – A grant is received specifically to support armed forces personnel; it is requested this is rolled forward into 2021/22.
- 7.2.4 Home to School Transport Grant original allocation of £3,578,859 - To support learner's return to school or college on registered local bus services, to increase frequencies where demand exceeds capacity, to improve access to jobs and support economic recovery. The February forecast assumed that £1,811,284 of this funding would be utilised in 2020/21, actual outturn in March utilised £1,675,107 of the funding awarded, the remaining balance of £1,903,752 is requested to be placed into the grant unapplied reserve and rolled forward into 2021/22.
- 7.2.5 PPE Stock – The grant and costs of PPE that is held as stock of £159,380 is rolled into the 2021-22 financial year to show the actual usage and funding of the cost of the PPE when required by services.
- 7.2.6 ICT Section 33 Reserve – It was agreed by Joint Partnership Board that £81,180 of the ICT Section 33 reserve be used to support the cost in the Councils' ICT department for the additional support required by the Powys Teaching Board due to COVID-19.
- 7.3 A virement request is proposed to set up three new specific reserves and utilise the year end outturn underspend that has been transferred into the general fund:
- 7.3.1 Further pressure is falling on services as they move into recovery, with demand for services in some areas increasing beyond the budget allocations approved for 2021/22. The improved outturn position provides additional opportunities for the Council to address this non recurrent demand quickly and it is proposed that a further £1 million is set aside to assist council services with this recovery. Services will draw upon this support through the submission and approval of a business case clearly demonstrating need and the benefits to our residents.
- 7.3.2 The council is also able to draw support from other sources of recovery funding, including Levelling up Funding, match funding is required as leverage to draw upon this funding and it is proposed that £1 million is set aside in a specific reserve for this purpose.
- 7.3.3 It is proposed that the remaining balance of the surplus, £2.241 million, be transferred into a specific Capital Financing Reserve to support the Council Capital Programme, reducing the Councils borrowing requirements and easing the pressure on the revenue budget
- 7.4 A number of grants were received in March totalling £5.008 million and were used to support activity mainly in this financial year. These are listed below at table 7:

8. Transformation

- 8.1 Transformation of the councils' services is critical in providing an appropriate level of service to our residents at a much lower cost ensuring that the councils budget is maintained on a sustainable footing for the future. Transformation activities totalling £2.3 million were funded through revenue rather than using Capital Receipts as previously planned. This will allow us to maintain a greater level of receipts to be used to support the capital programme in future years.
- 8.2 Table 8 below summarises the transformation costs against the budget plan. The underspend in year will be rolled forward and used in 2021/22.

- 8.3 A final report summarising the savings and benefits achieved from utilisation of the transformation funding will be presented in the next finance report.

9. Impact of Capital

- 9.1 Capital investment and the financing of capital activities have a significant impact on the authority's revenue position. In 2020/21 £61.83 million was spent (including HRA) on capital investments versus the revised budget of £72.91 million. This resulted in an underspend of £11.08 million (15%) on the council's Capital Budget.
- 9.2 The majority of the underspend can be attributed to delays in the delivery of the capital programme. The budgets associated with these projects will, where necessary, be rolled forward into 2021/22.
- 9.3 The revenue budget supports the cost of borrowing for capital purposes and recognises the future need to borrow through the minimum revenue provision budget. The revenue budgets were approved to support the original capital programme of £132.872 million. The actual capital spend was 53% less. Grants were maximised to reduce the call on borrowing, with a number received from Welsh Government in the last two months of the year. The actual net cost of borrowing was £15.59 million of

which £10.166 million was chargeable to the general fund generating an underspend of £1.98 million which helped support the wider service revenue budgets.

- 9.4 On 12th March Cabinet approved a revision to the Council Minimum Revenue Provision Policy (MRP). Under both the existing and proposed policy the asset life/annuity method is used to calculate the MRP for the Council's prudential borrowing and the HRA's post settlement debt. The method for the Council's supported borrowing and the HRA historic/settlement debt changes under the new policy.
- 9.5 Within the existing policy (as agreed in 2017 for the previous policy change) the overall movements on MRP included an expected reclaim of £4.5m of the £19.5m overprovision. Because of the benefit drawn from the new revised MRP policy only £2.09 million was charged against MRP. This figure includes £767,000, agreed in February 2021 to make an additional payment into the MRP account, being an advance payment to be utilised in 2021/22 thus negating the requirement to fund this through the budget in 2021-22.
- 9.6 Of the original £19.5m overprovision £5m is still available to be claimed over the next two years.

10 Key Financial Risks

- 10.1 In earlier Cabinet reports we identified the key financial risks that are set out in the Corporate and Covid Specific Risk Registers and continually monitored and assessed.
- 10.2 The greatest risk remains on our ability to deliver a balanced budget in future years, we must continue to limit the possibility of future deficit and the wider impact on our reserves. This is fundamental in supporting our financial resilience over the Medium and Longer Term and our ability to approve and deliver balanced budgets.
- 10.3 Treasury Management, maintaining the Councils cash flow to meet liabilities, is also under scrutiny and continues to be monitored daily. We must ensure that the Council has sufficient liquidity to meet its immediate costs such as salaries and wages, HMRC taxation, and maintaining payment to suppliers and precepting authorities. The current position remains stable.
- 10.4 The Council remains under borrowed as we continue to utilise our cash reserves to underpin our cashflow. We can borrow both in the short to medium or long term, our approach is regularly updated and explained as part of the Treasury Management update to Audit Committee.

11. Resource Implications

The Head of Finance (Section 151 Officer) has provided the following comment:

The virus and the measures imposed continue to have an unprecedented detrimental financial impact on the Council and this is likely to continue throughout 2021-22 and into future years.

The financial support provided by Welsh Government has been significant and has been instrumental in improving the Council's financial position for the current year.

The additional funding received is welcomed but it is important to note that this is not recurring funding and should be utilised to support one off costs that will aid our

recovery, meet short term additional demand but also improve our longer term financial resilience.

The establishment of the Powys Recovery Fund will support communities and council services to recover from the pandemic, in addition the match funding proposed will enable the drawing down of further funding streams to support the Powys economy.

Using revenue funds to support transformation costs this year will release capital receipts back for use in the Capital Programme and this together with the proposed Capital Financing Reserve will reduce the need to borrow and improving our financial sustainability whilst enabling the Council to deliver its objectives. Addressing existing remedial issues across the Councils assets will also ensure our buildings are effectively maintained removing pressure on the Capital Programme in future years. Setting aside funding to meet specific one off costs will ensure that the Councils General Fund is maintained at an appropriate level.

Welsh Government have confirmed continued hardship fund support in 2021/22 but this is currently only available until September and is dependent on how much support is required across all authorities in Wales within the limit of the fund, so risk remains.

Our Medium Term Financial Strategy continues to be extremely challenging with a significant budget gap of £38 million over the next 4 years. The financial plans will be subject to ongoing review, funding assumptions will be revisited as more information becomes available, revised budget gaps calculated and clear plans of how we can bridge the gaps will be developed. The Council must continue to take every opportunity to reduce costs and limit the financial impact on its budget, reducing the financial pressure on future years and ensure the financial sustainability of the Council.

2020/21 has been an extraordinary year and the outturn position reflects the significant support provided to Welsh Councils. We must ensure that we maximise the opportunity this presents to improve our financial resilience as we move into further uncertainty and the continuing challenges ahead.

There has been an increase of circa 20% (compared with the same period last year) since May/June time and this is being sustained. The forecast outturn variance in the February report was £349,000 contribution to the general reserves. This changed to a contribution from reserves of £111,000 – a difference of £460,000. The main reasons for this change is as follows:

Schools Service:

- Schools Service utilised their underspend of £350,000 identified in February to contribute £496,000 towards the wider Transforming Education strategy programme costs (including ALN transformation) to fund this from revenue instead of 21st Century grants to safeguard funding streams in future years.
- School Catering underspend of £83,000 from a reduction in canteen equipment maintenance costs as a result of the school closures due to Covid-19
- Post-16 administration grant £36,000 off-setting existing costs
- Further underspend on Early Years settings following the confirmation of the final payments to settings for the Spring term.

Non-delegated function (specific reserve)

Non-delegated functions include early years settings and after school clubs which were forecasting a contribution to reserves of £315,000 in February which reduced to an actual contribution to reserves was £218,000 resulting in a variance of £97,000.

Supply Insurance (specific reserve)

A £35,000 transfer from reserves resulted from the authority's Supply Insurance scheme where income received from schools that buy into the scheme was less than the actual costs of claims made by schools.

Highways, Transport and Recycling are reporting a outturn under spend of **£1,085,000** at year end.

Background

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic this has put a lot of pressure on a number of services within HTR, particularly Waste Services, due to the additional waste being collected and the need to keep staff socially distanced, which has led to increased costs.

Furthermore, due to businesses closing temporarily the income for the Trade Waste Service was also negatively impacted. As a result, the service was showing a deficit year end of £446k, but this was offset by underspends in other areas within HTR.

Overall, the position within HTR has improved by £398k between February & March 2021, which is predominantly due to:

1. increased income through Highways Design of £120k.
2. £100k on fleet workshop expenditure
3. Street-works income is £90k better than expected; and
4. a further £110k use of grants which has been set against the base budget.

Cost Pressures

General issues around costs not funded by WG

There are some staffing cost pressures due to part time staffing undertaking additional hours to support covid 19 activities, including processing of the business grants and administering the £500 carers grant, Welsh Government have provided additional administration grant funding now to support some of these expenses.

Insurance claims continue to rise, and we have now added a provision of £300k to this cost centre (Employers' liability is an additional £150k almost doubling, Public Liability increased by £150k). In addition, the cost of insurance premiums which were renewed in December have increased by £150k per annum, of which £50k is attributable to this financial year. Additional base budget has been approved to fund the extra cost of premiums in 2021/22.

Redeployment

We have a member of staff working on Track and Trace, but have backfilled his post, and this is being claimed against Welsh Government.

Cost Underspends

Across the service there are non-pay savings such as the travel, vacancies slippage budgets from undertaking service delivery remotely through Teams. Travel to schools, to claimants etc have mainly ceased. We have had administration grant from Welsh Government for the work we have done in delivering the business grants and carers grant schemes.

Cost Reductions

All staff have been under considerable pressure through Covid, buying PPE, administering business grant support, processing, and coordinating Covid Claims and collating financial assumptions to understand the changing forecast outturn. There has not been capacity to develop the £150k transformation activities as expected.

Cost Pressures

The main increase is due to £2.3m transformation costs and redundancies have been charged here rather than utilise capital receipts and use of the capitalisation direction. This allows the receipts to be rolled forward and used to support the capital programme.

Staff Redeployment

Cost Underspends

Corporate underspends have improved by a further £1.913 million since the last report. The main changes relate to:

- £725k better on final MRP/interest on borrowing position because the capital outturn is reduced by £11 million on previous month of which it was assumed 80% would be funded by borrowing - not now needed, in total £1.98 million under
- £400k above the plan has been collected from council tax premiums.
- £236k over collection of pension contributions which will go into specific reserve for the actuarial pension review.

1. Purpose


1.1 This report provides the outturn financial position for the Council's capital programme for 2020/21 and the funding streams used to support the programme.

2. Financial Update


2.1 The final working budget for the 2020/21 Capital Programme, after accounting for approved virements, is £72.91 million.

2.2 Actual spend amounts to £61.83 million, representing 85% of the total budget.

2.3 Chart 1 below summarises the financial position for each service.



2.4 Chart 2 below sets out how the 2020/21 capital programme has been financed, 38% is funded through borrowing, the interest cost for this is charged to the revenue account.



2.5 The revenue expenditure to cover the borrowing for past and present capital schemes is charged to the revenue budget, the table below shows the breakdown for 2020/21.

2.6 Based on the amounts above, 3.8% of the net revenue budget of £269 million is supporting the past and present capital spend. It is essential that the investment in our capital programme is affordable over the short, medium, and longer term and can demonstrate tangible benefits linked to the council's priorities.

3. Grants Received

3.1 The following grants have been received since the last report and are included for information.

3.2 Highways, Transport and Recycling

3.3 Welsh Government revised the original Active Travel Grant offer from July 2020 to reduce the funding by £0.57 million. Delays have occurred on the Newtown Bridge Active Travel scheme, that has meant we have been unable to utilise the full grant allocation this financial year, however WG remain committed to funding the scheme in future years.

3.4 Regeneration

3.5 A grant of £1.26 million has been secured from the Welsh Government Transforming Towns Programme for a new Place Making grant scheme in 2021-22 which will operate across Mid Wales and will to be launched in May 21. A grant of £380,000 has been secured towards the development of a first phase of business units at Abermule Business Park.

3.6 Education

3.7 Ministerial approval for the Ysgol Gymraeg y Trallwng has been granted and WG have confirmed that they will fund 50% (£4.56 million) of the total scheme cost (£9.11 million) with £0.65 million received in 2020/21 which was a year earlier than anticipated.

3.8 Legal & Democratic Services

3.9 £0.02 million has been awarded for Welsh Government Digital Democracy Fund to facilitate communication and participation between councils and the public.

4. Reprofiling Budgets Across Financial Years

4.1 Work is ongoing with project managers to review the capital schemes and the expenditure to date against the budget allocated. Where appropriate budgets will be reprofiled to align them with revised spending profiles. Projects that are reporting underspends will be reviewed and budgets released if they are no longer required.

5. Capital Receipts

5.1 Capital receipts totaling £2.10 million have been received during the financial year. There are currently sales agreed to the value of £1.15 million which are at the legal stage of the process.

5.2 Future sales are very much reliant on being able to market property in a timely way to allow acceptable offers to be received and sales completed. The ongoing impact of Covid will increase the risk that the completion of some agreed sales will be delayed or indeed lost. There is increased market uncertainty which may lead to a reduction in demand and offers.

5.3 The Council's Transformation Programme was budgeted to be funded by Capital receipts through the capitalisation directive. Due to the improved financial position for this year these costs have been funded from the revenue budget, retaining the capital receipts to support the Capital Strategy in future years.

6. Resource Implications

6.1 The Head of Finance (Section 151 Officer) provides the following comment:

The capital programme this year has been disrupted by the pandemic with expenditure for some projects having to be reprofiled. The slippage on schemes together with the receipt of new funding streams has seen a reduction in the need to borrow this year to cover capital expenditure. The council remains committed to investing in its assets

and the part this plays in the delivery of the Council's priorities and Vision 2025. The provision of the right assets in the right place at the right time will ensure the effective and efficient delivery of a comprehensive range of quality services. Maintaining the capital programme also has a significant regeneration impact for the economy of Powys. The council must continue to identify and consider the options available to fund capital expenditure that minimises the ongoing revenue implications of historic capital expenditure and of any new investments, this will ensure that the capital investment plans of the local authority are affordable, prudent and sustainable.

7. Legal implications

7.1 The Monitoring Officer has no specific concerns with this report.

Major Improvements

The Schools Major Improvements Programme supports the improvement of education facilities and infrastructure for pupils. In this financial year, 67 projects were completed.

The improvements include the installation of new windows, replacement of fire doors, installation of new boilers and controls, disability alterations, resurfacing of road, playground and pathways, upgrading of accommodation for early years, flood prevention schemes, upgrading and installing new electrical, gas, water and foul/waste infrastructure and safeguarding (fencing/gates/school reception) works to meet legislative and Estyn requirements.

The impact of COVID-19 at the end of the financial year has seen some work stop and sites closedown. These projects will resume when possible and have been re-programmed for delivery in 2021/22 financial year.

21st Century Schools programme

Through the 21st Century Schools Programme, major investment was made during the 2020/21 financial year.

Welshpool CiW Primary School was completed and opened to staff and children of key workers and vulnerable children on 6th of January 2021, after a successful building and transitioning process. Due to gradual lifting of Covid-19 restrictions, the school became fully operational and opened to all pupils on 15th March 2021.

Ysgol Gymraeg y Trallwng was re-tendered and Wynne Construction, a Denbighshire based contractor, was appointed to lead on the construction of the UK's first hybrid passivhaus and Grade II listed building project. Powys County Council will be working with the contractor to ensure that community benefits targets are met and to ensure that a high proportion of project spend is spent in Powys.

Ysgol Cedewain project progressed at pace during the 2020/21 financial year, with the completion of the RIBA 2 concept designs. The procurement process to appoint a Design and Build contractor to complete the designs, and to construct the school has concluded and the successful contractor is due to be announced imminently.

Brynllwarch Outline Business Case was approved by Powys CC Cabinet and Welsh Government in September 2020, and RIBA stage 2 designs are now complete.

The SOC to replace Ladywell Green and Hafren buildings in Newtown with one school building, in line with the recent school re-organisation process, was also approved by Powys CC and Welsh Government in late 2020. This project forms a key part of the North Powys Wellbeing Programme, which is now progressing at pace with a commission agreed to undertake further site investigation works.

Bro Hyddgen Community Campus project progressed at pace in 2020/21, with the feasibility and early design work concluding that the scheme is viable. Powys CC Cabinet and Welsh Government approved the campus funding envelope in September 2020 and the project planning application and procurement process is due commence during 2021/22 financial year.

Work also commenced in developing project briefs and feasibilities for pipeline schemes.

Housing & Community Development

The Council has approved a five-year programme which has enabled replacement of plant, fixtures, end-of-life equipment, structural materials, playing surfaces and decoration throughout the leisure facilities in the county. The capital commitment supports the Council's 'landlord' responsibilities as part of the leisure contract but also ensures that the buildings are fit for purpose, compliant, attractive and provide a positive customer experience. Leisure Services in Powys not only support the overall well-being of our residents and communities but contribute to the health & care agendas, learning & skills – as a collaborative partner to the School's Transformation Programme, and the economy by hosting and delivering local, regional and national events and competitions.

A sample of the projects completed or in progress include -

- Complete resurfacing of two large car parks in Newtown & Welshpool
- Replacement pool surround & changing rooms in Knighton
- Replacement of Pool Dosing systems and Circulation Pumps in various pools
- Complete replacement of boilers in Welshpool and Brecon
- Replacement of redundant and end of life flooring, doors, air handling units and lighting systems
- Improvement and development of the fitness suite at Builth Wells Sports Centre. (There was also external 'recovery' funding from Sport Wales to support this project)
- Replacement outdoor (artificial) playing surface / carpet in Welshpool
- Replacement outdoor (artificial) playing surface in Llanidloes
- Replacement of outdoor floodlights in Welshpool & Newtown
- Replacement / improvement of squash courts in Llanfyllin

HRA

The affordable housing new build programme is progressing well. As of the 31st March there were 4 new homes completed, a further 114 homes in construction, with several more sites being progressed for development. Seven Passivhaus properties in Sarn are nearing hand over, with work on the 32 properties at the site in Brecon also approaching completion. The team have successfully applied for WG grant funding, the confirmation of which assists in ensuring that these new build schemes remain affordable within the HRA Business Plan. The affordability of future schemes will depend on the availability of grant funding, more information from WG is expected in 2021.

Some capital spend within the service has been delayed due to the ongoing Covid 19 pandemic, the service has worked with Finance colleagues to reprofile expenditure accordingly.

Approximately £12m has been spent on major refurbishment of council dwellings. Renewal of kitchens, bathrooms, heating systems, and replacement of roofs is continuing across the county and more investment has been committed in the next few years to improve properties for our residents.

In total 78 homes were fitted with new kitchens, 105 homes were fitted with new bathrooms, 128 homes had upgraded heating systems, 28 homes were rewired, 406 homes were fitted with new double-glazed windows, 230 homes had their roofs replaced, 83 homes benefitted from improved insulation levels, and 204 older persons accommodation received access improvements to RNIB standards.

10 dwellings have been purchased to increase the number of properties available using the Welsh Government's Homelessness Scheme.
